## December 2006 Program Ellen Anne Eddy

This month we welcome Ellen Anne Eddy to Santa Barbara to share her beautiful and unique machine embroidery and quilting style. Ellen is an internationally known fiber artist whose wall tapestries have transcended the traditional concept of quilting. Her designs are drawn from a mingling of the natural world with her dreams and personal visions. Using hand-dyed fabrics, lames, machine embroidery, reverse appliqué and layered sheers, she creates the illusion of ice, running water, mist and flame. The most outstanding feature of Ellen's work is the machine embroidery. Intricate stitching describes life in micro and macrocosm. Fish and bugs, lizards and birds weave in and out of the patterns, as a medium for social commentary and personal observation. Her works are vibrant and full of energy.

**January 12 Program**: Ellen Anne Eddy presents *Thread Magic* - A slide show and discussion of machine embroidery and quilting as a design element in contemporary quilting. Techniques discussed include stitch-in-the-ditch, echo quilting, quilting as line drawing, garnet stitch, machine beading, machine embroidery and machine embroidered appliqué.

**January 13 Workshop:** Ellen Anne Eddy's workshop today is **Thread Magic II**. She will teach solid thread-painted images to add amazing punch to machine quilted work. We'll utilize reverse appliqué techniques, embroidery skills, and thread painting skills to create solid shaded images and three dimensional appliqué with no size limitations and little or no distortion.

Check with Dorothy Fitch at the Guild meeting to see if there is still space available for this fun and creative workshop.

## Upcoming 2006 Lectures and Workshops

<u>February</u>: **Sue Nickels** returns to Santa Barbara to speak to us on **Following The Tradition – Machine Quilting**. The workshop she will be teaching is **Exploring Machine Stipple Quilting**: *All levels*. Free motion quilting is explored for background areas and all over surface designs. Ways to vary traditional stipple quilting will be practiced as well as fun alternatives. Some alternatives will include loopy meandering, psychedelic stippling, and curvy crosshatching. If you are looking for interesting ways to make your machine quilting different from the crowd, this will inspire you. Some free motion quilting will be reviewed, then jump into the fun with new ideas. More about Sue Nickels can be found at www.suenickels.com

March: Quilt artist Carol Anne Grotrian will present Quilts With A View: The New Landscape Tradition at our Guild meeting. Her workshop the following day is Picture Perfect Piecing. Start piecing a picture quilt with gentle curves and easy corners. Move on to adventurous hairpin turns and jagged peaks. Learn when to sew by hand or machine. Students will piece a landscape study from templates designed to cover the basic and advanced techniques Carol Anne uses to make her quilts. Her website is www.carolannegrotrian.com

April: Lujean Seagal will join us to present her lecture and workshop both entitled **Beyond Border Boredom**. The lecture will show us how to take an ordinary group of center blocks and transform them into an extraordinary quilt. Lujean says this workshop is her most popular and includes study of various borders and a 20-page workbook. We discuss the elements of different borders. Students will bring a UFO block or other center block to make a small wall hanging using new border designs. Discussion will be held on how to make a border fit your quilt and how to pick a design for your project. Students are encouraged to bring unfinished quilt tops in need of a border to discuss and employ various options. Visit her website at www.lujeanquilt.com



- Decorative threads; metallics, rayons, irridescents, both thick and thin.
- Monofilament nylon thread

#### Tools

- Embroidery hoop for sewing machines
- Sewing machine with darning foot
- #90 topstitching needles
- Extra Bobbins (5-10)
- 1 pair, scissors
- Lo Ran Needle threader
- Chenille needles (large eyed needle with a sharp point)

Ms. Eddy will have the hard-to-find items with her for purchase. She knows that the Fuse-A-Shade, especially, is difficult to locate.

## Santa Barbara Historical Museum TEAS & TOURS

In conjunction with the "Stitches in Time" Quilt Exhibition and Program Series at the Santa Barbara Historical Museum, September 2005-April 2006, the SB Historical Society is offering tours of two historic homes, the Fernald Mansion (1860) and the Trussell-Winchester Adobe (1854), followed by a Victorian Tea or Victorian Tea then dinner at the museum. "Stitches in Time" is in three parts: The first, PIECES OF THE PAST: EXTRAORDINARY QUILTS FROM THE 19TH CENTURY, was made up of treasures from the Museum Textile collection including a rare early 19th Century "Tree of Life" four-poster quilt and other examples from private collections (September 6-October 20). From November 20, 2005-January 22, 2006, VICTORIAN PATCHWORK: APPLIQUÉ AND CRAZY QUILTS will feature an extremely rare Baltimore Album-style black silk appliqué quilt. The final exhibit in the series, TEXTILE EXPRESSIONS: CONTEMPORARY ART QUILTS (February 10-April 16, 2006), is curated by Marinda Stewart.

#### TEAS AND TOUR SCHEDULE:

After spending time viewing one of the quilt exhibits described above, you will leave the Museum campus and proceed to the site of the Historical Society's two historic homes, the Fernald Mansion (1860) and the Trussell-Winchester Adobe (1854), just a short drive away, where Museum Hosts will guide you through the meticulously restored homes, followed by a sumptuous Victorian Tea on the lawn. If you have arranged for a VIP Tour package, you will return later in the afternoon for a dinner at the Museum, after a trip up State Street to shop or a self-guided walking tour of the Downtown Historic District, where the Museum is located.

## February 2006 - Block of the Month - Gift Boxes

(aka: Card Tricks)

Block measures 9 1/2 inches unfinished

This block uses 1/2-square triangles and 1/4-square triangles. Remember to cut the squares on the straight grain of the fabric and be gentle with the bias edges. Accurate cutting and 1/4 inch seams will make this block stitch together quickly.




## Cutting:

From EACH of four colorful holiday prints, cut:

One 3 7/8 inch square - cut diagonally into two triangles

One 4 1/4 inch square - cut into quarters along the diagonals, as illustrated below, to make four triangles. You will use only two of these triangles per print.






Background (white or cream) cut:

Two 3 7/8 inch squares - each cut diagonally into two triangles for a total of four One 4 1/4 inch square - cut diagonally into four triangles (see above). All four will be used.

## Assembly:

Lay out pieces to form four "gift boxes". Sew individual units, squaring each unit to 3 1/2 inches before continuing. Sew units together to form rows, and then sew rows together.



Embellish each "box" with ribbon, bows or holiday decorations just as you would when wrapping a present. These can be bits of real trim glued, fused or stitched on or done with thread using a satin stitch or other embroidery option.

## Community Quilts Project 2006

Thanks to all of you who made our Hospice project so successful last year. We collected a total of 212 quilts! Special thanks to Jean Faison, Dorothy Gibbons, Betty Kelley, Barbara Postma and Loesje Akau, who each made 6 or more quilts, and to Ky Easton, who made multiple quilts and all the quilt labels. The people at Hospice are overwhelmed with your kindness and generosity.

Community Quilts this year will be going to **The Linus Project** and to **Angels Bearing Gifts**. The Linus Project is a national organization with local chapters, which gives quilts and blankets to children from newborn to 18 years of age who are ill or traumatized. They recommend quilts 36 inches square for the babies and larger for the older children. All quilts must be new, and free of any scent or ornamentation. It is important that quilts be washed after quilting, and dried without using any scented dryer sheets. There is an *unlimited* need for quilts for the Linus project, and we are hoping that you will love the idea of making quick, easy baby quilts. We have already had great fun making sample tops



## Sue Nickels Workshop

February 10, 2006

## Machine Stipple Quilting and Much More! (All levels)



In this all day workshop, free motion quilting will be explored for background areas on your quilt and for overall surface designs. Traditional stipple quilting will be covered as well as many fun alternatives. Some of the variations include: loopy meandering, psychedelic stippling and curvy crosshatching. Students will make a small stipple sampler to showcase these techniques. If you are looking for ways to make your machine quilting different from the crowd, this will inspire you. Some basic free motion quilting skills will be reviewed, then jump into the fun!

## Supply List

SEWING MACHINE - bring instruction manual, extension bar or table and all accessories

DARNING FOOT- a MUST for free motion quilting

Straight stitch throat plate - optional, bring if you have one

Ten 12" squares muslin

Five 12" squares cotton or cotton blend batting

Thread - 50 weight cotton in off white and tan or gray. Optional decorative threads (variegated, etc.)

Sewing machine needles - I use 80/12 microtex for 50 weight cotton needles for decorative thread

50 safety pins - I use size 0 or 1

Rubber gloves - kitchen dishwashing gloves, size smaller than you wear.

Marking pencil - I use Quilter's Choice, silver

Ruler for marking straight lines, approx. 12"

Basic sewing supplies - scissors, bobbins, etc.

Extension cord Optional, but a good idea- small cushion for height, extra light

#### PROJECT- Prepare prior to coming to class.

Nine 7 1/2" squares cotton fabric in solids or tone on tone print

(Piece this into a nine patch, I use 5 squares one fabric and 4 squares another fabric.) \*see note below

One 25" square for backing fabric

One 25" square cotton or cotton blend batting

Thread for project

Baste this quilt project before coming to class
