




Now hold the neighboring petal so that the sides match up with the one you have been working on. Take a small neat stitch to join the side of one petal to the adjoining side of the other petal, from fold to fold. Pull the thread tight. Take 2 or 3 more small neat stitches, from fold to fold, to strengthen this bond while at the same time creating the equivalent of a knot. Slip your needle back between the folds of the petal coming out about 1/2" away. Cut your thread. Doing this buries the cut end of the thread. It is neater and helps protect the cut thread from unraveling.

## Next, outer rosette



Outer rosette fold each corner placing the tip at the center mark.



With the OUTER rosette it is important NOT to catch the tips of the corners in with the stitching which will shape the petals. Carefully relocate the pins, without disturbing their precise position, with the tips folded out of the way of the center X.



Next the petals will be formed. With right sides together fold so that both tacky corners on one edge meet (close like a book). Mark the midway point with a pin (at the spine of a book). Unfold. Repeat, pin marking each midway point of the sides of the developing rosette.






Thread needle with matching thread. Take a few stitches to anchor the knot at the center X. Then take a stitch through the fold at a midway pin.

Draw this thread tight to the center X. Take a second stitch through the X at the base of the rosette and the midway fold. This stitching will later be covered by the inner rosette.

Repeat this tacking procedure with the opposite side, then at the 3rd & 4th midway points. Be sure to catch in the base fabric at the X.

Keep your needle threaded and attached for the next step.

Tacking the 3rd midpoint to the X at the base of the rosette. Notice the pins on the back which are still holding the original corner tips out of the way of all this stitching.

Be sure to tack each midpoint to the base with at least 2 stitches.







All 4 petals are tacked to each other 1/2" up from X.

This tacking of the petals helps to give them a pleasant and uniform shape.

Pins still hold the original corner tips away from the X on backside to protect them from getting caught in this stitching.

If the tips of the petals are still a bit tacky you may slightly adjust and then pinch them to help set the peak with just the right shape, the underside edges nicely aligned. The Fray Check will assist to keep a tight tip.

The pins may be released from the back of the rosette now, prior to adding the back facing, THOUGH on another later ribbon assembly I ACTUALLY FOUND IT BETTER TO WAIT to remove the pins until the rosettes are folded flat.



Folding the petals flat prior to sewing on the back facing - Unfold the petal tip so that it points to the ceiling. Then broaden out the 'waist' of the petal with your fingers so that the tip touches the X at the center. Flaten out the petal neatly. Be careful to keep the raw edges at the Z as close together as possible. Pin in place.









Outer rosette petals folded down and pinned prior to releasing the pins on the backside so that the facing can be attached to the main rosette.

Note the lower right corner is tighter and neater than the lower left corner. Strive for carefully folded tight folding.
