# November Speaker: Susan Shie

She makes what she calls Outsider Art Ouilts. They are unique, wonderful quilts that tell a story. Susan and her husband James work out of Turtle Moon Studios, which is part of their home in Wooster, Ohio. Their work is a mixture of many cultural influences and working techniques, which she calls the Lucky School of Quilting. Together they enjoy the freedom of choosing among many methods and materials, yet the finished results are always recognizable as their work. Susan does the compositional creating: drawing, painting, and most of the embellishment. James adds his touch by adding some leather or some free motion machine quilting. although most of the sewing Susan does by hand.

Susan has been painting, sewing, drawing, sculpting and writing since she was a small child. She received her Masters in Painting from the Kent State University. Together she and James have received many grants and awards. They have shown their work and taught classes all over the United States since 1987. They also host Turtle Arts Camp one week out of each month. 2-4 campers retreat to take classes and explore techniques.

## Susan Shie's "Lucky Sampler" Workshop

#### LUCKY SCHOOL OF QUILTING SAMPLER WORKSHOP

Susan says: In this class, I share all my Lucky School of Quilting techniques. A very small quilt, a sampler of a finished size around 4-6" square, is created with my very unusual quilting methods. Because you don't want to sew beads on until after all your quilting stitches are done, you need to work small, in order to get to the beading stage in one class.

We focus on my Sandwich First method, simple shape Lucky Appliqué, embroidery stitches that also quilt, a little writing, and beading. You'll come away from this class knowing how I make the large pieces and able to go start your own.

#### **Supply List:**

**Fabrics:** You will only need a small Ziploc bag of fabrics! We're only making a piece that's about 5" square in the end, so you only need a few mottled dyed cotton fabrics in colors you like, in contrasting values (light, medium, and dark). No knits or tight weaves. Fat eighths are as big as any one piece should be, and they can be smaller. Needle the fabric with the #2 Crewel needle, to be sure the weave is open enough to handle the needle and floss.

**Batting:** Polyfil Traditional Batt, not any other brand or thickness. This is a medium weight batt. Please don't get something else! NOT high loft or low loft! We only need a little bit per person. If organizers get one crib quilt batt, this is enough for all to share. (CQG will supply this)

Permanent marker: Rub a Dub laundry markers are best. Second choice is Fine Line black Sharpie.

Sharp scissors!!! Each person needs to bring a pair and should be sure they cut fabric easily. Large and small scissors, even better! I prefer DuraSharp blue handled shears and Fiskars MicroTip embroidery scissors, but this is your choice. Just make sure yours cut fabric well.

#### Pins and pincushion.

Needles: Dritz Crewel needles, pack size 2, for quilting with floss. Dritz Quilting Betweens (needles) size 10 and 12, for beading. No substitutes. Sold at JoAnn Fabrics. The betweens are sold with quilting supplies, and the crewels are with regular sewing needles. I'll bring some, in case you can't find them.

Perle cotton (#5) or embroidery floss (6 strand): You need a bunch of this in a big assortment I'm loving perle cotton right now, and hardly using my floss, but you can mix thread types in a piece, to add more surface texture interest. DMC "craft thread", which is a perle cotton sold in packs of 36 pull-out skeins, is sold at JoAnn's and craft stores, along with DMC twist skeins of #5 perle. I also love Anchor and Valdani brands, and Artfrabrik's hand dyed perle varigations. I adore Perle Crown Rayon, which is shiny and easy to handle. The only time I use #8 perle cotton is for embroidering over small words, and then I use #8 black perle balls, from JoAnn's. For sparkly threads, try Candlelight or Glamour, but they're fussy and break so easily!

**Beading Thread:** I use Silamide, sold by embellishmentcafe.com. You can bring Nymo size D, if you insist, but either thread should be Black.

Beads: This is subjective. I love glass bugle beads, sparkly, silver lined ones, size #2. Seed beads, E beads, alphabet beads, gemstone beads (cut up gemstone necklaces), and any other beads you're attracted to are fine. You can pool beads or personally swap them within the group. You won't have time to really do much beading in a one day class though. So don't bring a ton! A tiny packet of beads that can fit into your hand, truly is enough for this class. I would just bring #2 bugles and maybe a few seed beads. Think small, as the sampler is very small. It just takes a lot of time to make it!

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee and tea are provided by the Guild. Please bring a snack to share and either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break for lunch. Questions? Call Betty Kelley at 687-1443.

# A Case for the Educational Value of CQG Programs


Let me begin by saying that I have always found CQG programs very enjoyable and entertaining. However, I had never given much thought to the educational value of a program until a recent experience. My adventure began when I spent two weeks this summer visiting my mother in upstate New York. Mom owns a small orchid greenhouse business and many of the florists in the area purchase flowers from her. Doug, one of mother's customers and a friend, asked if he could show me a quilt that his great aunt left him. Naturally, I said I would love to see his quilt.

He appeared at the door one afternoon with his treasured quilt. As he unfolded the quilt out over my mother's sofa, I was shocked to be viewing a beautiful, large, scalloped-edge quilt with appliquéd lavender and purple clematis flowers rambling over pale green lattice on a white background. As I was taking note of the colors, quilt pattern, and appliqué detail, my memory flashed back to a CQG program presented by Rosalind Perry about her grandmother, Marie Webster. I told Doug not to get his hopes up but his treasured quilt looked to me like a Marie Webster pattern.



Mom took some pictures of the quilt and I proceeded to tell Mom and Doug about Marie Webster and her contribution to quilting. I received the pictures in the mail on the day of the guild meeting, and took them to the meeting hoping to show the pictures to either Rosalind Perry or Marty Frolli. Unfortunately, neither Rosalind nor Marty was there. I was eager to find out if Doug's quilt was a Marie Webster pattern so the next morning I e-mailed Rosalind with a description of the quilt. Rosalind asked if I could send pictures of the quilt, which I did. When she received the pictures she telephoned me to tell me Doug's quilt was not only a Marie Webster pattern but it was the missing pattern "Clematis in Bloom."


I was able to put Rosalind in touch with Doug and after some research I am sure Rosalind will have more to add to this story. Rosalind asked me how I was able to identify the quilt as a possible Marie Webster pattern. Very simple, it was her program at CQG! Even though appliqué is not my forte, I was fascinated with the history and the quilts on display. Rosalind Perry did a wonderful job of educating me and in turn she enabled me to identify a Marie Webster quilt made from a pattern she didn't have.

# ANNUAL MEETING IN NOVEMBER



The annual members' meeting of the Coastal Quilters Guild, Inc., a California nonprofit mutual benefit corporation, will be held at 7:00 PM on Thursday November 13, 2003. At this meeting the Guild membership will elect officers for 2004. At the November meeting members will also be voting to amend a few of our bylaws.

The current bylaws are printed at the back of the 2003 Membership Directory and Handbook. The suggested changes to these bylaws are minor, but will correctly state our meeting day of the week and will include e-mail correspondence as an acceptable method of communication regarding Guild business. The proposed changes to the bylaws would be written as follows. Note changed or added words are underlined:


An annual members' meeting shall be held on the second <u>Thursday</u> in November of each year at 7:00 PM unless the board sets another date or time and so notifies members....

Notice of the time and place of special meetings shall be given to each director by one of the following methods: (a) by personal delivery of written notice; (b) by first-class mail, postage prepaid; (c) by telephone, either directly to the director or to a person at the director's office who would reasonably be expected to communicate that message; or (d) via e-mail. Notices shall be given or sent to the director's address or telephone number as shown on the records of the corporation.

...Notices given by personal delivery, telephone <u>or e-mail should be sent</u> at least 48 hours before the time set for the meeting. (Note: telegraph company has been deleted.)

Any action that the board is required or permitted to take may be taken without a meeting if all members of the board consent in writing or via e-mail to the president to that action.

# Creative Color Play with Two Simple Quilt Blocks



Friday January 9, 2004 9:00am – 3:30pm Goleta Valley Community Center 5679 Hollister Ave, Goleta, CA

#### Description

In this class based on Margaret's book by the same name (C&T Publishing), students work with two versions of a simple, template-free, "wedge-pieced" block. Both the block and its mirror image are cut at the same time. The blocks are made quickly, and create many quilt designs depending on how they are placed on the design wall. After doing guided block arrangements that teach moving value and color across the pieced surface, students will develop their own Easy Pieces quilt using one or both versions of the block.

#### Supplies Needed

- One copy of Easy Pieces: Creative Color Play with Two Simple Quilt Blocks
- Sewing machine in clean and oiled condition, with several bobbins already filled
- Extra machine needles, bobbins, and toolbox that came with machine, machine cords, FOOT PEDAL, etc.
- Thread appropriate for machine (color doesn't matter)
- Cushion or pillow for your chair, to raise you to a good sewing height!!
- Scissors for fabric, thread snippers, and seam ripper
- Straight pins
- Rotary cutter with sharp blade (extra blades recommended)
- Acrylic straightedge 6" x 24"
- Rotary cutting mat large enough to cut fabric 22" wide
- Camera with flash capability, plenty of film for prints, extra batteries
- Six-inch acrylic square
- Designing Supplies:
  - 1-1/2 yards cotton quilt batting or flannel/backed tablecloth for vertical design wall
  - WIDE masking tape to adhere design surface to wall
  - Reducing glass (or other reducing device such as binoculars or camera)
  - FABRICS Bring 8-10 values (dark through medium through light) in EACH of TWO color families. Bring about 1/2 yard of each fabric.
    - NOTE: You need not buy all this fabric new: Pull from your fabric collection first, and fill in value gaps with new fabric! You may bring two similar fabrics and use them as ONE of your 8-10 values in a given color family. The greater number of fabrics you bring, the more flexibility you will have in the workshop.

Please plan to arrive by 8:45 to set up for the workshop. Coffee and tea are provided by the Guild. Please bring a snack to share and either a sack lunch or you may choose to go out in the area. There will be a mid-day break for lunch.





# Using Adhesive Products in Quiltmaking

Two researchers from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln have written a very interesting report on the use of products containing adhesives for quilting. Janet Evenson and Patricia Cox Crews, authors of "The Effects of Light and Ageing on Selected Quilting Products Containing Adhesives" have determined that fusible webs and all adhesive sprays (except *Spray and Fix*) have an adverse effect on quilts intended as heirlooms, as far as strength loss, stiffness, and yellowing. Fusible battings, on the other hand, proved acceptable in the study. The research also showed that all the adhesive products used varied in chemical composition significantly and that the label information on the adhesives was not clear enough for users to make informed decisions.


# December Block of the Month




3.5" Cut 4 squares in either yellow, red or green.

Snowball Light or Medium Blue with Yellow, Red or Green Corners


Cut 1 square




Right sides together. Sew corner.




Cut excess.




Press open. Repeat for all corners.




