### The Challenge:


- Using a black background, choose a color scheme from the color wheel and create a quilt.
- Emphasis on Analogous, Monochromatic or Ombre
- You may choose from the following sizes:
  - Placemat 12x16
  - Fat Quarter 18x22
  - Other
     No larger than 120 inches around

### The Challenge (continued)

- Other colors may be used for accent
- May be applique, painted, manipulated fabric, embellished, etc.
- The quilt should be three layers quilted, sleeve not required.
- Name, phone number and title should be put on the back right corner.
- Submit in a pillowcase labelled with name and phone number.

A placemat should have a place for plate and cup and napkin & a bit of whimsy—Bow on back. Professional label on back.



During the construction, it looked more like other things; an amoeba, a fried egg, a white blood cell, or just a strange blob. What do you see?






## EXPLOSION IN A PAINT FACTORY


Have had an ombre jelly roll forever and have used it the last two years on various projects. This is not the end, but getting close!








1<sup>ST</sup> PLACE


