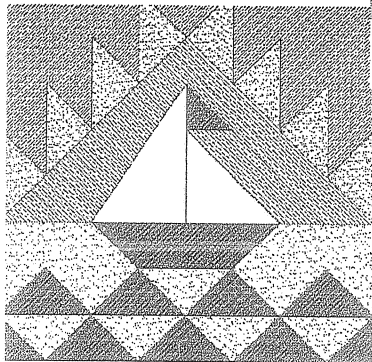

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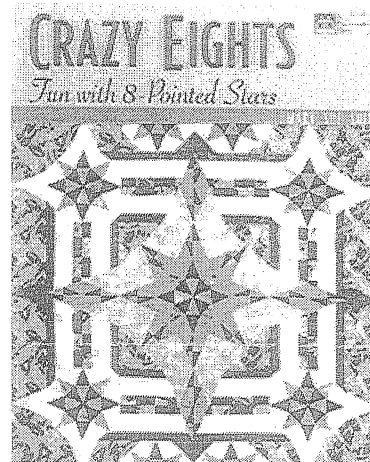
April 2007 Program—Mary Sue Suit (www.msquilt.com)

Our April speaker is Mary Sue Suit, master of the world of geometric piecing! Mary Sue has developed techniques and tools for making even the trickiest pieced blocks simple and fun to do. Check out her website and then look forward to her trunk show of outstanding quilts. Mary Sue says, “I always hesitate to call my speaking presentation a lecture, it is more of a trunk show with words. Sometimes the words have wit and wis-

dom, but the quilts are always a hit. I travel with as many as I can stuff into two suitcases and stay under the 50 lb. limit. The quilts cover all the techniques I have developed in my geometric quilt journey.”

Mary Sue hails from Alliance, Nebraska, and has been a featured speaker and teacher all over the country. Her workshop on Friday, April 13th, and is entitled *Crazy Eights Techniques*. She even makes

eight-pointed stars fun. Yes, I said FUN!

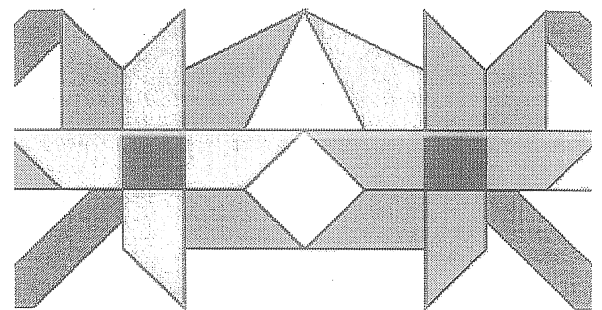

Adult Education – Spring 2007

Spring term is 7 weeks, beginning Monday, April 9th and ending Saturday, May 26th

Introduction to Machine Quilting – Marty Frolli

Quilting, whether by hand or machine, is the array of decorative stitches that secures the layers of the quilt top, batting and backing. Machine quilting allows the quilter to complete a project in a much shorter time than hand quilting. Basic straight stitching and free motion quilting will be emphasized. Sewing machine required, including walking foot and darning foot. *Recommended prerequisite: At least one quarter of Beginning Quiltmaking or the equivalent.* Begins April 10th, 7 Tuesdays, 9 AM – noon, Room T2, Wake Center, \$10

English Smocking, Heirloom Sewing and Classic Children's Clothing - Karen Hayes

Learn the stitches and basics of English smocking with a sampler and then smock a nightgown for yourself or daughter, or a baby bonnet, and sit back and listen to the compliments! French heirloom sewing is the modern way to reproduce all those lovely Victorian garments and home decorating items on a sewing machine in a fraction of the time spent when they were all hand-sewn. All levels of sewing experience are welcome! Begins April 10, 7 Tuesdays, 12:30-3:30 PM, Room 2, Wake Center, \$5

Power Stitches: Contemporary Machine Quilting - Kristin Otte

Learn the basics of machine quilting or expand your techniques in this hands-on class. Practice on samples and complete your quilt tops with newly acquired skills. Methods to be covered are straight-line stitching, stitch-in-the-ditch, preset machine patterns, free-motion quilting, as well as a discussion of materials and aids. This is a studio class with sewing machines available in the classroom. Begins April 11, 7 Wednesdays, 6:30-9:30 PM, Room T2, Wake Center, \$10

Rotary Magic Quilts – Marty Frolli

Master the key techniques of the rotary cutter, one of the most valuable tools of today's quilter! In addition, learn many basic quilt making skills while machine piecing some lap size, quick and easy quilts. Patterns include Rail Fence, Around the Twist and Irish Chain. *Recommended prerequisite: At least one quarter of Beginning Quiltmaking or the equivalent.* Begins April 12th, 7 Thursdays, 9 AM– noon, Room T2, Wake Center, \$10

Quilter's Workshop – Marty Frolli

You'll enjoy three hours of uninterrupted quilting bliss! Join friends in this non-structured class to complete projects from other quilting classes. Take advantage of the large tables to baste quilts or use the Bernina machines to do some machine quilting. *Recommended prerequisite: At least one quarter of Beginning Quiltmaking or the equivalent.* Begins April 13th, 7 Fridays, 9 am – noon, Room T2, Wake Center, \$10

Supply List: Mary Sue Suit's *Crazy Eights* Techniques Workshop, April 13, 2007

Fast and easy eight-pointed stars are a cinch with this strip technique. We will begin with the basic star and students can then choose to continue with the basic star or move on to one or two that are more intricate. There are twelve pieced stars included in the star sampler quilt.

The piecing is easy and Mary Sue's *Triangle Ruler* makes cutting fast and accurate. These 16-inch blocks are a must for anyone interested in a fast quilt with stellar appeal. The pieced diamonds can also be used to create row quilts and for border options. The workshop is suitable for quilters of all skill levels.

12 star blocks plus a border will make a 78" x 94" quilt, while 6 blocks makes a baby or lap quilt.

Some of Mary Sue's students have chosen to pool the class blocks for a community service quilt project. That way, students can learn the technique without having yet another project to finish!

Fabric:

Cut and bring to class: 2 strips 5-1/4" x width of fabric

1 of each color that will make up a star

2 strips of background fabric, 5-1/4" x full width

This is enough to make 2 stars.

Also bring an assortment of fabrics you would like to work with. Fat quarters work for most of the pieced diamonds found in the more intricate stars.

Other supplies:

Sewing machine and related notions

Rotary cutter and mat

Long ruler for cutting strips (8-1/2" x 24" is super, but any will do)

Square ruler, at least 8-1/2" x 8-1/2"

Mary Sue's Triangle, available for use during class, or for sale (\$11)

Paper bag for trimming scraps (keeps floor much less fuzzy)

Sense of adventure!

Workshops are held in Rooms 1 and 2 of the Goleta Valley Community Center, 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta, CA 93117. Please arrive by 8:45 AM to set up for the workshop, so that we may begin promptly at 9:00 AM.

Bring goodies to share; the Guild will provide coffee and tea.

Supply List: Linda Ballard's May Workshop –“Autumn Stars”

The Linda Ballard workshop on May 11th is called “Autumn Stars.” You can hand select the fabric for this quilt, making a scrap quilt, a multi-colored quilt, or a quilt with a color theme or line of fabrics. Yardage needed is minimal: one size is being offered in the class, but it can easily be adapted to a larger size. *When you sign up for the workshop, you will be given a detailed list of supplies and yardage needed.* Linda will share loads of super techniques with you for making this and other quilts. The skill level for the workshop is beginner-plus to advanced.

Supply List: Rob Appell's June Workshop— “Under Watercolor Quilts” (805) 772-2646 ext. 11, rob@thecottonball.com

This class will focus on the creation of a watercolor style background in the theme of the coral reefs. We will then have the option of applique and/or trapunto work on top of our background. We will be using 2” fusible grid interfacing as our base.

To determine how much grid is needed, figure the finished size of the quilt. Subtract the borders, then divide the size by 1.5. This will give the amount of squares you be using in your layout. If the number has a remainder, either round the number of squares needed up or down.

Supplies Needed:

2” Fusible grid interfacing – Enough for your background layout. (See formula above).

1/4 yards of the following fabrics, all pre-cut into 2” squares.

Please choose multiple fabrics of the following for color variation.

- Outer space
- Stars
- Sky
- Water
- Waves
- Underwater
- Several Reef/ rocks
- Any thing that has good color variation

Please pre-cut all your background fabrics into 2” squares

Fabrics for applique, NOT pre-cut into 2” squares. Please use your judgment for yardage

- Fish
- Waves
- Rocks
- Corals
- Batiks- large color range

A few yards fusible web, I recommend “Heat and Bond Lite”

Basic sewing supplies: Rotary cutter, ruler and matt, Sewing machine is optional.
