

his month Lujean Seagal will present her lecture and workshop Beyond Border Boredom. Lujean completed a B.A. in Fine Arts with an emphasis in textile design in the 70's and migrated to quilting following her early years in creative weaving and textile design. She currently holds a California Teaching Credential in Textiles and Arts and teaches full time at Simi Valley Adult School.

Lujean has completed over 250 quilt projects and has held onewoman shows as well as having been accepted in many juried shows such as Road to California, International Quilt Festival, World Ouilt and Textiles, and Pacific International Ouilt Festival. A special honor bestowed on her was the acceptance of one of her quilts designed for President Clinton and his subsequent note of thanks.

We are pleased to welcome Lujean to Coastal Quilters Guild and look forward to reaping the benefit of her experience and talent to improve our quilt efforts.

April 13 Lecture: Lujean Seagal presents Beyond Border **Boredom**: There is more to a quilt than a center. You can take an ordinary group of center blocks and transform them into an extraordinary quilt. From simple strip methods to complex appliqué, a border can frame and enhance a quilt, producing an extraordinary and pleasing composite?

April 14 Workshop: Lujean Seagal (http://www.lujeanquilt.com) takes us **Beyond Border Boredom**. This workshop is her most popular, including a study of various borders and a 20page workbook. We discuss the elements of different borders. Students will bring a UFO block or other center block to make a small wall hanging using new border designs. Topics of discussion will include how to make a border fit your quilt and how to pick a design for your project. Students are encouraged to bring unfinished quilt tops in need of a border to discuss and employ various options.

Check with Dorothy Fitch at the Guild meeting to see if there is still space available for this fun and creative workshop.

President's Message

I'm writing this evening after a wonderful day at the Glendale Quilt Show. The weather was perfect for the drive down, and I wasn't driving so I had a chance to really look around at the beautiful place we live in. Congratulations to **Barbara Ortiz** for her quilt *Un Cosmati Piccolo* that received a blue ribbon for hand quilting at the show. It was created as a result of a workshop by Norah McMeeking.

The show, even though it is far bigger than our show, was really what one goes to a guild show for. The quilts displayed offered such a range of types and quality. Some of the quilts were first efforts and some came from quilters who have years of experience. That is the wonderful thing about this kind of show. It is also what has made our show so good each time. So, as you may have guessed, this is a pitch for everyone to get a quilt ready to enter into our show.

Over the next few months we will be hearing about some of the things that judges may take into consideration when they look at quilts for judging. Some of these will seem more than picky and make you think that your quilt can never measure up. I know that for some of these aspects my quilts will not. However, it gives me a far greater appreciation of why one quilt at a show may be judged superior to another. I think it is important for the Guild to provide information to all levels of quilters – even if I'll never reach that level. Remember you do not have to have your quilt judged but WE DO HAVE TO HAVE YOUR QUILT!

There are some other quilt show items that come to mind. **Paulette Ley** has figured out a way to make the best looking aprons for us to wear at the show. You know how hard it is to locate a "white glover" at

a show. Well, wait until you see the royal blue aprons with the Coastal Quilter's logo on the bib that Paulette and her mini-group are assembling for us. I'm going to keep you guessing as to the source of the material.

In past years we have been fortunate to have received some support as a nonprofit for our show. The fee for the parking lot was covered for the last show and two shows ago, among other things, a basket of "goodies" was donated and raffled for funds for the show. If anyone has a source of such help or a suggestion please contact either Liz Turner or me with information.

A volunteer is needed to coordinate the distribution of the show posters. This will need to be done sometime toward mid-August. The design (by Judy Rys) and printing will be taken care of and the job of this volunteer will be to distribute the posters to other volunteers who will take them to stores, etc. in designated areas.

We also have a couple of older quilt stands that could use some attention and repair. We are looking for a handy member or someone in the member's family who might be able to work on these stands. We do have four great new ones but there are times when these older stands are also needed. I'd like to see one more try at resurrecting them before they get discarded.

Last, but not least, thanks again to Diane, Cynthia, Judy and other helpers who have once again given us a beautiful opportunity quilt. It is special to us, too, as the Guild has a tie to Marie Webster who first made the beautiful flower patterns.

These quilts will be going to ill or traumatized children between the ages of newborn to 18, all in the Santa Barbara area.

Those of you wishing to make quilts using fabrics more appropriate for adults, are encouraged to make quilts for **Angels Bearing Gifts**. This organization gives gifts to developmentally challenged adults who have no support system and who would otherwise be forgotten on special days.

We will have one more free workshop, on Wednesday, June 28 from 9 AM - 2:30 PM at the Goleta Valley Community Center, for anyone who wishes to enjoy the company of fellow guild members while working on a community quilt. We will provide irons and ironing boards, kits and patterns. APROL 2006

SUPPLY LIST FOR EARTH, WIND, FIRE & WATER QUILTING THE ELEMENTS WORKSHOP MAY 12, 2006 LINDA S. SCHMIDT 2004

The theme of this class is the Elements. In this one-day workshop, all of the techniques will be demonstrated and you will create the small Earth scene using the demonstrated techniques and design principles. Materials fee: \$10.00 includes a multiple page handout, patterns for all four pieces use of Fiber Etch, fabric paints, mica chips, Shiva paint sticks, metallic paint powders, and Tintzl fibers. You will also need:

<u>Standard sewing stuff</u> – We won't get as far as sewing stuff down, so don't bother with the sewing machine. Bring lots of PINS, though, a rotary cutter, board, scissors for paper and fabric and a seam ripper.

- Fabrics for the Earth scene for tree leaves, tree trunks, rocks, water, preferably batiks or blurry hand dyes, NOT calicos!
- 2-3 pieces of Lite Steam a Seam II (comes in a package at fabric store, by Sulky)
- Sheer fabrics opalescent organdie, or sparkle organza in sheer opalescent and white colors. Bring one piece (1/4 yd or so) and we will share.
- Invisible thread (.004 mm)
- A piece of cellophane from around a bouquet of flowers, about 1/4 yard or so must be real cellophane, not plastic wrap (try the grocery store or floral shop)
- One tube of Jones Tones or Tulip Puff Paint white or cream color (available at Michael's and other craft stores NOT 3D paint!). If you can't find it, I will have some at the workshop for \$1/tube, but try to find some. I'm running out!
- Approximately 1 yard of junky old fabric to squirt it on.
- 1 pkg iridescent white Fusible Fiber or Angelina fiber or Tintzl (Fusible Fiber is what it's called at Michael's). (Optional)
- We will need approximately 5 irons/ironing surfaces for the class
- Heat gun or hair dryer (if you have one)
- Small portable fan (if you have one handy)
- Tall thin candle, candle holder and matches
- Pie tin or other small, flat pan that will hold water
- Ultra Fine Sharpie Marker
- One piece each of white Totally Stable, tracing paper and freezer paper
- Glue stick
- Stiletto (if you have one)
- 1 white garbage bag
- Parchment paper (from grocery store)
- Scotch or masking tape
- Fine iridescent glitter (if you have some)
- A couple of paint brushes 1/4" 1/2" wide
- 5 or so plastic throw-away cups for paint
- Apron or wear old clothes
- Spirit of adventure



Harvest of Colors 2006

It hardly seems possible, but only four months remain until the application deadline for the Quilt Show. Now, you all know how important it is for every member of the guild to submit a quilt! And you've read elsewhere about the opportunity to participate in the boutique, either to make a little extra money for yourself, or to donate a handmade sale item to benefit the guild. Both, even.

As I sat in the quilt show meeting last Thursday night, I was delighted to see many new faces in with the veteran organizers. I was also struck by the fact that even though this is my fifth show, having even chaired one, there's a lot I don't know! It occurred to me that many of the newer members of the guild may be interested in learning more about the mechanics of the show.

Did you know, for example.....

- that the quilt show is expected to raise at least \$7,000 for guild programs?
- that to make the show run smoothly, we'll need roughly 710 "quilter hours" from guild volunteers during the weekend of the show?
- that the Flag Factory in Carpinteria stores our yellow and maroon Quilt Show Banners at no charge?
- that the year's Challenge Quilts will be displayed in the show?
- that Harvest of Colors showcases not only the creative gifts of guild members but also the educational and charitable activities of the guild, through displays and demonstration?

There's no question that organizing a show is a major undertaking—a lot of work for a lot of people! Whenever I wonder if it's worth it—worth the time and effort and sore muscles and catch-as-catch-can meals the weekend of the show—I call to mind my very favorite moment of any of our shows. It's just before opening time on Saturday. The vendors are all there, with merchandise uncovered, but all that beautiful fabric pales in comparison with the QUILTS and WEARABLES constructed by CQG quilters. The hall positively glows with the collective creativity of

9-1/2" (unfinished)

Pre-cutting: (pieces are oversized to allow for wiggle room)

Flame: #1 (one 2-1/4" square) Candle: #4 (one 2" x 5-1/2") #7 (one 8-1/2" x 3") Background (cream or white):


#2, #3 (one 2-1/2" square, cut diagonally)

#5, #6 (two 4" x 7")
#8, #9 (one 4" square, cut diagonally)

Borders: (four 2" x 10" strips from background fabric cut on straight of grain to prevent stretching)

BEYOND BORDER BOREDOM WORKSHOP SUPPLY LIST April 14, 2006

The purpose of this workshop is to explore the wide variety of borders that can enhance your quilt. Borders are the hidden factor in creating a pleasing quilt.

This class is very different from most workshops. A Border Workbook will be given to each student and a discussion of many different borders will complete the first part of the workshop. The discussion includes how to figure the correct size, design, and color.

The students then work on their own borders or complete the workbook trying the many new borders. This can be done by using a "cheater" square, any completed block, UFO square, or small quilt. For class purposes a smaller center (12" - 24") is ideal. Picking a design from the book and adding borders will be the focus of the second part of the workshop.

In addition, students are encouraged to bring quilt tops that need borders so that the class can discuss various options.

SUPPLIES NEEDED:

If you wish to complete the workbook with samples of the various borders, just bring fabric scraps to work with so you can try the many new techniques.

FABRIC

- 1. Center square ("cheater" block, small quilt or anything to which you wish to add a border).
- 2. Fabric for border design some can match what was used in the center, but bring a large variety of fabrics.

SEWING SUPPLIES:

- 1. Sewing machine
- 2. Normal supplies (i.e. rotary cutter, rulers, thread, etc)
- 3. Triangle Squares paper if you have them can be helpful, but are NOT NECESSARY.
- A GOOD SENSE OF HUMOR AND READY FOR FUN.

DEADLINE FOR SUBMISSION OF ENTRY FORMS: THURSDAY, AUGUST 10, 2006

QUILT EXHIBITOR INFORMATION

This exhibit is a members' showcase, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) must be completed by the application deadline. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected according to available space. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority.

For the purposes of this show, a **quilt** is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back, held together with stitching, and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels and tied quilts will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does **not** cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring his/her own quilt(s) for loss or damage.

Sleeve: A 4-inch sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side, stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Photograph: A photograph of the quilt must accompany this application. Please label the photo and staple it to the back of this form. Photos will not be returned.

Judging: If you wish your entry to be judged, you must **cover** the label with a piece of cloth or paper pinnned to the quilt. A **\$10** fee for judged quilts must accompany this form.

Packaging: Each quilt must be delivered in its own pillowcase with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

JUDGING CATEGORIES

(For questions about judging and categories, please call Pat Masterson, 642-4769)

Traditional: a pattern or design with an established history in the quilting tradition.

Innovative: a design with fundamental deviation from traditional patterns and sets, reflecting growth through tradition.

Group: a quilt made by two or more people, excluding commercial quilting.

Pictorial: an art quilt that illustrates a recognizable image, such as people, wildlife, cityscapes, etc.


