Workshop: Appliqué for Realism

Charlotte Warr Andersen will join us on Sept. 13 for our Guild meeting and present a workshop on Thursday, Sept. 14. The topic Appliqué for Realism, is designed for quilters who already have some basic appliqué experience; our Santa Barbara quilt clearly demonstrates the high quality work of a number of our guild members who may well want to push their skills to a new level. Charlotte describes the workshop as "an intricate and tricky study in appliqué and reverse appliqué, but mastery of the technique is well-worth the effort." We will learn techniques for using photographs with a high degree of contrast to make realistic appliqué figures, such as she used in "Spacious Skies" (second place winner in the first Great American Quilt Contest) and "She Comes in Colors" (Best of Show, Masters winner in the 1990 AIQA show at Quilt Festival in Houston.)

Betty Kelley has donated **Appliqué Borders**, an **Added Grace** by Jeana Kimball. This is a wonderful collection of full–size pattern for appliqué borders. If you're looking for that finishing flourish, this is the book for you.

Ellen Richardson has donated Pattern on Pattern by Ruth McDowell. It explores ways of using traditional blocks in different scales to create reverberant patterns. Transparency is explored.

Quilted Sea Tapestries by Ginny Eckley. Techniques for machine embroidered design are used to create tapestries with an underwater theme.



CROSSROADS: Exploring Quilt Frontiers Just what is "Juried and judged" anyway?

Southern California Regional Show January 12-14, 1996 Ontario Airport Hilton

There have been many questions asked about what does "Juried and Judged" mean to a person entering a quilt into the Crossroads show. In this article we will define the terms, but first you should understand that the juried process helps foster excellence by encouraging the pursuit of knowledge and helping to improve quiltmaking skills.

The "juried selection" itself starts after the deadline for entries has passed. At that time the quilt show jury committee will review all entries and select those quilts which most closely meet the criteria as stated in the quilt show category descriptions and show theme, if there is one.

The quilter is notified, and those quilts selected for the show are given the necessary dates to have the quilts available for judging and hanging.

The "judging" occurs after the quilts are received on site. Quilt show judges who are selected by the judging committee set about the task of determining the best work amongst the entries presented. When a quilt of yours returns after this process, it will have a written evaluation as given by the judges.

In a national juried competition where there are thousands of quilts vying for sometimes only 20 spots, you quilt may get overlooked, but this show is only open to Southern Californians. Crossroads has been put into place to fill a major gap of judging quilt against peer quilts of similar quality and to help promote Southern California Quilters.

Yellow/Orange Challenge

Three months remain before the Yellow/Orange challenge is due! Our October program will be the showcase. So get started **now** if you haven't already done so.

The Rules

- 1. Quilt size: the length of the perimeter may range from 120" to 144" e.g. from 24" x 24" to 36" x 36", or any combination that equals the above perimeter.
- 2. At least 30% of the quilt front must be in colors of yellow, yellow-orange, and/or orange. This does not include tints such as cream or peach, nor does it include tones such as khaki or brown in other words, recognizable yellow, yellow-ornage, and/or orange.

Prizes offered will be for:

original design
most yellow and/or orange
most interesting use of yellow and/or orange
embellishments
technique/workmanship
most humorous
traditional design
viewer's choice





Grandmother's Fan


9-1/2" Unfinished

We usually have a few days of summer heat on which we could use a fan, so let's make some! The fan should be made from **solid Amish colors**, all different if you would like, appliqued on a **black background** by machine or hand. Try those fancy stitches on your machine that you haven't had time to try before. Embroider on seams between pieces, if you wish.

Assembly: Sew parts of fan together from one edge to other, fan style (See below). Press seams open. Sew 1/4" from scalloped edge of fan, clip curves and press under using stitching as guide for pressing. Pin or baste to lower right corner of background and sew down using suggestions above. Sew outside edges of fan to edges of background with narrow seam.
