

Thursday/Friday July 13 & 14. Workshops: Machine Appliqué


Harriet's popular one day workshop will be presented twice, on two days, July 13 & 14.



Natural Impressions II

Quilts from Traditional to Outrageous

They came.....over 4600!

They saw......98 outstanding quilts!

The were OVERWHELMED......by quilts from all over the United States, the detailed replication captured in the Santa Barbara quilt, the Touchy-Feely quilt, and 35 quilts made by guild members.

The local media response was excellent. We were covered by the SB New Press and Casa. We were selected "Art Best Bet" by the Independent plus a two page in-depth commentary. We received live coverage by KEYT three different times during the four days of the event. Consequently the community responded and many repeated. We ran out of programs on the last day. It attracted many nonquilters and it should receive the award for "mostmen-attending-a-quilt-show." The guest ledger indicates that many attended from all over California... from as far north as Eureka, Oakland, and San Francisco; from Bakersfield, and from nearby Los Angeles, San Diego and Orange County. And even some from England, New Hampshire, Colorado, and Nevada came to see out exhibit.

And there was something for everyone who attended...door prizes for the lucky ones, appraisals for family quilts brought out of storage, antique quilts and blocks for shoppers, vintage fabrics to restore treasured family quilts, a Touchy-Feely quilt just for children (and amused adults), a chance for a 1930's cross-stitch quilt donated by Diane Reese (won by a Lompoc resident), free lectures for novice and veteran quilters and a special unveiling by our mayor of the Santa Barbara quilt. And at the close of the show, two guild members sold their quilts.

Nature's Splendor (#33) by Ellen Heck of Somis, CA was overwhelmingly the Viewer's Choice. Upon

notification, her response was, "I can't believe it, I can't believe it!!!! My quilt against all those other beautiful quilts!!!" The museum director, Dr. Robert Bruenig presented the "Director's Award" to **The**

Coral Reef (#37) by Jane Herbst of Lake Oswego, Oregon. Coincidentally, Coral Reef placed second in viewer's choice. Juror's choice by juror, Libby Lehman, was awarded to All My Reds (#37) made by our own guild member, Ruth Walters, and Toklat Wolf Pack (#28) by quilters Ree Nancarrow and Karla Harris of Denali Park, Alaska by juror, Judy Mathieson. But we know ALL the quilts were winners!!!

A big THANK YOU to guild members (and their spouses and children) who contributed in large ways and small...docents, greeters, information table helpers, solicitors of local businesses, wearers of "Ask Me About..." badges, set-up crew, take-down crew...all were needed and appreciated. The exhibit took five days to hang. At the close of the exhibit, a large group of faithful volunteers returned and we were able to take down the exhibit in an amazing 21/2 hours (that includes ALL the quilts returned in their boxes and sealed for UPS mailing!!!) And to the board members of Natural Impressions who came to meetings the past two years and shouldered the burden of many responsibilities, ignored their children and husbands, looked askance at their gardens and home repair projects, served cold dinners, took vacation days off work, skipped meals themselves, put off major family celebrations, birthdays, and anniversaries...to them we give a special thanks for presenting an extraordinary quilt exhibit. Their combined efforts earned the guild and unforgettable experience well-deserved and recognition. HATS OFF!!! for a job well done.

That Patchwork Place has very generously given us their four latest books:

<u>Easy Reversible Vests</u> by Carol Doak. This is Carol's 4th book. Included are 38 new paper piecing patterns as well as vest patterns.

<u>Patchwork Basics</u> by Marie-Christine Flocard and Cosabeth Parriaud. Those of you who have been enjoying Le Rouvray will be eager to see this second book from France.

<u>Seasoned with Quilts</u> by Retta Warehime. Using strip quilting, Retta creates pictorial quilts ranging from easy to difficult. Either do them as is or create your own samplers.

<u>Woven and Quilted</u> by Mary Anne Caplinger. Mary Anne weaves torn strips of patterned fabrics into "new" fabrics. A new approach to surface design by this long-time quiltmaker.

Adult Reading

<u>Fool's Puzzle</u> & <u>Irish Chain</u>, by Earline Fowler, both 1994, Berkeley Crime Series. Titles are quilt blocks, the mysteries are set in San Luis Obispo.

<u>The Body in the Kelp</u>, by Katherine Hall Page. "Great characters, a wonderful plot & a puzzle laid out in the unfinished threads of a quilt." – Ocala Star-Banner

How to Make an American Quilt, by Whitney Otto. "Individual stories stitched into a profoundly moving whole...A spectrum of women's experience in the 20th century." –Judith Freeman, Los Angeles Times. (Our own guild library has a copy. Soon to be released as a motion picture, so you may want to read it first, before seeing it.)

A Quilter's Wisdom — conversations with Aunt Jane, reprinted by Chronicle Books of San Francisco. Based on a historic text by Eliza Calvert Hall — the 1907 best seller <u>Aunt Jane of Kentucky</u>, a collection of short stories.

Children's Books (These are nice for anyone to curl up with. List supplied by Chaucer's Books.)


My Grandmother's Patchwork Quilt. A Book and Pocketful of Patchwork Pieces, by Janet Bolton. 1993/94, Delacourte Press, Bantam Doubleday Dell Publishing. The story of and pattern for making a charming appliqué quilt. Good to share with a child and introduce the appliqué technique.

Sewing Quilts, by Ann Turner. 1994, McMillan Publishing Co. Summary — "A pioneer girl sees pieces of her life sewn into the quilts she, her sister and her mother make."

The Quilt Story, by Tony Johnston & Tomie de Paola. 1985, G.P. Putnam & Sons. Summary — "A pioneer mother lovingly stitches a beautiful quilt which warms and comforts her daughter Abigail; many years later another mother mends and patches it for her little girl."

The Rag Coat, by Lauren Mills. 1991, Little, Brown & Co. Summary — "Minna proudly wears her new coat, made of clothing scraps to school, where other children laugh at her until she tells them the stories behind the scraps."

Eight Hands Round. A Patchwork Alphabet, by Ann Whiford Paul. 1991, Harper Collins Publishers. Summary — "Introduces letters of the alphabet with names of early American patchwork quilt patterns and explains the origins of the designs by describing the activity or occupation they derive from."




Midnight Sky 9" Pieced Block (9-1/2" unfinished)


Remembering the beautiful night time skies of the 4th of July, we are going to make solid white stars in a red or blue print sky. For the log cabin strips on 2 sides of the Star block, use various red and blue fabrics to make this a

patriotic tribute to the 4th. It's an easy and fun block to do!

To work template-free cut the following: Solid White Star- one 2"A square and two 2-3/8" squares cut in half diagonally to yield 4 B triangles Blue or red print background - four 2"A squares and two 2-3/8" squares cut in half diagonally to yield 4 B triangles Cut 2" strips from a variety of red and blue print fabrics

1/4" seam allowance included in cutting size given. Sew Star square together. Press and check size of block. Add strips in a variety of colors random Log Cabin style. Sew strip on, trim even with Star block and press seam allowance toward strip just added. Turn Star block quarter turn to left. Continue to sew on strips, making sure strips are added to only two sides of block, trimming and pressing strips as you go. When six strips have been added, block should measure 9 1/2" square. To square up block, press accurately and check seam allowance. It is best to alter within block rather than to trim outer edge.
