This month Sue Nickels returns to Santa Barbara. Sue began quilting over 22 years ago, starting out by hand and gradually focusing on machine work. She has been teaching machine quilting and appliqué classes for the past 12 years. She teaches regularly at local quilt shops, and has taught and lectured nationally at both the American Quilter's Society and National Quilting Association shows, and for many guilds around the country.

Sue has co-written two books with her sister, Pat Holly, on machine quilting patterns. Pat and Sue also worked as contributing editors for Ladies Circle Patchwork Quilts Magazine. In addition, she is currently working on a machine appliqué book to be published by AQS. Pat and Sue have created award-winning quilts together including "Blackbirds Fly" which won, among others, a 3rd place at the 1996 AQS show. Their most recent award and most thrilling moment was winning the 1998 AQS Best of Show for "The Beatles Quilt".

February 9 Lecture: Sue Nickels presents **Following The Tradition – Machine Quilting:** Explore the history of machine quilting in this informative slide lecture. Begin with antique quilts then progress to the present day popularity of machine quilting. Sue will share her thoughts on how quilters keep with traditional values held through history. Sue will show a variety of her quilts after the slide portion and take questions on machine quilting.

February 10 Workshop: Sue Nickels (sue.nickels.com) will teach **Exploring Machine Stipple Quilting.** Free motion quilting is explored for background areas and all over surface designs. Ways to vary traditional stipple quilting will be practiced as well as fun alternatives. Some alternatives will include loopy meandering, psychedelic stippling, and curvy crosshatching. If you are looking for interesting ways to make your machine quilting different from the crowd, this will inspire you. Some free motion quilting will be reviewed then jump into the fun with new ideas.

Check with Dorothy Fitch at the Guild meeting to see if there is still space available for this fun and creative workshop.

The Harvest of Colors 2006 publicity committee will be taking advantage of many FREE advertising opportunities available through the Internet to publicize our Guild's biennial quilt show.

Did you know, for example, that Alex Anderson's website, www.alexandersonquilts.com, contains a "Happenings" calendar of events covering the entire United States, a great resource for finding out if there will be a quilt show in an area of the country you may be visiting on vacation or business? 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2006 Community Quilts The Linus Project & Angels Bearing Gifts

While The Linus Project is a national organization with a national website www.projectlinus.org, quilts we give to the local group, the Santa Barbara Linus Project, will be distributed in Santa Barbara and the surrounding area. The Santa Barbara Linus Project provides blankets and quilts to local agencies including the Pediatric and NICU units of Cottage Hospital, CALM, Transition House, Family Service Agency and Santa Barbara Family Care. One of our quilters, who is a nurse in the Pediatric unit of Cottage Hospital, has told us that they can use as many as 100 quilts a month.

Quilts and blankets will be given to ill or traumatized children from newborn to 18 years of age. It is important that quilts going to the Linus Project be handmade, have no smoky smells or chemicals and no embellishments. Baby quilts should be about 36 inches square. Blankets which have been knit or crocheted are also welcome.

Marty has made up four new patterns for baby quilts. For older children using larger quilts, or for quilts going to Angels Bearing Gifts, patterns given last year would be appropriate. The patterns, kits and some batting will be available at the Community Quilt table at each month's meeting. Patterns are also available on the guild website http://www.coastalquilters.org.

Block of the Month - March

Pattern: BELL Method: appliqué 9 1/2" (unfinished)

Fabric and cutting:

White or cream: 10" square (background)


Red: scraps for berries

Green: scraps for holly leaves

Assorted colors: scraps for bell, bell band, and clapper

Preparing appliqué block:

- Trace templates A-H onto fusible web
- · Roughly cut apart each piece leaving a small margin beyond the drawn lines
- Fuse pieces to WRONG side of appropriate fabrics using product instructions
- · Trim each piece exactly on drawn lines
- Refer to pattern: fuse or stitch pieces in alphabetical order onto background square
- · Secure the edges with hand or machine stitching
- Embellish as desired





Upcoming 2006 Lectures and Workshops

March: Quilt artist Carol Anne Grotrian will present Quilts With A View: The New Landscape Tradition at our Guild meeting. Her workshop the following day is Picture Perfect Piecing. Start piecing a picture quilt with gentle curves and easy corners. Move on to adventurous hairpin turns and jagged peaks. Learn when to sew by hand or by machine. Students will piece a landscape study from templates designed to cover the basic and advanced techniques Carol Anne uses to make her quilts. Her website is http://www.carolannegrotrian.com.

April: Lujean Seagal will join us to present her lecture and workshop both entitled **Beyond Border Boredom.** The lecture will show us how to take an ordinary group of center blocks and transform them into extraordinary quilts. Lujean says the "Beyond Border Boredom" workshop is her most popular. Discussion topics include study of various borders, elements of different borders, how to make a border fit your quilt, and how to pick a design for your project. Students will bring a UFO block or other center block to make a small wall handing using new border designs. Students are also encouraged to bring unfinished quilt tops in need of a border to discuss and employ various options. The workshop includes a 20-page workbook. May: Linda Schmidt presents Short Attention Span Quilting. This program is a talk & trunk show with more than 25 quilts and 15 ensembles, traditional to contemporary, exhibiting a wide range of styles, techniques, fabrics, patterns and themes. Some poetry, a little laughter, a bit of imagination, and a lot of passion for our craft. Actual quilts and garments shown, not slides. Linda's workshop is Elements in Fabric - Earth, Wind, Fire and Water. Come experiment with a wide variety of products and a simple set of design principles to help you deal with design solutions as you create your own version of the elements. Play with Fibre Etch, Puff Paint, mica chips, melted painted cellophane, cracked ice, Angelina and Tintzl fibers, metallic paint powders, Bonding Agent 007 and much, much more. Be a wild woman! Picture Perfect Piecing Workshop \$uppiy List March 10, 2006

- mechanical pencil
- soft leads (B or HB)
- colored pencil to mark dark fabrics
- pencil sharpener
- eraser
- Sharpie pen Fine Point (not Ultra Fine)
- scissors for paper
- ruler 18" (see-thru is easiest to use)
- cellophane (Scotch) tape
- large envelope to store pattern pieces
- 9" x 11" piece of fine grit sandpaper glued to a 9" x 11" piece of cardboard
- fabric: solids, commercial prints, hand dyed (opt)

Note: We'll be working on a pieced landscape top about 15" x 24" based on templates (patterns) I'll provide to incorporate many piecing techniques. Sky fabric and the bottom fabric (beach, grass or ground depending on your imagination) needs to be at least 22" wide. For the rest, fat quarters or smaller pieces will work. You'll need a variety of water and foliage fabrics, something cheery for an umbrella & tablecloth, also beach colors. Different scale patterns (large and small) and a range of value (light to dark) will help. Fabric with photographic images are often less successful than those patterns that remind you of pebbles or grass, etc. See www.carolannegrotrian.com for samples based on the pattern we'll be using.

- sewing machine (optional if you wish to focus on hand piecing)
- back up sewing machine needle
- small scissors (sharp to the point to snip curves)
- larger scissors for fabric
- thread- light, medium, and dark grey, cotton or poly cotton
- needles-sharps, size your preference
- thimble (opt)
- straight pins and pin cushion
- seam ripper

February 10, 2006

Machine Stipple Quilting and Much More!

(All levels)

Please arrive at the Goleta Valley Community Center (5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta, CA) no later than 8:45 for set-up. Class will begin <u>promptly</u> at 9:00a.m., Sue has a tight airline connection following the class, so we will have to stay on task!

In this all day workshop, free motion quilting will be explored for background areas on your quilt and for overall surface designs. Traditional stipple quilting will be covered as well as many fun alternatives. Some of the variations include: loopy meandering, psychedelic stippling and curvy crosshatching. Students will make a small stipple sampler to showcase these techniques. If you are looking for ways to make your machine quilting different from the crowd, this will inspire you. Some basic free motion quilting skills will be reviewed, then jump into the fun!

Supply List

SEWING MACHINE - bring instruction manual, extension bar or table and all accessories

DARNING FOOT- a MUST for free motion quilting

Straight stitch throat plate - optional, bring if you have one

Ten 12" squares muslin

Five 12" squares cotton or cotton blend batting

Thread - 50 weight cotton in off white and tan or gray. Optional decorative threads (variegated, etc.) Sewing machine needles - I use 80/12 microtex for 50 weight cotton needles for decorative thread 50 safety pins - I use size 0 or 1

Rubber gloves - kitchen dishwashing gloves, size smaller than you wear.

Marking pencil - I use Quilter's Choice, silver

Ruler for marking straight lines, approx. 12"

Basic sewing supplies - scissors, bobbins, etc.

Extension cord Optional, but a good idea- small cushion for height, extra light

PROJECT- Prepare prior to coming to class.

Nine 7 1/2" squares cotton fabric in solids or tone on tone print

(*Piece this into a nine patch, I use 5 squares one fabric and 4 squares another fabric.*) *see note below One 25" square for backing fabric

One 25" square cotton or cotton blend batting

Thread for project

Baste this quilt project before coming to class

*Sue's new book "Machine Quilting- A Primer of Techniques" features stipple sampler (Page 93) that can be used for this project.


