ELLEN HECK'S SUPPLY LIST

Appliqué needles - Piecemaker or John James size 10 or 12 Small sharp scissors

Note paper and pencil

Freezer paper

Thimble

Thread to match fabric (Mettler silk finish cotton)

Embroidery floss in different colors Graphite paper for dark background

FABRIC

One piece of background fabric 20" x 30" Small pieces of various colors, for flowers, stems and leaves (fabric with many shades is a good choice)

Note: Tightly woven fabric for stems is easier to work with (for example: batiks).

- Oleta Bennett was the final winner in the year 1999. She won two Quilting books. Member donation.







Introduction to Machine Quilting Quilting, whether by hand or machine is the array of decorative stitches that secures the layers of the quilt. Machine quilting allows the quilter to complete a project in a shorter time than hand quilting. Basic straight stitching and free motion quilting will be emphasized. Required: sewing machine-in good working order, (Have it serviced if necessary.), feed dogs must drop, darning foot (Often included in basic machine feet.), walking foot (Newer Pfaffs have a built in walking foot, other models need an attachable walking foot-usually a separate purchase.). Not necessary to bring machine to the first class.

Two Color Quilts



In this class, we will piece some of these traditional two color quilts, mimicking the turkey reds and indigo blues of the mid 19th century with contemporary fabrics. 

Cutting Instructions

- 1. A Piece: Cut 4-4 1/2 " squares out of background fabric; cut 1-4 1/2" square out of star fabric.
- 2. B and Br Piece: With wrong sides together, cut 4 B/BR pieces, out of star fabric, yielding 8 pieces.
- 3. C Piece: Cut four C pieces out of background fabric.

Piecing:

- 1. Sew a B and a BR piece to each side of the C piece. Press.
- 2. Sew the block together as a nine piece block as shown in the diagram.
- 3. 12 1/" star.

Library Corner



We have many beautiful books on applique in our library. Judy Stanton gave us the latest one, a 1999 publication, FANCY

APPLIQUE by Elly Sienkiewicz, because she bought a copy when she already had one. (How many of us have done that!) Thank you, Judy! Elly is remembered for her embroidery work in the 70's. This book incorporates embroidery but concentrates on teaching applique techniques both fundamental and advanced. She is an inspiration. If you check it out, be sure to read her story in the preface and introduction of her growing up with her Scots grandmother. It is like a visit with two wise and creative women.

SNIPPET SENSATIONS by Cindy Walter fits in with today's wildly ranging stretch of the quilt arts. She calls it, "fast fusible art for quilted or framed projects." No sewing is required. Inspired by impressionistic painting, Cindy uses two-sided fusible webbing to paint with fabric. You can design as traditionally as you wish, though, and machine quilt but it isn't necessary. Some of the projects just call for matting and framing and they are handsome indeed.

Speaking of machine quilting, we have acquired that enticing book with the colorful cover, MACHINE QUILTING WITH DECORATIVE THREADS by Maurine Noble and Elizabeth Hendricks. Dazzling, eyecatching quilts using rayon, silk, neon threads, fine and heavy metallic threads, two threads in one needle, twin needle stitching, ribbons and flat braids, free-motion stitching...it begins to make one dizzy! Are you up to it? Take a look.

Ah, another new book for us, EASY PAPER-PIECED MINIATURES by Carol Doak calms the nerves with good, old, timeworn patterns and paper piecing- like a hot cup of tea in the afternoon. What bliss. And as she says, "Sewing miniature patchwork isn't any more difficult than sewing full-size patchwork- you just stitch shorter seams." Chaucer's Books carries the special companion to the book of Carol's prepackaged foundation papers for each of the 17 quilts described for a very small price (no pun intended) or you can copy her full-size patterns in the book.


A reminder that you can check out as many books as you want, you can renew books, but overdue books carry a \$2.00 fine per month... and fine money is used to buy new books.


