Diane Ericson Workshop

"Making Your Mark"

Friday, August 9, 2002

9 am. – 3:30 pm. Goleta Valley Community Center 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA



In this class we will play with lots of ideas and techniques for creating with stenciled fabrics. You'll learn to print and use stenciling to create a personal statement in your work. Next, we will focus on how to combine your printed fabrics with designer sewing techniques for more expressive clothing or fabric pieces. Techniques will include: reshaping edges, customizing pockets, shaped seams, insets, plus adding flaps and layers. Lots of samples will be shared.

Supply List

Xacto knife and cutting surface (or cardboard)- if you want to cut your own stencil. Any design ideas and /or stencils you have.

(Stencils will be available for purchase in class.)

Basic sewing kit

Some fusible knit interfacing (if you want to make technique samples)
Assorted fabrics to print on (small pieces of various textures, colors & weights)

Optional: A garment – cut out, that you may want to stencil (vest fronts etc.) or ready-to-wear

Optional: A pattern you'd like to work with (Diane will have ReVisions and Design & Sew Patterns available in class)

Dense foam pieces for printing with Fabric paints if you have any Acetate for stencils

For a \$10 Materials fee, Diane will supply these materials listed above.



On a recent vacation trip to New Hampshire, Vermont, and Maine, my husband, Bob, and I saw some wonderful old things: houses, barns, quilts, wooden canoes, and more...

Our first quilt stop was at Keepsake Quilting in Center Harbor, New Hampshire. At the north shore of Lake Winnipesaukee, Keepsake bills itself as the largest quilt store in America-and well may it be! Over 10,000 bolts of fabric line its walls, along with hundreds of patterns, kits, notions, and accessories. Keepsake also does a substantial business in consignment quilts during the summer, and there were dozens lining the walls and hanging from racks. If you don't know this store from its catalog or its online website, you might want to check it out at http://www.keepsakequilting.com and request a catalog. They do a bigger business through their website and catalogs than they do in their store, and that's saying a lot! The marketing manager, Bonnie, told me on the telephone that the store was founded in 1987 and is owned by Judy and Russ Sabanek. They don't sponsor any classes because the bulk of their business doesn't come from local people but from online and catalog sales, as well as from tourists who come in the summer months by the busload. They do sponsor two challenge contests twice a year, and the results are described in their catalog.



I found the quantity and variety of their fabrics to be marvelous, but some of the "big business" rules were a little surprising for a quilt store—they wouldn't cut a fat quarter (until the end of



the bolt), we couldn't take pictures that showed the consignment quilts, and the floor manager was unsure how to answer my very simple questions, and had to call the marketing manager. Nevertheless, it is a shop worth visiting, and the catalogs

are an invaluable source of ideas as well as materials.

Our next quilt stop was the Shelburne Museum in Vermont, just south of Burlington. This museum consists of 39 buildings on 45 acres -- including a lighthouse, a steamboat from Lake Champlain, a covered bridge, a schoolhouse, a general store, and so on. There are wonderful special exhibits of Grandma Moses and old RVs, and permanent collections of old tools and old vehicles, Impressionist art, American folk art, furniture, circus miniatures (thousands of them!), and yes, old quilts. The textiles building houses maybe two dozen old quilts, several hanging on the walls, but others hanging from huge racks that you can move (like rugs in a carpet store) and examine. The wonderful part is that they're covered with a Mylar sheet that allows the visitor to get right up close to the design and the stitches, point at it, and trace lines, all without actually touching the fabric. The guide told me that the Mylar lets the quilts breathe, so it's a perfect solution to keeping them protected while letting them be viewed close up. In addition to the quilts, there were laces, dolls, weavings (and looms), and beadwork. Altogether a splendid museum and well worth the trip.

After New Hampshire and Vermont, we headed for Maine, intent on finding the wooden canoe builders that Bob wanted to see. And what should we find in between two of them but a wonderful quilt show, sponsored by the Atkinson Lady Quilters! Their show was the next day, but there were four or five ladies in the Atkinson Methodist Church, setting up the displays. I asked if I might see the quilts since we would be out of the area by the next day. Judy Raymond, a delightful lady, showed me all that they had set up so far -- and it was glorious! The quilts were folded over all the pews of this small, white-painted church, and hanging on the walls around the room. It was a riot of color and pat-

By the way, if you try to find Atkinson on a Maine map, you may not succeed -- it wasn't on our map, but it's close to Dover-Foxcroft and Milo.

One of the last stops on our trip was in Freeport, Maine, for a visit to L.L. Bean (of course!) and also to Thomas Moser, Cabinetmaker. Just down the street was another quilt shop, called Quilt and Needlecraft, which has been there for 15 years. Owned by Jean Barr and managed by Sandi Eastman, it is a small, tidy, wonderful shop in an old house. The saleslady on duty, Peggy Matthews, is also a quilter and several of her beautiful miniatures were hanging on

the walls. Just in case you didn't know what her favorite thing is, the license plate on her car reads

'QUILTAH." I loved it ... Check out their website at http://www.mainequilts.com

Our last quilt stop was a house by the side of the road (Route 1) in Cape Neddick, Maine called Knight's Working Quilts and Gifts. Surrounded by acres of pine forests, Knight's was a delightful shop with loads of fabric with local color -- blueberries, moose, loons, lighthouses, bears, pine trees, and so on. I even added to my stash of chicken fabrics.

So, all in all, I guess you could say that our vacation was a smashing success. We covered about 1500 miles and reveled in the New England countryside -- so many trees and so much green! We saw old houses and old barns, got a tour of a maple sugar plant, beautiful folk art, covered bridges and lighthouses galore, and ate lobster, crabcakes, and clam chowder everywhere. We even slept in a 1790 farmhouse in a four-poster bed with a beautiful old quilt at the bottom. Who could ask for anything more?

Fall Workshop

The September workshop with Velda Newman will be "Creating Realism." Experimenting with fabrics to produce nature's wide range of textures and colors is the focus of this class. We will explore the use of discharge, ink, crayon, and pencil work, foil and paint on textiles. Combining an unlimited number of media we can recreate the textures and organic richness found only in nature.

Velda Newman's large scale designs portraying subjects from nature have been exhibited throughout the United States. She uses thread and surface design techniques to add dimension to her quilts. Her supply list will be provided later.



Quilt Show 2002 Information

A judged show differs from a juried show as no one is turned away.

This exhibit is a **member's showcase**, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) can be currently unfinished or in process but must be completed by collection time. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected by lottery according to size. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority.

For purposes of this show, a **quilt** is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back held together with stitching and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels and tied quilts will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does not cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring her own quilt(s) for loss and damage.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Judging: If you wish your entry to be judged, please cover the label with a piece of cloth or paper pinned to the quilt.

Sleeve: A 4" sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited. Sleeve construction: Cut fabric 9" by the width of the quilt less 2". Stitch a narrow hem on each end of the strip. Fold the strip in half lengthwise and stitch a 1/2" seam on the right side of the fabric, creating a long tube. Press the tube flat. Hand-stitch the top and bottom of the sleeve across the entire width of the quilt. Be sure the sleeve ends remain open for insertion of the hanging rod. Your finished tube will be approximately 4" to 4-1/2" wide.

Packaging: Each quilt should be delivered in its own pillow case with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

Details on quilt collection will be provided by September 1st.



September 2002 Block of the Month Tall Ships

Supplies needed:

1. Sky fabric: blue.

2. Sail fabric: light to medium value.

3. Ship's hull: medium to dark value.

To cut the pieces: Refer to figure 1 for placement.

1. From the sky fabric (blue):

Three 3-inch squares, for half-square triangles

Two 2.5-inch squares. Draw a pencil line from one corner to the opposite corner on the WRONG side of both squares.

Two strips, 2.5-inches by 6.5-inches each

2. From the sail (light to medium) fabric:

Three 3-inch squares, for half-square triangles


3. From the hull (medium to dark) fabric:

One 2.5-inch by 8.5-inch strip

Piecing directions:

- 1. Start by making 6 half-square triangles from the 3-inch squares of the sky blue and sail fabrics. See Figure 2. Press towards the darker fabric. Trim these to 2.5-inches square. Sew these 6 squares together as shown in figure 1.
- 2. Sew the two 2.5-inch by 6.5-inch sky strips to the sides of the sails, as shown.
- 3. Sew the hull (dark) strip to the bottom of the block.
- 4. With one 2.5-inch sky (blue) square, line up an unmarked corner of the square with the corner of the hull fabric, right sides together. The top of the 2.5-inch square will NOT line up with the top of the hull fabric because of the seam allowance. Sew along the line, and then press the top (sky) fabric towards the corner. Repeat with the other 2.5-inch square on the other corner. See Fig. 3.

Finished size: 8 inches x 8 inches. Unfinished size: 8.5 inches by 8.5 inches.
