# March Meeting

This month we are pleased to be hosting Therese May (http://www.theresemay.com). One of the pioneers who pushed the boundaries of what makes a "quilt" in the early 1970's, Therese has been inspiring quilters for decades. Her *Therese* quilt is one of the 100 Best Quilts of the 20<sup>th</sup> century. Her sense of design and color helped to redefine what we see today. Her workshop will be "The Quilted Portrait," an exploration of the face as a simple design element, varied through use of fabric and value. **Remember the supply list is for an entire quilt!!!** You will be making one block (with some variations), so cut accordingly. See supply list on page 6. For a great sneak preview, beg, borrow or steal a copy of the most recent *Quilters Newsletter*. The workshop is detailed there (aren't we lucky!!). Therese's goal is to encourage quilters to open up to their own creativity and she has been doing this since most of us were just learning how to quilt!! ### **Community Quits**

We would first like to thank Affinity Bank of Ventura for the generous donation of \$1,000 to the Community Quilt Project, and Vickie Mahan for applying for the donation. Our goal of presenting Hospice with 150 quilts this coming December is much more possible now that we have some funding to buy additional fabric for additional kits.

We would still welcome any donations of fabric you may wish to share. We are including one yard of focus fabric, four to five 1/2 yard pieces of coordinating fabric, and 1-1/2 yards of backing fabric in each kit; therefore, 150 kits will require even more fabric than the \$1,000 will buy us.

Thanks to all of you who picked up a kit at the February meeting and came to the February 23rd workshop. We will bring new kits in March. Thanks to all of you who are already working on a quilt for Hospice.

Please mark your calendars with the dates of the remaining workshops. The workshops are FREE and will be held at the Goleta Valley Community Center from 9 AM-3:30 PM. Those dates are May 25th, August 24th, and November 30th.

# President's Message

At the February Board meeting, we were discussing the budget and the support we have given to the City College Adult Education quilting programs. The question came up as to how many of those in attendance became members of the Guild through their participation in these classes. Almost half of those at the meeting had first attended and then become members of the Guild through their participation at adult education. We all agreed that's a good reason to support Adult Education with our giving.

My story of becoming a quilter certainly followed a different track. My older daughter, soon to hit the big 5-0, was a member of a Junior Girl Scout troop and being the supportive person I was, I was a co-troop leader. Cookie selling produced a grand profit of 5 cents per box and our troop was in need of funds to do a camping jaunt to Vermont. (Yes, I camped, too.) In our village there was an elderly lady (she may have been even older than I am now) who was a quilter. My co-leader suggested we do a raffle quilt as a fund-raiser and ask this lady to give us a hand. I was invited to her home to talk with her about the girls making a quilt and while there had an opportunity to see her quilts. I will never forget the beautiful matching basket quilts she had on a couple of her beds. I was hooked for life.

The next few months the troop was involved in this project – a double Irish chain pieced and quilted done by hand. It was an experience I'll never forget – kids of that age can't thread a needle and the stitches – oh my! The raffle was a success and we went to Vermont. I doubt if the quilt is still in existence as it could not possibly have survived more than a couple of washings. Basting size stitches are not too durable.

How lucky we are today in the array of fabrics and tools we have to work with. This quilt, and my early quilts, were all cut by drawing lines on the fabric and using scissors. All cotton fabric was at a premium as polyester was king. Quilt shops had not yet been invented so no classes were available. Quilts were commonly backed with sheets - usually a blend, as that was the rage. There were very few quilt books on the market to teach those who did not have a mother or grandmother to pass on their knowledge. Patterns, in general, either came from the newspaper columns or from the Mountain Mist Batting packages. My first quilt came from a book published by Dover. I remember pinning it together with straight pins and then quilting it. How I came upon that method I'll never know. I can only guess that, lacking a frame, this was how we did the troop quilt.

I don't know if my quilting has come a long way since the '60's but I do know my stash and collection of tools certainly has. With this rainy weather I think I'm going to look at what I have amassed and try to get together a couple of collections. One will be fabric that is good but a replication of many other pieces, and the second a collection of tools and such that are duplicates or that I no longer use. The fabric I'll donate to Community Quilts (Marty and JoAnn seem to make the most ugly ducklings shine in their kits and I promise no "junk") and the other I'll store for our attic sale at Guild next summer. Want to bet?

#### Kathy McNeil PICTORIAL QUILTING - A DESIGN WORKSHOP

- Bring those vacation photos, magazine pictures etc. that you wish you could turn into a quilt.
- Reduce photos on a copy maching to a 4x4 inch size.
- Butcher or freezer paper, 4x4 feet for drawing on.
- One large sheet of tracing paper.
- Pencil.
- Paper scissors.
- Fabrics you are considering for your project.

This workshop will focus on basic design principles for developing a composition. Ideas for enlarging this composition, **without a lot of drawing**, will be presented.

#### Where do I start?

The Course will cover:

- Tackling major characters or focal areas
- Secondary characters or landscape accents
- Auditioning borders
- Quilting the Pictorial Quilt
- Individual design time for each student
- Construction plan brief discussion of techniques and how to use them in your quilt
- Fabrics appropriate for pictorial project

# Block of the Month - April "Springtime Pastels"

Fabrics needed: 1. Your choice of one batik in pastel color 2. Solid white fabric


From White Fabric: Cut 4 - 2 <del>{</del><sup>\*</sup> squares Cut 4 - 2 <del>{</del><sup>\*</sup> x 5 <del>{</del><sup>+</sup> rectangles

From Pastel Batik Fabric: Cut 5 - 2 <del>{</del>" squares Cut 4 - 2 <del>{</del>" x 5 <del>{</del>" rectangles

1. Piece the top, middle, and bottom units.

2. Sew the three units together according to diagram.

3. Trim to 12 ‡ " square.

#### Therese May THE OUILTED PORTRAIT WORKSHOP

For a quilt with 36 squares (number can be varied):

- 36 8 inch squares fabric of different colors and values, plain and patterned
- 36 8 inch squares of unbleached muslin
- 36 8 inch squares of fusible interfacing with paper backing
- 36 8 inch squares of stitch and tear stabilizer
- 37-40 sheets 8-1/2 x 11 paper
- approximately 3 yards of fabric for the backing of the quilt
- approximately 3 yards of batting
- lots of thread—various colors
- various fabrics for border of quilt
- scissors for fabric and paper
- pins
- needles
- rotary cutter
- cutting mat
- buttons, beads
- pencil, pen, journal
- iron, ironing boards
- pressing cloth
- access to a copy machine
