

## February Meeting

This month's speaker, Carolyn Dahl, comes to us from Houston, Texas but her face may be familiar from her many television appearances on HGTV and Simply Quilts. Carolyn loves to play with fabric and paints, dyes, crayons, photo transfer--almost anything she can think of and she's put it all in her book, Transforming Fabric, for quilters and crafters alike. Thursday evening Carolyn will tell us the captivating story of her creative journey from theatre arts to textile design. A self-confessed cloth addict, she'll explain why she loves to paint and embellish fabric, tell us the tale of the beautiful butterfly on her book's jacket, and explore her belief in the "dye devil."

Her interests extend from silk to Japanese fish printing (with fish, not on them!) to wearable art, and, of course, quilts. The lecture will be a visual survey of the art and craft created on cloth by Carolyn's hands. Her workshop the following day, "Crayon Cloth," will give us all an opportunity to join her in 'play." Carolyn says "you never outgrow your need for crayons or coloring" and promises we'll re-discover our childhood spontaneity through a variety of techniques we'll learn in class. We'll color, make rubbings, overlay colors, try lace transfers, do precise placements, and on and on. You can use these methods to prepare cloth for a "Crayon

Vest" or simply make fabric for quilts. You could produce some "knockout" quilt labels! These techniques will lend themselves to totebags, cushions, fabric boxes, picture frames, or anything covered or sewn of cloth.

All in all, the focus of Carolyn Dahl's visit to Santa Barbara will be an invitation to liberate our innate ability to be creative by having fun. Be sure to be part of it. Call Kristin Otte 683-4390 to enroll in the workshop. The supply list is minimal.



## Carolyn Dahl Workshop

### "Crayon Colored Vest"

Friday, February 15, 2002, 9 am. - 3:30 pm.

Goleta Valley Community Center, 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA

A simple, accessible technique using fabric crayons, this one-day workshop covers a transfer method of applying a design to fabric to make into a vest. The technique can be used alone or combined with other methods or piecing. This is a good place to start for beginners or a new technique to try for the more experienced wearable artist. Carolyn Dahl has experience in all sorts of surface design and many hints to pass on.

#### Supply list:

Crayola™ Fabric Crayons Sulky<sup>TM</sup> Iron-On Transfer Pen Pencil & Eraser Masking Tape 1 pkg. White Tissue Paper

Vest Pattern - avoid darts if possible

Large sheets of white paper on which to trace pattern (butcher paper works well; avoid coated papers)

Typing paper – we can share

Textured objects to make rubbings: crochet work, lace, net, textured fabric, puzzle pieces, etc.

Photocopies of possible designs to put on vest: pages from coloring books, magazine pictures, drawings, stencils, fabric designs, etc.

Fabric: see vest yardage. Must be white, smooth weave, washed & ironed, 100% polyester or a 65% polyester/35% cotton blend.

Bring to class: Trace the vest front pieces & the back (eliminate back seam if possible) on white paper, adding about 1/2" all around the pieces.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break. Questions? Call Kristin Otte, 683-4390.

#### Caryl Bryer Fallert Workshop

#### "Free Motion Machine Quilting"

Thursday, March 7, 2002, 9 am. - 3:30 pm.

Goleta Valley Community Center, 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA

Various methods of machine quilting will be introduced & demonstrated in this class, & you will have a chance to make a small sample of each one. Major emphasis will be on free-motion (feed-dogs down, hand guided) quilting. Workshop will include a slide lecture full of information & inspiration. Her website is www.bryerpatch.com

Supply List: Sewing machine: One that is clean, friendly & well adjusted. Must be able to do free motion. A zig zag, as well as straight stitch will be useful but is not absolutely essential. You must know how to operate your sewing machine. You must have at least one free motion foot for your machine (open toed is preferred, but closed is ok), Big Foot, quilting foot, etc. You must know how to operate your machine in "free motion" mode. Caryl is not familiar with all makes & models of machines & may not be able to figure this out for you. Please check with your dealer ahead of time.

Optional: If you already have the following feet, bring them along – walking foot, open toed embroidery foot, open-toed darning foot, couching foot.

Basic Sewing Kit for machine sewing: Scissors, needle changer, seam ripper, etc. Fabric: Four yards of muslin, or solid colored 100% cotton fabric. For tracing designs, a light color is easier. You will be making a series of small practice quilt sandwiches. You can make them in class or ahead of time. Size range of 9" x 12" to 15" square is recommended. If you cut your quilt sandwiches just a little larger than copier paper you can trim them to fit into sheet protectors & keep them in a 3-ring binder. For the one-day class you will need about 10-12 quilt sandwiches.

**Batting:** Two yards or enough to fill your four yards of fabric. Batting must be 100% cotton or 80% cotton / 20% polyester. (Fairfield Cotton Classic is ideal.)

Thread: 100% Cotton or cotton/poly sewing thread in several colors. Bring at least one color to match your fabric & at least one to contrast with it.

Clear nylon or polyester monofilament. Polyester Sulky "invisible" is recommended.

Optional: If you have specialty threads you want to try (rayon, metallics, etc.) feel free to bring them. HOWEVER, this class will not include instruction in using specialty threads.

Needles: Bring a good supply of needles.

Schmetz #70 & #80 machine quilting needles are recommended.

Schmetz #80 & #90 system 130N needles may be needed for heavier threads.

Schmetz Microtex Sharp recommended for lighter weight threads.

Optional: Kwik-Klip pin closer. Will be available in the class if you don't have one.

Gloves: Latex surgical, driving, quilting, or gardening gloves.

Small portable light box, if you already have one.

#### Caryl Bryer Fallert Workshop

#### "Getting Comfy with Curves"

Friday, March 8, 2002, 9 am. - 3:30 pm.

Goleta Valley Community Center, 5679 Hollister Ave., Goleta CA

Learn the secrets of drawing & piecing graceful curves like the ones in "Messenger #2" & "Birds of a Different Color". Caryl demonstrates her fast, easy & accurate method for piecing the curves in her quilts & shows you how to draw & piece your own curved design wall quilt. Zig zag machine is required. Her website is www.bryerpatch.com

<u>Supply list</u>: Sewing machine: One that is clean, friendly & well adjusted. You must know how to opearate your sewing machine. Your machine MUST HAVE A ZIG ZAG. Bring an open-toed embroidery foot if you have one. (Bernina #20)

Fabric: Must be 100% cotton. Minimum one fat quarter each of the following: black or other dark color; gray or other medium color; white or other light color. You will also want a variety of other fabrics from which to choose. Large amounts of any one fabric will not be needed. Bring a selection, and be sure to include light, medium & dark values. Fabrics can be solid, print or painted. Large busy, high contrast prints or large geometric patterns may be more difficult to work with for your first project.

Thread: 100% Cotton in a medium shade of a neutral color (ie. medium gray, sage, beige) Clear nylon or polyester monofilament. Polyester Sulky "invisible" is recommended.

Basic Sewing Kit for machine sewing: Scissors, needle changer, seam ripper, etc.

Scissors for paper & fabric. Rotary Cutter, Board & Ruler.

**Drawing Tools:** Fine point Sharpie marker, flexible curve (available at office & art supply stores) pen, pencil, ruler, eraser, compass.

Paper: Pad of tracing paper (thin, see-through paper available at art supply stores).

20-30 sheets of 8 1/2" x 11" plain white copier paper.

Larger paper: freezer paper recommended or 18" wide butcher paper, or 5-6 sheets of 11" x 17" paper. (See optional items if not using freezer paper.)

Small watercolor brush or cotton swab.

Niagara Spray Starch, or small container of other liquid starch. You will not need much. You can just spray some Niagara into a small bottle or other tight container.

Glue Stick. Litter Bag.

**Optional:** Small portable light box, if you already have one. If you have a plexi extension table for your machine, bring it. An inexpensive light stick can be slipped underneath to form a portable light box. Overhead projector, if you already have one. Temporary embroidery spray adhesive if you will not be using freezer paper. (Sullivans or 505, 3-M Photo-mount, or 3-M Spray-mount.)

I talked my husband into stopping by for a quick visit as we left town in the pouring rain. Black Cat Quilts, 2608 Ocean Avenue, SF 94132 (telephone 415-337-1355,

fax 415-337-1383), is located in a quiet,

neighborly area with other little shops (including a nice deli and bakery across the street), about 2 miles north of the Highway 1 and Interstate 280 junction.




The shop is operated by Gretchen Nelson, but it is owned by a lovely black cat named Miss Kitty. Miss Kitty was napping in a basket when we arrived, but deigned to open her eyes and pose for a picture before dozing off again (see photo). She also has her own web site at

http://www.shopcat.com/blackcat/misskitty.htm. In keeping with the shop's name, there are a number of cat items for sale, as well as some

very nice cat fabrics.

There was an interesting display of Earlene Fowler books and other quiltrelated fiction, as well as a good selection of quilting books. The store also has patterns and kits, splendid sample quilts displayed on





the walls (see photo), and way too many marvelous fabrics to deal with in the short time we had to visit! Gretchen was very friendly (see photo) and told us about the shop and the classes they hold there, and we visited the classroom in the back with samples of works-in-progress hanging around.

I added to my personal stash of chicken fabrics, spied some marvelous one-of-akind batiks that leaped onto my pile, and managed to find room for some buttons and a pattern or two. I also signed up for their newsletter and have already received the first one. I wish I could attend some of their classes-but it's a little far to go. ## Musings

In our quilt club, as we share special moments and compare our works, we often speak of our unfinished projects. We talk of them as though they are the bane of our existence, barricades to be surmounted, or handicaps to be overcome. There are those who would mock the multitude of unfinished projects that clutter my home. These works surround me in all stages of growth: from paper sketches, piles of cut fabric, a few assembled blocks, and pieced tops, to basted quilts that beg to be quilted and bound.

And yet when I finish a quilt and release it, having put so much more than stitches into its creation, for an indefinable time I find myself cast adrift. I become a boat that's lost its anchor, a balloon without a tether, a kite that broke its string. I slip through the house rudderless and distracted. My fingers fumble in their emptiness. My glance is restless and unfocused, seeking something not readily apparent but seeking nonetheless. My heart grows anxious, annoyed by buzzing, aimless thoughts. I despair of finding safe harbor.

As I settle, so do my anxieties. My eyes find rest in soothing colors. My heart calms, my hands find purpose and direction. My thoughts find calm winds to travel by, while still firmly anchored with thread and needle.

#### March 2002 Block of the Month: Amish Action

This month's block is my favorite block – the nine patch. The actual finished block will consist of two nine-patch blocks offset with two plain squares.

It's set in Amish colors, which means SOLIDS ONLY. No marbles, no batiks, just solids.

You will need solid black fabric for the background and two solid colors.

To make the nine-patch, cut your strips/squares of the solid and the colored fabric two inches wide. You can either cut the fabric into squares before assembling the nine-patch or sew 2" strips together, then cut (I prefer this method). The nine-patch should be assembled with the colored fabric in the "X" position (the 4 corners and the center

square). The black fabric will be used in the other four squares.

For each <u>finished block</u>, you'll need


Ten 2" colored squares (five of each color looks best)

Eight 2" black squares

Two 5" black squares.

Assemble each of the two nine-patch blocks as shown:

It looks better if all five colored squares in a single nine-patch block are the same color, and if the two nine-patch blocks use two different colors. (My opinion only!) Assemble the entire block as shown:




Note: blocks shown are not to scale. Finished block size: 9 inches square Unfinished block size: 9.5 inches square


