





At the May meeting of the Board of Trustees, I had an opportunity to report the great success of the Quilt Show, Natural Impressions.







#### COASTAL QUILTER MEMBERS GO TO PADUCAH!

Eight of us from the Straight and Narrow sattelite group made plans in October 1990 to join thousands of other quilters in "Quilt City, U.S.A." - Paducah, Kentucky, April 24-28, 1991. In order to catch an early A.M. flight from LAX on Tues., April 23, we took the Airbus to the airport area on Monday afternoon. Our first flight on American to Nashville landed us there amid the greenest bluegrass country surroundings we had not imagined before. Because TVA developed so much water in that area, besides green foliage everywhere, they have automatic flushing toilets (every thirty seconds) in the airport rest rooms. Such a shock to us Santa Barbarans!

It was our good fortune to have reservations at the Kentucky Dam Village State Park, about 20 miles east of Paducah. This necessitated renting two passenger cars for us and our luggage. Our "executive cottage" was more than adequate - 3 bedrooms, each with 1 double bed + 1 twin bed, 2 baths, large living/dining room and large kitchen, and veranda overlooking the lake inundated each morning by 6 AM with fishermen and their boats.

Early on, all of us had enrolled in various classes, lectures etc., given by Helen Kelley, Doreen Speckmann, Nancy Pearson, Jeannette Muir and many others. Our early morning ride into Paducah each morning was one of the very nicest events - everything was green right up to the edge of the wide freeway.

One of our first stops was to the Hancock fabric store advertised in QNM every month. It is indeed huge with everything imaginable for quilters to buy for far less than California prices. Some of us even had to buy extra duffle bags in which to bring home all our goodies.

The townspeople of Paducah extended the famous Southern hospitality with smiles all the time, and friendly gestures of help. Assigned red jacketed Ambassadors were on hand everywhere. One evening going back to KDVSP when we stopped to consult our map with our dome light on, we noticed a car backing up toward us. The Ambassador asked if we were lost; when we said "Yes," he said, "Just follow me, and I'll head you in the right direction." Such courtesy!

The Methodist church served a wonderful dinner to us; their youth project for the week. The very old Episcopalian church ladies presented a great lunch with quilts hung all around their social hall. This church roof even had q quilt design! Zetta had recommended a few good restaurants: The Cracker Barrel and RubyTuesday's in the Kentucky Oaks Mall near the Rotary Club's special show of many old quilts. We discovered a perfectly charming upstairs lunch and dinner place, "Lillie Langtry's" where we also were entertained with musical show tunes AND excellent entrees at \$4.95! This was on Broadway in the oldtown

One of our outstanding experiences was the grand opening of the American Quilter's Association Museum in its new building. The AQA is hoping to attract the year round quilter with workshops, educational seminars and their library. Their prize winning quilt displays are wonderful beyond words. A book showing them is now available.


We were just a little tardy for the peak of the dogwood blooms, but we saw some gorgeous white and pink trees in blossom, as well as wonderful iris.


Our classes and quilt displays as well as the vendors were in the Executive Inn, the only big hotel in town. It is right on the Tennessee River where it empties into the Ohio River. In 1937 the rivers rose beyond flood stage causing a disaster in Paducah, and all residents were evacuated. The Red Cross helped them recover with the expenditure of  $\$1\frac{1}{2}$  million.

The Ninth Street House, which we had read about in the May <u>Victoria</u> magazine with glowing remarks, was somewhat of a disappointment, but we had Sunday Lunch there, followed by a tour of historic homes.

We caught the little American Eagle long before dawn in Paducah, and returned to Santa Barbara as Happy Campers all:
