After the birth of her baby, she searched for a business that would enable her to stay home. Quilted photography was born. Tam-



mie has developed software that will take your photo, change it into a pattern using a variety of geometric shapes and provide coloration for each shape. She will share how to follow her pattern and make beautiful quilts. Tammie's lecture is funny, entertaining, informative and inspiring. She will share some of her latest guilts and explain the evolution of guilted photography from the beginning until now.

From the President's Desk

The New Year is typically seen as an opportunity to assess the choices we have made over the past 12 months (or longer) and determine a path forward. While many resolutions focus mainly on reversing negative trends (i.e. lose weight, get in shape and the like), I prefer to think about what ideas and activities will define the coming year. This year I'm considering several quilting resolutions to help me develop myself as a quilter.

- 1. Organize my fabric and get rid of fabric that I can't imagine using.
- 2. Take stock of my unfinished projects and get rid of those that I have no interest in finishing. Finish at least one this year.
- 3. Try more small experiments with guilt techniques. If I feel that they need to be useful, turn them into placemats or shopping bags.
- 4. Take one class per quarter to expose myself to new methods and be inspired by other quilters.

My best friend chooses a theme for every year, and then organizes her activities around this theme. I have decided that my focus this year is to create space for new things in my life. So my quilting resolutions will fit in with this larger theme.

Twenty-nine years ago, when I was working in the software industry, I realized that I had no significant female relationships. My work colleagues were primarily male and my pursuits outside of work were either athletic or solitary. While wondering where I would be likely to meet women, I walked by a quilt store. My first thought was that most quilters are probably women. Since I already sewed some of my own clothing, quilting seemed appealing, and so I signed up for my first quilting class.

I started guilting to fulfill a New Year's resolution and have received many surprising benefits. Your friendship and inspiration are among the best.

Robin Gallagher: KISS: Keep it Sew Simple

Beautiful quilts don't have to be difficult. Robin takes you on a journey showing you how quilting can be simple and fun. Sometimes what you see as a quilt block is a trick of the eye and is actually assembled in a very different way. Do you like quilts set on point but find it difficult to sew all those long diagonal strips together? Are set-in triangles a challenge? I will show you how I Keep it Sew Simple. 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2013 Challenge: Judging a Book by Its Cover

The 2013 Challenge event has been scheduled for June 2013. Here are some of the important criteria:

- Quilt design must be inspired by the cover of a book (quilt books excluded) but not be an exact replica of the book. You could be inspired by the color, graphics, title or anything else you find on the cover. We hope to NOT have 50 quilts in "shades of grey."
- The quilt must be 3 layers and quilted by hand or machine.
- The quilt must include a "recognizable amount" of the selected fabric (see photo), which features a navy blue background with colorful book spines forming circular designs.
 The exact amount of fabric that must be used will be determined and announced later.
 - The qualifying fabric must be used in the body of the quilt – using as the binding or backing do not count as meeting the fabric challenge.
 - Fat quarters of the fabric will be available for sale at the guild meetings for \$2. If you need to have the fabric mailed to you, please add \$1 and send your request to me at 980 Via Regina, SB, CA 93111.



- You will need to submit a full-size (book size), color copy
 or photo of the book cover that inspires your quilt, to be
 displayed alongside your quilt on the night of the Challenge.
- The quilt size cannot exceed 120" perimeter (for example, 30" x 30" or 20" x 40"). It cannot be smaller than 36" perimeter (9" x 9" or 8" x 10"). For those who haven't studied geometry in a while, perimeter is the entire measurement of the outside edge of the quilt all sides.
- The quilt, application form and photocopy of book will need to be submitted prior to the guild meeting on or before June 13, 2013. The exact date and location of drop-off will be announced at a later time.

Stay tuned for more updates as some of these rules may be clarified and modified as we determine the *need*. For now head to the bookstore or library and start getting inspired!



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Block of the Month for February PIECED HEART BLOCK



FABRIC


- White fabric
- Red Print fabric
 - Second Red Print fabric

CUTTING


- Cut 1: 2 ¾" x 2 ¾" White
- Cut 4: 1 ½" x 1 ½" White
- Cut 2: 2 ¾" x 4 ¼" Red Print
- Cut 1: 4 ¼" x 4 ¼" Red
 Print (Block A)
- Cut 1: 1 ¼" x 1 ¼" Red Print (Block B)
- Cut 1: 1" X 20" Strip of red print (Block B)
- Cut 1 1" X 20" Strip of 2nd red print (Block B)

ASSEMBLY:

Starting with the red rectangles, place a small white square (right sides together) on two corners and sew across the square as shown. Do not trim, press towards corner. Make two of these units.




Sew units together, (Block A) or piece the body of the heart as follows for Block B.




Start with the red 1 ¼" square, and piece Log Cabin style, adding each 1" strip, trimming even, and then pressing away from the center. Continue until six rounds of strips are added, alternating red fabrics. Unit should measure 4 ¼" square.

Sew this unit to the other units as shown above to make a block that is 6 1/2".
