

Paula Nadelstern Workshop

2 day workshop: \$50

In this 2-day workshop, Paula will teach how to design symmetrical repetitive blocks, the use of fabrics to enhance the design, and her special methods for machine piecing intricate designs.

"My ambition is to integrate harmoniously the idea of a kaleidoscope with the techniques and materials of quiltmaking. Making kaleidoscopes is like making magic with fabric! There is an element of "abracadabra" as the very last seam is stitched, because what you see in one single pieced triangular segment is not what you get in the multiplied sum. The whole is greater than the sum of its parts."

The Basic Kaleidoscope Intermediate to advanced skill levels

Supplies marked with a * will be available for purchase at the workshop. Template material and graph paper, try Blue Island.

Graph paper with 8-to-the-inch grid and a bold inch line (one sheet per student will be supplied)

*Two sheets of see-thru plastic template material with 8-to-the-inch grid and a bold inch line

*Bevelled, thin 12" x 2" ruler with accurate 1/8 -inch grid lines

Well sharpened pencils and eraser
*Extra-fine point permanent marker
White chalk pencil with a sharp point
*BIG protractor with notations for both
whole and half degrees

Fabric scissor
Template/paper scissor
Rotary cutting equipment
Compass

Sewing machine with accurate 1/4-inch guide

General sewing supplies Baggies to organize templates

<u>Fabric</u>: If it catches your eye, bring it! The palette of fabric does not have to match. Diversity is the key. Remember, more is more!

Important: Multicolored fabrics printed with at least 8 or 16 on-grain motifs which are identical and bilaterally symmetrical; in other words, the motif can be divided into identical halves by a line passing through the center. Also good: symmetrical patterns and mirror-imaged motifs printed off-grain (i.e.: paisleys). Also: a wide variety of 1/4 to 1/2 yards of small to medium allover prints, textures, gradations, stripes, marbled and stuff speckled with gold. Include rich, saturated jewel tones and painterly fabrics that evoke luminosity, translucence, iridescence.

Coastal Quilters Contribute to Heritage Quilt

Those of you who attended the Pacific International Quilt Show this October had a chance to view a truly amazing and beautiful quilt. The California Sesquicentennial Quilt was on display for all to see. Quoting from their brochure:

"In May of 1996, the California Sesquicentennial Commission asked the California Heritage Quilt Project to create a special quilt to reflect the 58 counties through picture images. Helen Powell of Sacramento agreed to take the responsibility of coordinating the project.

Ellen Heck, an award-winning quilt artist from Somis, CA was asked to design the quilt. She accepted, and, in turn, asked Zena Thorpe from Chatsworth, another award-winner, to help her. Under their direction, artists from throughout the state created the vignettes of their geographical area. Groups of appliquists created the individual border - the letters, fruits and vegetables. Zena worked on the Nevada side of the quilt and Ellen was in charge of the Pacific ocean and the State. Ellen and Zena combined the pieces on the State and they filled in with trees to cover the areas where vignettes joined.

Over the span of 15 months a pictorial masterpiece was created by these 67 quilt artists. More than 150 selected quilters from Northern CA quilted over 1000 hours to create the 9'8" by 10'2" quilt.

The quilt will tour CA until Admission Day, Sept 9, 2000 and then will hang in the CA State Capitol for future generations to admire."

Coastal Quilters also has some bragging rights thanks to the contributions of some of our fine appliquists. Lena Scharfeld, Karin Cooper, Melody Bollay, Pat Masterson and Barbara

Maxwell all contributed their skill to this project. Among other artists are teachers we have enjoyed as program and workshop presenters. Dixie McBride, Moneca Calvert, Judy Mathieson, Jean Ray Laury and of course, both Ellen Heck and Zena Thorpe are included in this group. At the present time we are trying to arrange for a display of this quilt in Santa Barbara.

6" Square Holiday Fabric Swap Features Pine Needles

Norah feels quite proud that her idea of swapping star fabric at last years Dec mtg was so well received, not to mention that lots of people told her they actually used the fabric in a quilt! So, hoping to do as well this year and using her prerogative as president, she's designated this the year of the pine tree. Any color, any style, any size - as long as it has needles (ha ha) you can swap it at the Dec meeting.

If you are new to the group, the rules are:

- Pine trees must be part of the printed pattern of the cloth
- Fabric must be new, good quality, 100% cotton
- Fabric should be prewashed and color fast
- Cut Fabric into accurate 6" squares

The way it works:

- Come to the <u>December</u> meeting wearing a square of your fabric pinned to your garment
- Bring as many squares as you'd like to swap in a little bag.
- Trade with other Guild members who are wearing fabric squares you'd like to add to your collection.



Helpful Hint: Quilt a thread above or below your quilting lines drawn with a pencil. If you sew thru the line, the thread will get dirty with lead

A HOMESPUN CHRISTMAS

The days are short ... the nights are long. Here in Southern California the stars shine ever so brightly in our dark dark sky.

Our star is made of plaids, checks, dots or stripes in beige, yellow or mustard. The center could be a contrasting fabric in the same color family. It shines on a dark background - i.e. black, blue, green, purple, burgundy. Plaids would be nice. NOTE: please no shiny materials. We are looking for the Red Wagon look.

Size: 7" by 8 1/2"

Constructions: 1. Sew A and AR to B

2. Sew CR to DR


3. Sew C and ER to Center

4. Sew step 2 to step 3

5. Sew D and F to E

6. Sew the three sections together

(Since I was making only one block, I used freezer paper templates.)


THANK YOU!!!
