

His lecture 'Quilter in a Strange Land' is most entertaining and includes a wonderful trunk show of quilts. Quilting in America has been developed and practiced almost exclusively by women. Before there was such a thing as a quilt 'industry', men had little or no interest in quilts. As quilting

became more of a business, however, men are entered the arena in greater numbers. In this lecture Joe will talk about how and why he got interested in quilts, as well as some of the issues that arise when men enter a traditionally female domain.

Joe's Workshop on quilting design will take you to the next level toward finishing your tops and making them real Quilts! A must for quilters who like to have fun while making their designs uniquely their own.

July theme and display: First Quilts by Members. Everyone's invited to bring their first quilt for display or Show and Tell... Yes. We would love to see your early work too.





# Getting to Know Us

he person who is so ably taking us along the path to Harvest of Colors 2000 is Leslie Hogan.

When Leslie was born, her father was a marine, stationed at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. His tour of duty ended, thankfully, when she was but two months old. She says thankfully, because he missed being shipped to Viet Nam. After leaving the military, they moved to New Mexico, where he worked for the highway department. After a couple of years, they moved to Oklahoma, where she was raised.

Leslie obtained a Bachelor's degree in music from the University of Kansas. From there, she went to the University of Michigan to do graduate work. She received a Master's in music and a Doctorate in Musical Arts. After leaving Michigan, the job market was grim, so she went home to Oklahoma and lived with Dad for a year, and did substitute teaching. She was able to obtain a temporary position at a State College in Oklahoma for one school year.

In the meantime, UCSB was conducting a national search for a music composition teaching post. She was interviewed, hired, and came to Santa Barbara, starting in September of 1995. Leslie won an award from the American Academy of Arts and Letters, which helped in repaying student loans.

She grew up surrounded by quilters. Her maternal Grandmother had six aunts who were phenomenal quilters. On the paternal side, both Great Grandmothers were avid quilters. Leslie has shared some of those quilts with us at Guild.

At age six, both she and her nine year old sister were taught to use a sewing machine. Their projects were to make tiny doll quilts. Leslie was given four inch squares, and her older sister two inch squares. They both learned dressmaking, but Leslie says her sister was the star in

that field. Leslie learned to knit, crochet, embroider, needlepoint and beadwork.

Sister Laura belongs to a quilt guild in Wisconsin, and when she told Leslie about the fun things she was doing and learning, Leslie decided to join our guild, to learn and to meet people.

She loves to explore country roads, though we don't have many of those in our area, and also to hike. She says even exploring downtown is a joy.

Leslie just joined Coastal Quilters in January of 1998, and look what she has done, so far!

#### Linen Storage

When storing your vintage linens over long periods of time, it is important to store them unstarched. Silverfish just love a good meal of starch, they also eat the fibers of your linens as they are snacking. Also, rolling your linens will help prevent "fold marks" which are created from dust and moisture. You can store linens in cotton pillow cases or sheets - plastic is not recommended. Also avoid storing your linens directly on wood, as the acid content in wood or varnishes can cause your items to discolor.

The best you can do for your linens is to use them and love them.



#### September Workshops

Elly Sienkiewicz, our guest speaker for September, has been designing and making quilts, studying, writing and teaching quilt making for two dozen years. Her creativity has fueled 15 books on appliqué, both fine and folk. We are delighted that Elly's busy schedule this year includes a lecture and two workshops for Coastal Quilters Guild. Sign-ups for the September Elly Sienkiewicz workshops will begin at our July guild meeting.

The following is a brief description of both workshops. On Thursday, September 14, Elly will teach BURST INTO BLOOM-TWELVE EASY WAYS! This happy folk art project class is full-budded with appealing appliqué methods. Make a spring fresh pillow front, 'Dutch Bulbs a-Bloomin'. The pattern is from Elly's award-winning appliqué book, Appliqué 12 Easy Ways! Color it your way: Amish, water colored, homespun, 1930's---whatever. Elly shares twelve sure-fire skills including transparency appliqué, grain placement, superfine self-stuffed stems and

curvaceous edges. Even design an optional paper cut frame to border this block with cutaway appliqué. The skill level for this upbeat class is confident beginner to advanced.

On Friday, September 15, SPLENDID THEOREM APPLIQUES! will be the workshop. Apply dramatic appliqué techniques to 'Wendy's Fruit Bowl' or another fruit block from Elly's book. The Best of Baltimore Beauties. These graphic album blocks teach light source, freezer paper on top or inside, print windows for realistic fabric use, and focus on antique theorem-style fabric shading using the new oil intensive Craypas Specialist pastels. Learn how to make fruit appliqués that look like old masters. The skill level of this workshop is confident beginner to advanced. (Elly suggested this workshop when she learned that our guild has a number of experienced appliqué members, but remember, this block would make a wonderful pillow or framed wall piece for those who are not working on a Baltimore Album quilt.) As some of you know, I am a professional composer, collaborating constantly, whether with performers for my own music, choreographers, visual artists, poets, conductors, my students, or my colleagues at UCSB. I find the process tremendously rewarding in ways impossible to enumerate.

This quilt show is also a collaboration. As we move into high gear (once the application forms are all in--July 15-- the intense work will begin) I urge all of you to keep in mind four important precepts that make any collaboration successful and that will make THIS collaboration successful.

I. COMMUNICATION: Talk to each other. If you're a committee chair, keep in touch with the members of that committee, even if there's nothing much happening. If you're a member and feel you don't know what's going on, call your chair and ask. If you have experience from the last show to share, whether you're serving on that committee this year or not, talk to the current committee. Bounce ideas back and forth. Don't let small misunderstandings fester and become major problems. Everyone's input is essential.

II. COOPERATION: Responsibilities need to be shared equally, as doing otherwise will lead to resentment on the part of those who end up doing the work. Be realistic in what you take on: for example, if your daughter's getting married in July, then offer to do work in September.

III. COMPROMISE: Everyone's input is essential, but no one person can expect to have things go exactly as she wishes. If you deadlock, call me and/or bring it up at a general quilt show meeting. There's always a middle ground.

IV. COURTESY: Be kind. Be fair. Support one another. If something happens and you can't complete a task, talk to your committee chair or to some other member of the committee as soon as possible so that the task can be reassigned. Life takes unexpected turns sometimes; we all know that!

The next meeting of the Quilt Show Committee will be July 18, 2000 at 7:00 PM in the Samarkand Craft Room.

variety. There are lots of tips on appropriate restoration in our guild library.

A BOOK on quilt restoration is valuable resource on many levels...repairs to the top, restuffing lost batting, correcting distortions, removing stains, vacuuming or dusting, replacing blocks of pieces and for making binding repairs that are appropriate to the age of the quilt. All you questions can be answered as to the care of quilts. Of course, one of the first questions that arises is, "will repairs devalue my antique quilt?" That is a question best answered by the experts and appraisers. For treasures that get loved and laundered, restoration can keep them usable with a small investment of your time -- part of the pleasure of handling fabrics.

DID YOU KNOW that bindings on quilts changed over time? In the 1700-1860 bindings were applied separately, a narrow 1/8" - 1/4" or twill tape was used. Straight grain fabric, scallops, prairie points, half-circles, and hand knotted macramé & lace edging were popular. From 1870-1910 twill tape was seen less: bindings became wider 1/4" to 1/2" straight grain strips or continuous strips. By the Victorian era, 1880-1900 bindings on velvet quilts were often self-bound from 1/2" to 15" wide with mitered corners, 4 separate strips for edges was common as was hand knotted silk twist or lace, ruffles from ribbons or folded silk/taffeta/moiré or satin. Were the Victorian ladies showing off their find dressmaking and embroidery skills? We will find out when future guest lecturers tell all about crazy quilts. From 1920-1940 pre-made bias bindings of 1/2", 3/8" and 1" were popular. Again, scallop edges, four separate strips of a wider size and back-to-front bindings are seen. Do any of these bindings tickle your fancy for finishing your most recent quilt or in repairing an older quilt? All you need is motivation, patience, common sense and simple sewing skills. Among the books on restoration, check out Quilt Restoration, A Practical Guide by Camille D. Cognac, where you will find oodles of information, even motivation for a new quilt!

#### **Spot Check**

Behold the power of bleach. Yes, bleach is probably one of the greatest marvels for getting out stains. Clorox makes an industrial strength bleach which really seems to do magic compared to some other bleaches. Sometimes it is only necessary for a little spot bleaching. depending upon the colors and integrity of the fabric or you may want to soak the whole item in a bleach solution. For spot treatment, you can mix a solution of half bleach and half liquid detergent in a spray bottle and spray on troubled areas. Make sure you have plenty of fresh air! Many of the vintage printed tablecloths are quite color safe, however, bleach is not always the first option. It can be too strong for some textiles. Always rinse, rinse, and rinse again. Bleach will deteriorate fabrics more rapidly if left in the fibers. Use your discretion and test a very small area first.

Oleta Bennett was all smiles as she accepted fat quarters from Quilter's Cupboard of Atascadero and two Southwest Patterns.



#### Information

This exhibit is a members' showcase, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) can be currently unfinished or in process but must be completed by collection time. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected by lottery according to size. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority. Please attach a color photograph of your quilt to your entry form.

For purposes of this show, a quilt is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back held together with stitching and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels, tied quilts, and entries made from kits will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does not cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring her own quilt(s) for loss and damage.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Sleeve: A 4" sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited. Sleeve construction: Cut fabric 9" by the width of the quilt less 2". Stitch a narrow hem on each end of the strip. Fold the strip in half lengthwise and stitch a 1/2" seam on the right side of the fabric, creating a long tube. Press the tube flat. Hand-stitch the top and bottom of the sleeve across the entire width of the quilt. Be sure the sleeve ends remain open for insertion of the hanging rod. Your finished tube will be approximately 4" to 4-1/2" wide.

Packaging: Each quilt should be delivered in its own pillow case with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

Details on quilt collection will be provided by September 1st.

#### **Liberated 5-Pointed Star**

Difficulty:

Moderate to Strenuous, depending on your geometry skills. The more you make, the easier they get.

For those of you who've taken Maggie's Mariner's Compass class, assembly of this star is done using the same method. You don't have to follow the exact directions for assembly of the star if you find an easier method. This is the

easiest method for me to follow.

Colors:

Background: dark, preferably black or dark blue

Star: at least two different colors, one for center of star and one for points

Supplies:


Freezer paper, pencil, ruler, paper scissors.

1. Cut a 12" x 12" square of freezer paper.

2. Using a ruler, draw a liberated 5-pointed star. The only rule is that the fifth line has to connect to the first line.


3. Label the lines 1 through 5, starting with one line and following around the star. Label both sides of the line, a few places along the line.

4. Extend lines 1 and 3 to both edges of the freezer paper. Extend line 5 to one edge as shown.



- 5. Label each piece of the star with a letter as follows: (see above)
  - a. Outside of line 2 label with letters A, B, and C
  - b. Body of star inside of line 2 label with letters D, E, and F
  - c. Outside of line 1 label with letters G and H
  - d. Outside of line 3 label with letters I, J, and K

- 6. Cutting:
  - a. Cut along line 3
  - b. Cut along line 1
  - c. Cut along line 2. You will now have four pieces of freezer paper.
- 7. Start with A-B-C piece. For simplicity, I deal with one piece at a time. Draw a single dash between pieces A and B that extends into both pieces. Draw 2 dashes between pieces B and C.



Cut apart A, B, and C. Press each piece of freezer paper to wrong side of selected fabrics. A and C will be background pieces, and B will be a star point. Cut fabric around piece, LEAVING APPROXIMATELY A 1/4" SEAM ALLOWANCE.

Pin A and B with right sides together, matching points carefully. It helps to put a pin straight through the corner of one piece, right outside the freezer paper, and straight through the corner of the facing piece. Do this at both ends of the seam. This will keep the pieces aligned properly as you pin them together. Use the dashes to help with proper placement. Sew along the edge of the freezer paper. Press seam toward outside of star. Pin piece C to joined piece of A&B. Sew and press.

8. Repeat above step for other 3 pieces of freezer paper, remembering to add the dashes before you cut apart the freezer paper to help with assembly.

For piece I-J-K, pieces J and K should be sewn together first. Then, piece I should be added.

Seams for the points should be pressed toward the background fabric. The center of the star should be pressed away from the point.

- Sew A-B-C to D-E-F, matching connecting lines and points.
   Sew G-H to above piece.
   Sew I-J-K to rest of star.
- 10. Remove foundation.

Unfinished block size: 12.5" x 12.5" Finished block size: 12" x 12"
