
May Speaker




Jane Sassaman Workshop "Abstracting from Nature"




Jane Sassaman Workshop "Machine Appliqué"

This workshop will focus on rich surface design as students learn techniques of precision machine appliqué. Students will be exposed to organic shapes in other media and will be challenged to apply these shapes to their textile compositions. Each student will experiment

with several appliqué and decorative embroidery options.

Photographs of interesting objects for design inspiration



Workshop: Friday, June 14 Cynthia England "Picture Piecing"

9:00 am – 3:30 pm Goleta Valley Community
Center, 5679 Hollister Avenue, Goleta CA
Learn Cynthia's own technique for piecing
beautiful picture quilts. There is no tracing
involved; templates are printed onto freezer paper.
If you can sew a straight line, you can sew any of
these. Fabric selection, organizational skills and
construction methods will be addressed in class.
Each student can choose one design from any of the
12" blocks available in floral or landscape patterns:
floral (Wild Rose, Iris Beauty, and Hummingbird),
or landscape (Snow Scene, Country Road, At the
Beach and Autumn Scene). Patterns are \$9.00;
fabric kits are optional and available at the
workshop for a \$2 discount.

Supply list

Pattern. On the back of the pattern are the fabric requirements. Please keep in mind that, except for the background fabric, we use very small amounts so we might do some trading back & forth in class. Sewing machine with light to medium gray thread depending on the color of your background fabric. Personal sewing supplies.

Iron, ironing surface.


Paper and fabric scissors.

Tray (plastic lid from a sweater box works well). This is for laying out and organizing the individual pieces. A colored tray is preferable. Approximately 20 sandwich-sized zip-lock baggies, to separate sections.

These are intricate patterns, but don't be intimidated! We will take one section at a time and you will be surprised how forgiving the technique is.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee & tea are provided by the guild. Please bring a snack to share & either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break.



Workshop Report

Nancy Elliott McDonald taught a very entertaining and productive workshop on curved piecing. The

project was a wall hanging she calls "Pussy Willow," and the pattern can easily be expanded to a larger quilt. Nancy has a method for machine-sewing curves that requires a minimum of pins and is really easy to do.




Cutting the curved pieces with her templates was also easy. Her basic block is very similar to "drunkard's path," but her method can be easily applied to other curved blocks. We had lots of time to sew during the workshop, and several people had completed tops by the end of the day.

Nancy likes lots of bright colors, and she gave us some very useful information about how to combine the brights with more restful fabrics along with very light and dark colors to achieve maximum effect. Most importantly, I left the workshop inspired to continue working on this project. I now have more than forty completed blocks arranged on my design wall, and I plan to spend this afternoon sewing them together.



On a recent trip to Las Vegas, I talked my husband into driving out to the west side so I could check out the biggest quilt shop in Las Vegas. We found it easily (not too far from the Strip) and had a wonderful time checking it out. The first thing I noticed was the number of sample quilts that were displayed in the store. Ev Dahl, co-owner of the store with Helen Clapp, told me they had about 250 sample quilts, and more coming in all the time. A lot of them are from the classes they teach, and some are examples of the patterns they sell. You can see some of them in the photograph with this article, but you should really look at the other photos on their web site. Most impressive!

The store has been in that location for 12 years, but when Ev and Helen bought it three years ago, it became a "Material Chicks" store. "Material Chicks" has a whole line of quilt patterns that the store stocks, but there are also many others on display. Interesting things I noted in the store were baby fabrics displayed in a white crib, and a whole rack of state flower fabrics. Of course I had to buy fat

Quilt Show 2002 Information

A judged show differs from a juried show as no one is turned away.

This exhibit is a **member's showcase**, providing an opportunity for everyone to display their newest, best, or favorite quilt(s) at a large show. The committee urges each and every member of the Guild to submit one or more entries to this event.

Submit your written entry(ies) as soon as possible. It's not too early to reserve your place on the wall. Your quilt(s) can be currently unfinished or in process but must be completed by collection time. Every member of Coastal Quilters Guild is assured of the display of at least one quilt. Exhibit space permitting, additional quilts will be selected by lottery according to size. Please indicate the priority of the submitted entry; every effort will be made to honor your priority.

For purposes of this show, a quilt is defined as a fabric construction consisting of a front, filler layer, and back held together with stitching and made by the member-exhibitor. Cheater panels and tied quilts will not be accepted. Quilts may not have been hung at a previous CQG exhibit.

Security Arrangements: Every effort will be made to protect all quilts. Accounting and surveillance will be strictly planned and maintained. Eating and smoking are prohibited in the exhibit hall. Responsible white-gloved hostesses will try to keep all quilts in view at all times and will discourage touching by viewers. However, CQG show insurance does not cover the quilts. Each owner is responsible for insuring her own quilt(s) for loss and damage.

Label: An identifying label should be sewn securely to the quilt on the back of the lower right side stating the quilter's name, address, telephone number, and name of quilt.

Judging: If you wish your entry to be judged, please cover the label with a piece of cloth or paper pinned to the quilt.

Sleeve: A 4" sleeve must be attached to the back top. This provides a safe and secure means of hanging the quilt. Quilts without sleeves will not be exhibited. Sleeve construction: Cut fabric 9" by the width of the quilt less 2". Stitch a narrow hem on each end of the strip. Fold the strip in half lengthwise and stitch a 1/2" seam on the right side of the fabric, creating a long tube. Press the tube flat. Hand-stitch the top and bottom of the sleeve across the entire width of the quilt. Be sure the sleeve ends remain open for insertion of the hanging rod. Your finished tube will be approximately 4" to 4-1/2" wide.

Packaging: Each quilt should be delivered in its own pillow case with the maker's name marked in indelible ink in large letters on the hem. This will help keep the quilt clean and facilitate transport.

Details on quilt collection will be provided by September 1st.

COMMUNITY QUILTS PROJECT: WHY JULY?

In the past, community quilts projects generally have had "due dates" for quilts later in the year than July, so you may be wondering, "Why July this year?" There are several reasons. First, several important Guild activities occur in October-the Challenge Quilt and Quilt Show—and many, if not most, Guild members will make quilts for one or both of these events. In addition, the Guild sometimes has a holiday-related community project for December, such as the Christmas stockings for New Directions last year. We want members to participate in as many of these activities as interest them, and so we tried to make sure that the deadlines for participating are spread out a bit. Second, we need a minimum of 50 quilts for Storyteller, which is less than half of the number of community quilts made last year for Adventures in Caring, so that finishing by July seems reasonable. If any of you get a community quilt partly done and then realize that you won't have time to finish, call Cynthia and she will arrange for someone else to finish it; we're doing this together so it's OK!

Many members picked up kits and labels at the April meeting, and some folks turned in lovely finished quilts. Keep up the good work! There will be more kits and labels available at the May meeting. Some batting has been donated and is available for those unable to provide their own batting; call Cynthia if you need some.

Don't forget that if you have a kit from last year (or this year) that you are not going to use this year for a community quilt, you can drop it off (anonymously and guilt-free) at Blue Island.


Our boutique will be bigger and better than ever. It will have a prime location so all you crafters get going on your specialties. Evelyn Gorrindo is in charge of that department.





June 2002 Block of the Month Attic Window

Here's an opportunity to use some of those lovely pictorial fabrics that you have but just can't bear to cut up into little pieces.

Supplies needed:

- 1. Pictorial fabric for the center: houses, beach scenes, sailboats, animals, etc.
- 2. Two coordinating fabrics for the window sill/side. These can be 2 shades of the same color, similar colors, or two colors that just go together. They should be different values...one darker than the other.
- 3. Black (solid, marbled, black-on-black, etc. anything that reads as black).


Cut your pieces as follows:

- 1. Center fabric: 8-inch square. "Fussy cut" as necessary to get a nice picture in the center. It will be 7.5-inches finished, so keep that in mind as you cut.
- 2. Window sill/side fabrics: From EACH of the two, you need:
 - a. One 23/4-inch x 8-inch strip
 - b. One 3½-inch square. Cut the square into two half-square triangles. You need only one of the triangles. (If your seams are a perfect ¼-inch, you can get away with a 3 1/8-inch square. I need the extra leeway.)
- 3. 2-inch wide black strips for the border (to "unify" the different blocks).

Piecing directions:

- 1. Start by sewing the two half-square triangles (one of each) together to form a square.
- 2. Add the 2¾-inch x 8-inch strip of the <u>darker</u> fabric to one side of its half-square triangle in the square sewn in step one. Make sure the piece lines up as shown in figure A. (I learned that the hard way.)
- 3. Sew the lighter strip to the <u>bottom</u> of the center 8-inch square.
- 4. Sew these 2 pieces together as shown in Figure A.
- 5. Add the black border around the whole block. Start with the sides, then do the top and bottom.

The finished block size is 12.75 square inches.



Workshops

Friday, May 10 - Jane Sassaman

Abstracting from Nature - Nature is an endless source of inspiration. In this class we will examine a wide variety of artists' interpretations of nature before beginning to manipulate natural forms ourselves. Through a series of exercises we will experiment with abstraction and exaggeration to capture the essence and energy of your favorite flora and achieve dramatic visual effects. Drawing skills are not needed but participants should have a strong interest in developing their own design language and unique visual symbols.

This class is especially beneficial for the drawing impaired and the tragically literal.

Saturday, May 11 – Jane Sassaman

<u>Machine Appliqué</u> — This workshop will focus on rich surface design as students learn techniques of precision machine appliqué. Students will be exposed to organic shapes in other mediums (Art Nouveau, etc.) and will be challenged to apply these shapes to their textile compositions. Each student will experiment with several appliqué and decorative embroidery options.

Friday, June 14 – Cynthia England Picture Piecing - Learn Cynthia's own technique for piecing beautiful picture quilts. There is no tracing involved; templates are printed onto freezer paper. If you can sew a straight line, you can sew any of these. Fabric selection, organizational skills and construction methods will be addressed in class. Each student can choose one design from any of the 12" blocks available in floral or landscape patterns: floral - Wild Rose, Iris Beauty, and Hummingbird, or landscape - Snow Scene, Country Road, At the Beach and Autumn Scene. Patterns are \$9.00; fabric kits are optional and available at the workshop for a \$2 discount.

DC: 380 quilts sent. Quilts to firemen, rescue workers, K-9 teams, hospital staff.

From SB: 114 quilts sent to individuals around the country.

Thank yous to the Little Flag Quilt Project committee members in Santa Barbara: All members helped constantly to keep the project going - some had specific jobs: Martha Adkins spent hours of time researching the names and locations of firemen in NY, and also developing a list of companies and banks to approach for monetary support. Heather Georgakis spent hours developing a list of quilt guilds in all the 50 states and then generating mailing labels for those guilds. She also monitored message boards on

the Internet. Zetta Hanna and Melissa Frolli were the Quality Control team. They repaired, bound and completed many, many flags and sewed labels and rings to too many quilts to count. Vickie Mahan acted as our secretary, writing letters to request monetary support for the project and writing many thank you letters to those who supported the project with either funds or services. Mary Markow packaged and mailed quilts to recipients around the country. Judith Nybakken cut, packaged and distributed hundreds of Little Flag kits. Phyllis Pool worked to obtain names and addresses of local recipients. Liz Turner acted as our treasurer and has done a wonderful job of keeping our funds straight.

Last but not least, big, big thank yous to those who helped distribute the quilts on the east coast.




