



# September Speaker: Freddy Moran

This month we welcome fall with an explosion of color. Freddy Moran is a quilt artist and author known for her use of bold color and design. Freddy began her career as an artist with her BA in ceramics from Dominican College in San Rafael. She dabbled in other art forms and while raising 5 sons she designed and taught needlepoint at the Orinda Art Center and local needlework shops.

Her love for quilting came after the age of 60, and then she didn't waste any time. Freddy's quilts have appeared in national and international publications, including magazines, textbooks, art and quilting books. You might have seen her on HGTV, in "Artists in Residence," a program featuring artists who "live their work." She has written a book, "Freddy's Houses", and designs fabrics as well.

Freddy will present "Red is a Neutral", a talk about the use of color illustrated with a trunk show of her exciting quilts.



# In Memory of Zetta Hanna



Zetta was one of the original 6 women who met back in 1986 to decide how to start a quilting group. She was a faithful member of the group and became the guild's first secretary in 1988 when it was decided to make things official and become a guild. She was always an active member in the guild, lending her help, quilting, and knowledge to the guild's activities: shows, opportunity quilts, and programs.

She most loved the traditional quilts, especially done up in the 1930's reproduction prints. She was particularly known for her expertise in appliqué. Her *Appliquéd Posies* quilt was a wonderful addition to our last quilt show. Zetta made the Monarch Butterfly block for the Natural History Museum Quilt and also lent her quilting to the Santa Barbara and California quilts. In her last weeks she quilted on the 2004 opportunity quilt.

She traveled a lot throughout California to visit her children and to attend quilt shows and knew where all the best quilt shops were – her fabric "stash" was amazing.

Zetta had lived in Santa Barbara since the 60's, raising her five children here. Zetta met Owen on a blind date while she was attending Butler's College in Indiana and Owen was attending Purdue. They moved here after several moves around the country, for Owen to take the position of Chemical Engineering professor at UCSB. Zetta loved her children and her two grandchildren and showered them with quilts.

4 Zetta will be missed by all who knew her.

# Susan Shie's "Lucky Sampler" Workshop November, 2003

#### LUCKY SCHOOL OF QUILTING SAMPLER WORKSHOP

In this class, I share all my Lucky School of Quilting techniques. A very small quilt, a sampler of a finished size around 4-6" square, is created with my very unusual quilting methods. Because you don't want to sew beads on until after all your quilting stitches are done, you need to work small, in order to get to the beading stage on one or two class days.

We focus on my Sandwich First method, simple shape Lucky Appliqué, embroidery stitches that also quilt, a little writing, and beading. You'll come away from this class knowing how I make the large pieces and able to go start your own.

**Supply List:** 

Fabrics: You will only need a small Ziploc bag of fabrics! We're only making a piece that's about 5" square in the end, so you only need a few mottled dyed cotton fabrics in colors you like, in contrasting values (light, medium, and dark). No knits or tight weaves. Fat eighths are as big as any one piece should be, and they can be smaller. Needle the fabric with the #2 Crewel needle, to be sure the weave is open enough to handle the needle and floss.

**Batting:** Polyfil Traditional Batt, not any other brand or thickness. This is a medium weight batt. Please don't get something else! NOT high loft or low loft! We only need a little bit per person. If organizers get one crib quilt batt, this is enough for all to share. (CQG will supply this)

Permanent marker: Rub a Dub laundry markers are best. Second choice is Fine Line black Sharpie.

Sharp scissors!!! Each person needs to bring a pair and should be sure they cut fabric easily. Large and small scissors, even better! I prefer DuraSharp blue handled shears and Fiskars MicroTip embroidery scissors, but this is your choice. Just make sure yours cut fabric well.

Pins and pincushion.

Needles: Dritz Crewel needles, pack size 2, for quilting with floss. Dritz Quilting Betweens (needles) size 10 and 12, for beading. No substitutes. Sold at JoAnn Fabrics. The betweens are sold with quilting supplies, and the crewels are with regular sewing needles. I'll bring some, in case you can't find them.

Perle cotton (#5) or embroidery floss (6 strand): You need a bunch of this in a big assortment I'm loving perle cotton right now, and hardly using my floss, but you can mix thread types in a piece, to add more surface texture interest. DMC "craft thread", which is a perle cotton sold in packs of 36 pull-out skeins, is sold at JoAnn's and craft stores, along with DMC twist skeins of #5 perle. I also love Anchor and Valdani brands, and Artfrabrik's hand dyed perle varigations. I adore Perle Crown Rayon, which is shiny and easy to handle. The only time I use #8 perle cotton is for embroidering over small words, and then I use #8 black perle balls, from JoAnn's. For sparkly threads, try Candlelight or Glamour, but they're fussy and break so easily!

Beading Thread: I use Silamide, sold by embellishmentcafe.com. You can bring Nymo size D, if you insist, but either thread should be Black.

Beads: This is subjective. I love glass bugle beads, sparkly, silver lined ones, size #2. Seed beads, E beads, alphabet beads, gemstone beads (cut up gemstone necklaces), and any other beads you're attracted to are fine. You can pool beads or personally swap them within the group. You won't have time to really do much beading in a one day class though. So don't bring a ton! A tiny packet of beads that can fit into your hand, truly is enough for this class. I would just bring #2 bugles and maybe a few seed beads. Think small, as the sampler is very small. It just takes a lot of time to make it!
