

This month, we welcome California quilter **Linda Schmidt** to our guild. Linda is a prolific quilter and garment designer with over 20 years of experience. In addition, she has been doing talks, trunk shows and workshops at guilds locally, nationally and internationally for the last ten years, showing quilts and garments in her talk and trunk show and 35 ensembles in her "Flamboyancy Rising" fashion show. She was a Fairfield Designer in 1994-95, and again in 1997-98.

Over the last ten years, Linda has received over 250 ribbons, many of them Best in Show, Best in Class, First Place, or Artist awards, at fairs, quilt shows, and art shows. She has also been invited to participate in special exhibitions all over the world with both her quilts and garments. She has been chosen as special lecturer and teacher *at Empty Spools Conference* at Asilomar, has taught at many quilts shows, conferences, and retreats, has had work and profiles in quilting magazines published in both the U.S. and England, and was featured demonstrating her fabric painting techniques on an episode of "Simply Quilts."

We are pleased to welcome Linda to Coastal Quilters Guild and look forward to reaping the benefit of her experience and talent to add some sparkle to our quilting efforts.

May 11 Lecture: Linda Schmidt presents **Short Attention Span Quilting- A talk & trunk show with quilts and garments**. More than 25 quilts and 15 ensembles, traditional to contemporary, exhibiting a wide range of styles, techniques, fabrics, patterns and themes. Some poetry, a little laughter, a bit of imagination, and a lot of passion for our craft. Actual quilts and garments are shown, not slides.

COMMUNITY QUILTS 10 Most Frequently Asked Questions

1. Are we making quilts for babies, children or adults this year?

We're donating quilts for recipients of all ages.

- Project Linus (Children newborn-18 years) www.projectlinus.org
- Angels Bearing Gifts (Adults) www.angelsbearinggifts.com
- 2. How big should I make the quilt?

 Any size ranging from 36" square up to twin size.

Project Linus:

36" x 36" for babies 36" x 45" or larger for children

45" x 60" or larger teens

Angels Bearing Gifts: 45" x 60" or larger.

- 3. Do I have to use a kit?

 No. You may use your own fabrics.
- 4. Do I have to use one of the provided patterns? *No. You may use any pattern of your choice.*
- 5. May I change the fabrics in the kit? Yes. Please feel free to add or substitute fabrics from your own collection.

- 6. May I tie the quilt?

 No. Hand or machine quilt your quilt.
- 7. Should I return any unused kit fabric? Only any remaining fabric 1/4 yard or larger.
- 8. Do I have to wash the quilt?

 Yes! Quilt should be washed after it is made, and quilts going to the Linus Project need to be free of any scent or ornamentation.
- 9. When are the quilts due?

 CQG meeting: November 9th, 2006.

 Please remember to attach a Coastal Quilters Guild label to the back of the quilt.

SUPPLY LIST FOR EARTH, WIND, FIRE & WATER QUILTING THE ELEMENTS WORKSHOP MAY 12, 2006 LINDA S. SCHMIDT

The theme of this class is the Elements. In this one-day workshop, all of the techniques will be demonstrated and you will create the small Earth scene using the demonstrated techniques and design principles. Materials fee: \$10.00 includes a multiple page handout, patterns for all four pieces, use of Fiber Etch, fabric paints, mica chips, Shiva paint sticks, metallic paint powders, and Tintzl fibers. You will also need:

<u>Standard sewing stuff</u> – We won't get as far as sewing stuff down, so don't bother with the sewing machine. Bring lots of PINS, though, a rotary cutter, board, scissors for paper and fabric, and a seam ripper.

- Fabrics for the Earth scene for tree leaves, tree trunks, rocks, water, preferably batiks or blurry hand dyes, NOT calicos!
- 2-3 pieces of Lite Steam a Seam II (comes in a package at fabric store, by Sulky)
- Sheer fabrics opalescent organdie, or sparkle organza in sheer opalescent and white colors. Bring one piece (1/4 yd or so) and we will share.
- Invisible thread (.004 mm)
- A piece of cellophane from around a bouquet of flowers, about 1/4 yard or so must be real cellophane, not plastic wrap (try the grocery store or floral shop)
- One tube of Jones Tones or Tulip Puff Paint white or cream color (available at Michael's and other craft stores – NOT 3D paint!). If you can't find it, I will have some at the workshop for \$1/tube, but try to find some. I'm running
- Approximately 1 yard of junky old fabric to squirt it on.
- 1 pkg iridescent white Fusible Fiber or Angelina fiber or Tintzl (Fusible Fiber is what it's called at Michael's). (Optional)
- We will need approximately 5 irons/ironing surfaces for the class
- Heat gun or hair dryer (if you have one)
- Small portable fan (if you have one handy)
- Tall thin candle, candle holder and matches
- Pie tin or other small, flat pan that will hold water
- Ultra Fine Sharpie Marker
- One piece <u>each</u> of white Totally Stable, tracing paper and freezer paper
- Glue stick
- Stiletto (if you have one)
- 1 white garbage bag
- Parchment paper (from grocery store)
- Scotch or masking tape
- Fine iridescent glitter (if you have some)
- A couple of paint brushes 1/4" 1/2" wide
- 5 or so plastic throw-away cups for paint
- Apron or wear old clothes
- Spirit of adventure



SUPPLY LIST FOR FAST-PIECE APPLIQUÉ JUNE 9, 2006 ROSE HUGHES

Fast, furious, and fantastic! In just a day together you'll learn the secret of using machine piecing and appliqué in combination to simplify complicated curves and circles, and get the perfect results you crave in your quilts. But why limit ourselves? Let's also explore how to layer your work with a wide variety of colorful, unique and unusual embellishments—the kind that say YOU in your quilts, your unique signature pieces.

You will take home a creative appliquéd piece, underway, and a mind filled with new ideas and techniques to apply to future projects.

SUPPLIES:

- Cotton or silk fabrics (if silks chosen each should be ironed beforehand with a light to sheer iron-on interfacing)
- Backing fabric 21" x 26" (a small amount will be seen from the front)
- 1 piece of batting, 21" x 26" (light weight—Hobbs/Heirloom, Warm & Natural)
- Sewing machine in good working condition, with zig-zag capability and an appropriate foot for cording or zig-zag stitching
- Bernina users should bring #21 foot if you have one
- Yarns for couching
- Basic sewing supplies (include Sewer's Aid liquid for decorative threads)
- Sewing and decorative threads
- Masking Tape and several safety pins for basting
- Appliqué, sewing and paper scissors
- Cutting board, ruler and rotary cutter
- Pencil/Eraser
- Fine line (not ultra-fine) marker (permanent black)
- Drawing paper
- Tracing Paper, 1-piece 18" x 24"
- Freezer Paper, 18" wide



Block-of-the-Month June

STAR

Appliqué 9-1/2" (unfinished)

This "funky" star is not symmetrical which makes it a perfect choice for fusing. Using a variety of fabrics adds to the whimsy. Don't forget to pick up free tracing paper at the Blockof-the-Month table during guild meetings.

Background: Blue - cut one 10" square Star points: Scraps of holiday fabric

As always, if you prefer to hand appliqué your star, add "turn-under" allowance to all pieces when cutting templates/fabric.

Preparing appliqué block:

If you plan to use 6 different fabrics, trace individual templates of pieces

A-F onto tracing paper extending star point "bottoms" (pieces A-E) to the dotted lines to allow for tucking under star center (piece F)


For less than 6 fabrics, consult the pattern and remember to allow for an edge to tuck under wherever your plan overlaps

Trace templates onto fusible

Fuse pieces to WRONG side of appropriate fabrics using product instructions

Trim each piece

Refer to pattern: fuse or stitch pieces in alphabetical order onto background square

QUILT EXHIBITOR INFORMATION

This exhibit is a members' showcase, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) must be completed by the application deadline. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected according to available space. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority.

For the purposes of this show, a **quilt** is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back, held together with stitching, and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels and tied quilts will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does **not** cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring his/her own quilt(s) for loss or damage.

Sleeve: A 4-inch sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side, stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Photograph: A photograph of the quilt must accompany this application. Please label the photo and staple it to the back of this form. Photos will not be returned.

Judging: If you wish your entry to be judged, you must **cover** the label with a piece of cloth or paper pinnned to the quilt. A **\$10** fee for judged quilts must accompany this form.

Packaging: Each quilt must be delivered in its own pillowcase with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

JUDGING CATEGORIES

(For questions about judging and categories, please call Pat Masterson, 642-4769)

Traditional: a pattern or design with an established history in the quilting tradition.

Innovative: a design with fundamental deviation from traditional patterns and sets, reflecting growth through tradition.

Group: a quilt made by two or more people, excluding commercial quilting.

Pictorial: an art quilt that illustrates a recognizable image, such as people, wildlife, cityscapes, etc.

Show Quilts—Judged: Yes or No? By Pat Masterson

Whether you plan to enter your quilt to be judged or not, we can all benefit from knowing the attributes of a prizewinning quilt. In addition, be aware that quilt show judges are appreciative of all effort and their goals are to elevate the quality of quiltmaking and to recognize outstanding workmanship. Quilts made by Santa Barbara quilters can compete with the best.

So what does a judge look for in the judging process? Over the next few months, I will bring a few technical aspects to your attention at our monthly meetings. However, these are only the tip of the iceberg.

Judges look at each quilt in a specific category before judging individual quilts. This brief look is an opportunity to view those quilts with strong visual impact. The visual impact of those outstanding quilts is the result of successful choices in color and design. As each quilt is individually evaluated, most judges take into account four elements of artistry: originality, creativity, design and workmanship.

Originality and creativity are the most difficult elements for a judge to define or for a quilter to learn and achieve. We all make creative decisions when we select fabric and colors. Common patterns can be morphed or combined with others to make an original design. Our Challenge quilts are great examples of original and creative quilts.

Now is your opportunity to submit your quilt to be judged. The comments made by our judges will help each of us to grow and improve our quiltmaking skills. By believing in your own work, learning from it, refining it, and striving to improve your quiltmaking skills, you too can construct a creative, original, prizewinning quilt.
