


June Program: Annual Member Challenge - "Color Wheel Black Magic"

Friday, September 15, 9-3, \$50 members Julia McLeod: "Starting with Silk"

"Starting with Silk" - focus on other than cottons! Learn how to use <u>found</u> silk fabrics in quilt designs.

Julia will show us how to deconstruct pre-made silk items (think men's ties, old scarves ... time to go thrifting!) and prepare them for use in various quilting projects. (No silk...see below...) We will do some improvisational- and foundation-piecing exercises before working on a reconstructed pillow-sized finished piece.



There is no required kit, but the following will be available for sale at the workshop:

- curated silk packets \$15;
- Dupioni silk 1/2 yd cuts \$12;
- fusible interfacing \$4/yd.

Community stitches: quilt designs & stories

Pasadena Museum of History, March 8-September 10, Museum hours: noon-5 pm

This exhibit features more than 60 quilts representing over 180 years of quilt-making in America. Curated by Arlene Stevens and Leah Zieber of the California Heritage Quilt Project (for more on CHQP see page 8), highlights include treasures from the Museum's extensive textile collection along with select pieces on loan.

A special feature of the exhibition showcases three examples of community quilts that mark historic occasions – an institutional first, an anniversary, and a recreation of an historic artifact to share with future generations. Three very special quilts are in the exhibit:

 The JPL quilt which brought together a farreaching group of 153 employees, including both experienced and first-time quilters, who created a unique and meaningful welcome gift in 2022 for Dr. Laurie Leshin, the first female director of NASA's JPL in its then-86-year history.



- The Pasadena Community College (PCC) 75
 anniversary quilt (1999-2000), featuring signature
 pieces representing all departments on campus.
 It was designed by Bobbie Moon and Suzanne
 Bravender heading a team of 35 members drawn
 from the PCC parent-teacher organization and
 PCC staff.
- The Machado appliqué quilt, the oldest known surviving quilt to have been made in California and now part of the Old Town San Diego State Historical Park collection. It was made by Juana

Machado around 1850. The reproduction was

created to share this important and irreplaceable artifact with the public.

Block of the Month for July 2023 Patriotic Block

12" x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" unfinished)




Cutting

- White:
 - cut 12 2-1/2" squares
 - cut 4 2-7/8" squares
- Red:
 - cut 2 2-1/2" squares
 - cut 4 2-7/8" squares
- Blue
 - cut 10 2-1/2" squares

Assembly

- Make the two blue and white nine patches.
- Make 8 half square triangles with the red and white.
- Put the 2 7/8" white and red squares right side together. Draw
 a diagonal line across the white and sew a scant 1/4" on each
 side of the line. Cut on the line and press to the dark color. Sew
 it together following the picture with the red and white.
- Assemble the block as shown in the picture.

California Heritage Quilt Project

At a recent Guild meeting, I mentioned that CHQP was again becoming active. Several members were unaware of this project and I was asked to write an article for the newsletter discussing this group.

What is CQP? The California Heritage Quilt Project was established in 1984, organized and directed by quilters in Sacramento and N. California. The project's mission is to:

- seek and record the history of California quilts and quilt makers;
- foster conservation/preservation of the California quilt heritage;
- increase public awareness & appreciation of quilts;
- · encourage the art of quilt making.

What has CHQP accomplished during the past 29 years?

- In 1985-86, throughout California, 4300 quilts were documented through Quilt Search Days. Quilt Guilds assisted by holding documentation days - Coastal Quilters included. Many of the quilts are featured in Jean Ray Laury's book, "Ho, For California! Pioneer Women and Their Quilts".
- In 1989, CHQP began the Oral Histories of California Quilt Makers with over 700 accounts transcribed and deposited at the Lincoln University of Nebraska. A copy is also located at the Berkeley Bancroft Library.
- In 1996, the California Sesquicentennial Celebration Committee asked CHQP to create a tribute quilt to California history. During 1998-2000, this magnificent 10' x 10' quilt, made by 67 appliqué artists across CA and quilted by over 150 select quilters, toured the state. Over 4 million people viewed the quilt on its travels. It is now on permanent display at the California Museum and can be seen online through the kiosk CHQP maintains at the California Museum in Sacramento.

In the early 2000's, reaching a new generation was a priority which resulted in the development of a children's program. Lesson plans were developed based on the Sesquicentennial quilt and CA history. Presentations by Guild members in 4th grade classrooms allowed children to learn history, see slides of the quilt, participate in several related activities and hand quilt on a quilt supplied by the presenter.

After a few years of dormancy, CHQP has been invigorated by two ladies: Arlene Stevens and Rebecca Blosser here in Southern California. Arlene and Leah Zeiber are scheduled to speak at our November 9 Guild meeting to discuss CHQP and the Quilt Index, an international depository of quilts available for personal or scholarly research.

This is an on-going project. Our Guild may decide to have a documentation day to include personal quilts in the Quilt Index.
