She is looking forward to coming to Santa Barbara and hopes the weather will cooperate as she would love to spend some time on the beach.

"Fabric Play"

Reynola believes that "your fabrics have a world of information to communicate to you." In her workshops she helps the student develop her listening skills in the subtle world of fabric interplay. She gives you the opportunity to practice fabric communication skills that help you see the interplay & excitement that fabric colors, textures & values generate, as well as learn to listen, manage & develop that subtle interplay for your own quilts.

This one-day class demonstrates the process from that selected wonderful "theme" fabric, analyzing the support fabrics that make it work, suggesting types of blocks or quilt designs for the fabric run; & finally the value strategies of arranging into the quilt top. The participants will go through this same process with guidance of the teacher & interaction between quilters.

Supply list:

- Sewing machine (in good working order with spare needles)
- Rotary Cutting Supplies ruler, cutter & mat
- · Sewing Kit Pins, Thread, Needles
- Fabric & Paper Scissors
- · Design Wall/Fleece to design on
- Masking Tape
- Pins
- · Template Material
- · Note taking supplies

Fabric run to analyze:

- 16+ fabrics with variety of values (light, medium & dark), texture, size of motifs, density, movement (stripes, plaids & florals, & character to support your chosen theme or idea fabric. More variety is better than less, in fat quarter to ½ yard amounts.
- Optional pictures, books or magazines of block or quilt ideas.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break.

Reynola believes that "your fabrics have a world of information to communicate to you." In her workshops she helps the student develop her listening skills in the subtle world of fabric interplay. She gives you the opportunity to practice fabric communication skills that help you see the interplay & excitement that fabric colors, textures & values generate, as well as learn to listen, manage & develop that subtle interplay for your own quilts.

This workshop is planned to help the quilter learn to machine piece two sizes of curves using a versatile block to form diagonal line or meandering paths. The class devotes much time to analyzing fabric choices, design composition & values.

Supply list:

- Sewing machine (in good working order with spare needles)
- Rotary Cutting Supplies ruler, cutter & mat
- Sewing Kit Pins, Thread, Needles
- Fabric & Paper Scissors
- · Design Wall/Fleece to design on
- · Masking Tape
- Pins
- Freezer Paper for making templates
- Note taking supplies

Fabric run:

- Might be an expanded color run (for example: blue (light, medium & dark, including blue-green & blue-violets).
- Perhaps a collection of "special fabrics" or fabrics you want to "show off" in a quilt. Be sure to bring some "support" fabrics for them (color related, but lower design contrast such as tone-on-tone.
- Design collection (for example: a wide variety of circles or dots or a plaid collection.)

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break.



Workshops



Both January's workshops with Reynola Pakusich cover how to make the most of your fabric, how to listen to your fabric and let the fabric design the quilt. Friday, Jan. 11 - Reynola Pakusich Fabric Play - This one-day class demonstrates the process from that selected wonderful "theme" fabric. analyzing the support fabrics that make it work, suggesting types of blocks or quilt designs for the fabric run; & finally the value strategies of arranging into the quilt top. The participants will go through this same process with guidance of the teacher and interaction between quilters. Saturday, Jan. 12 - Revnola Pakusich Serpentine Workshop - This workshop is planned to help the quilter learn to machine piece two sizes of curves using a versatile block to form diagonal line or meandering paths. The class devotes much time to analyzing fabric choices, design composition & values. Friday, February 15 - Carolyn Dahl Crayon-Colored Vest - A simple technique using fabric crayons, this one-day workshop covers a transfer method of applying a design to fabric. The technique can be used alone, or combined with other methods or piecing. This is a good place to start for beginners or a new technique to try for the more experienced wearable artist. Carolyn Dahl has experience in all sorts of surface

Strong enough to withstand adversity,


Durable enough to last a lifetime,

Quilting Tip Up Your Sleeve!

Tired of having to put two nails in the wall to hang your wallhangings? Here is a simple tip passed on to me by Bonnie Cole from Cabin Fever Quilters, my satellite group here in Maine. Measure the wallhanging width and cut your sleeve 3" (or so) shorter then this measurement, then cut into two equal halves. Finish the raw ends. Center the two halves on the back of the quilt leaving about a 2" space in the center and sew the sleeve on as usual. You can now hang your quilt from either the center or the ends. Voila! Only one nail in the wall that can be used for all wallhanging sizes.




Volunteer Opportunity





February 2002 Block of the Month Hearts Galore!

This is an appliqued heart pattern. You can applique any way you like - by hand or machine.

The colors for this block will be reds – any shade – white, red, pink, burgundy, etc. Each block requires only two fabrics, and it doesn't matter which is the background and which is the heart. The darker or the lighter fabric can be used for either.

For the background: Cut a rectangle 8 inches by 11 inches.

Cut out the heart on this page to use as a template. You'll need to add a 4-inch seam (approx. allowance when you cut your fabric heart.

The heart should be centered on the rectangle, with the short end going horizontally and the long end going vertically, as shown.

Unfinished block size: 8 inches by 11 inches Finished block size: 7.5 inches by 10.5 inches


Heart Template
