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## May Speaker: Marcia Stein

## Destinations: Travel-Inspired Quilts

Marcia Stein is a San Francisco textile artist whose award-winning work has been shown in a number of juried exhibitions at galleries, museums, and quilt shows throughout the country and is included in sevaral public and private collections

Marcia's recent designs combine her interest in photography with her quilt art, and she is currently at work on a series of pieces based on her photographs from Santa Fe, Italy, England, and the South of France. Her work focuses on storytelling through appliqué.

Originally from Chicago, Marcia is a graduate of the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor. She took up quilting in 1992, after a lifelong interest in other needle arts, and has been pursuing her interest in textile art full-time since 1996.

Her presentation, which includes a trunk show, will show us her favorite scenes and tells how she created the quilts they inspired.

## May 11 Workshop: Picture This!

Learn to machine applique a small quilt top using your own photo for inspiration. Choose among several methods of stitching: a narrow zigzag over raw, fused, and turned-under edges. Learn how to achieve depth, when and how to add design elements, and how to simplify your design without sacrificing its essence. No drawing skills required.

## Correction for May Block of the Month (Sailboat)

It has come to our attention that the stated dimensions for the sky / sail rectangle is adequate, but yields the incorrect dimensions for the needed triangles.

As stated in the BOM article, you are instructed to cut one rectangle $71 / 4$ " $\times 63 / 4$ "from each of the 'sky' and 'sail' fabrics. To be sure
you will have enough fabric cut your rectangles 7½"x 7".

## ASSEMBLY:

Draw a diagonal line from an upper corner to the opposite lower corner on the wrong side of the sky fabric. Match it with the same size sail rectangle right sides together. Stitch $1 / 4$ " from both sides of the diagonal line. Cut apart on the diagonal line. The resulting triangles are too large for the block. The triangle dimensions needed are base (width) 63/8" and height 67/8". You may find it easier to accurately trim the triangle to the correct dimension if you make a triangular template. Draw a right angle with a base of $51 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ and side of $6 "$. Connect both outer ends with a diagonal line to form a triangle. Next add $1 / 4$ " seam allowances on all three sides. Cut out this template. Lay the template to match the diago-
nal side and base of the fabric sky / sail fabric triangles you have just sewn and cut apart. Mark along the height of the fabric the amount of the extra width which needs to be eliminated to yield the base (width) of $63 / 8^{\prime \prime}$ and the height of $67 / 8^{\prime \prime}$. You should now be able to proceed with the sailboat directions as written in the newsletter.

Sorry for the confusion in the original directions printed in the April newsletter. I hope that this error hasn't caused too much confusion or frustration for you.

## Quilt Show News

Countdown: 4 months!!! Hopefully, everyone is in the final stages of completing their quilt entry for our September show. We are in the process of fine-tuning our Quilt Entry form, which will probably be included in the June newsletter. The same form will be used for all entries: quilts, wearable art and challenge quilts.

As many of you know, our speaker in February, Ann Turley, gave us a lot of information about quilt judging. I would encourage you to consider having your quilt judged, as the feedback you receive can be helpful to developing your skills in the future. And you may be one of the fortunate ones who win a beautiful hand-made ribbon! Also, here is a helpful hint: the only thing that the judge gets from your entry form is the name of the quilt, so give it a descriptive and meaningful title!

At our June meeting, we are planning a series of kick-off events for the show. Here's what you can look forward to:

- Advance ticket sales will begin (Do you know friends to whom you can sell?)
- Sign-ups for volunteers will begin (Where are you going to help?)
- Public relations will be asking for your assistance in spreading the word around town (see below)
- Boutique sign-ups will continue (will begin at the May meeting)


## Public Relations

To really make our show a success, we need to get people to attend, which means spreading the word in any way we can. We have postcards to distribute and soon we will have a poster to hang around town. We will have a display at both the downtown library and the Goleta branch in September and will be making "car posters" for you to put in your car as you drive around the area. During the month of September, we would also like to Blanket the Town with Quilts- so if you know of any art galleries, store front businesses, empty storefronts, etc. that might be likely places for a small display, please contact me. In 2010, we displayed quilts at Chaucer's on State Street and Front Page on Calle Real and would like to have several more this year. We will also need assistance in setting up these displays, so please contact me if you can help with this task.

## Satellite Group Quilts

As I announced at the April meeting, we have been contacted by a couple of Satellite Groups regarding group displays at the Quilt Show. In order to plan the space for these displays, please email me (kjpickford@cox.net) to let me know if your group is planning such a display. Please give the name of your group, a brief description of the display and the approximate space requirement. We think this is a great idea for telling about what we do as a guild, but like everything, we need to plan for it.

## Tickets

We have heard from many guilds that they are no longer providing free admittance to quilt show volunteers, but we have decided to continue this practice for the 2012 show. When you meet the volunteer criteria (see to-do section below), you will receive a free ticket to the show. However, we would like to encourage everyone to purchase a ticket for themselves, even if they do volunteer, as this is a fund-raising event, which allows us to have wonderful speakers, workshops and other events.

## To-Do List

As you know, our show is run by volunteers and your help is needed in lots of areas - even small things can be a big help. Please consider the following:

1. Choose the quilt you are going to enter in the show. We would like to have everyone represented! If it's not finished, you've still got time. The deadline for entries and photos is August 9, but the quilt does not have to be competed at that time (i.e., still time for quilting) 2. Start making a list of people to invite to the show. We will have pre-sale tickets available in June. Set a goal to sell at 5-10 tickets before the show. If we all do this, our show will be very successful. This is one way to earn a member ticket to the show. Contact Liz Turner if you are ready to start selling tickets.
2. Make something to sell in the boutique. If you don't wish to participate in this venture for your own benefit, consider making some items to directly benefit the guild. This is another way to earn a member ticket.
3. Start thinking about where you would like to volunteer for the show. There are plenty of jobs to go around, both before and during the show - and you can earn your free admission. Remember, we will need lots of able-bodied people on Friday to help hang the quilts.
4. Contact potential businesses where we can display quilts in our Blanket the Town with Quilts campaign.

As always, thanks for your help. The Quilt Show is a group effort, and I deeply appreciate the committee chairs and volunteers who help pull it all together.

## Block of the Month for June

## NOT SO SCRAPPY:

PANTRY JARS
After carefully tending our gardens all spring, our efforts are finally bearing fruit...and vegetables, too! Now we can fill our pantry shelves with oversize jars of food to enjoy throughout the year. Have fun with this not really very scrappy June block.


## ASSEMBLY:

To make the pantry jar: draw a diagonal line on the wrong side of the $11 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ background squares. Align a square in each corner of the food fabric block. Stitch along the diagonal line. Trim $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ from the stitching (toward the outer corner of the food square). Flip the corner patches right side up. Press. (This is just like a "snowball" block.) Stitch a $21 / 2$ " $\times 81 / 2$ " background piece to each side of the pantry jar.

For lid: stitch a $13 / 4^{\prime \prime} \times 4^{\prime \prime}$ piece of background fabric to each end of the $13 / 4^{\prime \prime} \times 5 \frac{112 \prime}{\prime \prime}$ piece. Sew this strip to the top of the bug jar.

## A Quilting Success Story

The guild's own Pam Holst had a quilt she made for a Blockheads exchange featured in the April issue of Better Homes and Gardens. She's modest and would have just let the whole thing come and go quietly, if not for the encouragement of her quilting friends. Here's in Pam's own words, is the story behind the motivation for making the quilt and where it is now.
"I do not own the quilt. It belongs to Kathy Rose. I was a new member to Blockheads and didn't know Kathy. At a Christmas meeting, names were exchanged for an 'inspiration challenge,' and I drew Kathy's name out of a hat. She gave me the cover of Better Homes and Gardens, a cover that she admired for its color, balance and subject. Other members exchanged words, photos, magazine articles, some idea that was to be transformed into a quilt of any size by the following Christmas. (My name was drawn by Jean Phillips and I asked her to make me a little quilt that would work in a mountain cabin.)

I worried for months about how to make glass balls that were floating in water look three-dimensional. I had never made an art quilt. I knew Kathy was a great quilter, and I didn't want to disappoint her. I, too, thought the cover really pretty, especially all the shades of blue. I pretended I was doing a bulletin board in my classroom; paper is easier to deal with than fabric. The fabrics were not difficult to find. used gray and white chalk to shade the cement bowl. Batik for the water, tiny turquoise and green beads for the small plants, bunched up green fabric 'pillows' for the big

## FABRIC:



Background: Plain black fabric
$\square$ Jar Lid: You will need one gray fabric


Jar Contents: You will need one $81 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 81 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ square of food fabric

## CUTTING:



" From gray fabric: 1 piece $13 / 4^{\prime \prime} \times 5 \frac{1 / 2 "}{}{ }^{\prime \prime}$
» From a food fabric: one $81 / 2^{\prime \prime} \times 81 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ square.

Then sew the $2 \frac{1}{2} 2^{\prime \prime} \times 12 \frac{1}{2} 2^{\prime \prime}$ strip to the top of the block. Sew the 1 $1 / 4^{\prime \prime} \times 121 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ piece to the bottom of the block. Press.

You should now have a $121 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ block.
If you have any questions or problems, please ask us.

plants, corded silk and a piece of trim for the hose, skipped the water ripples, and avoided the glass balls. A week before the exchange, I cut some circles for a batik I had in my stash, sewed coils in them to try and make them look spherical, and placed them on the cement bowl. I was totally surprised to find that they popped up as sewed around and around the outside base of each circle. For once, the poor tension on my machine was a blessing. Quilting around the hose and the beads was a chal-
 lenge, and I pieced the binding to match the pavement. But I got it done in time to present to Kathy, and she liked it.

Someone in Blockheads sent a photo to Better Homes and Gardens. Shortly afterwards, Kathy quit the group, but she let me borrow the quilt for the photo shoot. If it hadn't been for Kathy, I wouldn't have been in a magazine. The following year's Christmas challenge was an exchange of photos for a portrait quilt. I worried all year about that one too! "
