# May Speaker is Hollis Chatelain

Hollis Chatelain is a Pennsylvania-born artist who has lived most of her life in Europe and Africa. She first started working in textiles while in Africa, inspired by the fabrics there. Upon her return to the United States in 1994, she was very homesick for Africa and has managed to turn that feeling into a stunning series of quilts/fabric paintings that recall the majesty and humanity of this great continent. All her work reveals a strong artistic personality, from the African work, to her nature series and abstract works. She currently resides in North Carolina.

Hollis is a nationally and internationally known artist, with work in public and private collections worldwide. Her awards are almost too numerous to list, including Quilt National, Paducah, Pacific International, etc.

Even though she has a strong background as an artist, photographer, and designer, she stresses that her workshops are not just for those who draw well. She welcomes both traditional and art quilters to her workshops, expressing appreciation for all. Check out her website at www.hollisart.com. We are lucky to have two workshops with Hollis this month: a Thursday afternoon workshop on becoming a professional in the arts and a Friday workshop on fabric dying. Come! # President's Message

I so admire those with the discipline to write regularly in a journal. My daughter Megan has kept a journal since she was ten years old. Someday she will be able to read about every argument she had with her brother by just checking those journals. She'll be able to tell her children exactly how she felt about moving to California at the age of twelve, and how horrible it was to have parents who wouldn't allow her to see R-rated movies in junior high. Because of those journals, she will recall details of her life that would otherwise be forgotten.

A few years ago I resolved to keep a journal for one year. It didn't happen. For some reason I just could not force myself to write regularly in that little book. I

often thought about writing in my journal. I would sometimes even word my entry in my mind. But still I didn't write a sentence.

By now I have accepted the fact that a chronicle of my life will likely not appear in a journal written by me. I pondered this point today while cleaning up my sewing studio. As I folded fabric and sorted patterns, I came across my photo file of finished projects. There was the photo of the wedding quilt I made for my son and daughter-in-law, the

baby quilt for my niece, and the quilt I gave to my mom that included fabric from her own mother's apron. So many of the sewing projects I have made have been for special people or events. My next project will also fit that description.

I'm cleaning up my studio because I've set aside next week to make a lap quilt for my stepmom. This will be a bittersweet experience. I will be making a quilt from my dad's clothes to comfort his widow. I plan to in-

clude several favorite photos of my father transferred onto fabric. I don't know how it will turn out, but when the quilt is finished I will photograph it so that I will always remember it. I always photograph my finished work.

Maybe I am not as hopelessly undisciplined as I feared. Perhaps, in a way, my quilts are my journal entries, and the chronicle of my life will be in cloth. I will keep my blank journal handy just in case I someday get the urge to write in it. For now I will limit my writing to this monthly note, my grocery list, and birthday cards. I will sew everyday and try to imagine that I am keeping a journal in my own special way.

What have you thought of?


Once you have a concept and begin work on your quilt, be thinking of a title that will tell the viewer something about how the theme inspired your design.

## May Workshop Hollis Chatelain

### PAINTING IMAGES WITH DYES



### Class Description:

This workshop is designed to teach students how to paint with Procion dyes on cotton. Learning to control the dyes will be emphasized. Among other things, we will cover blending, layering, special effects, and painting without bleeding. All of these techniques can be used to create images as complex as portraits or as simple as a line on a scarf.


Each student is asked to bring two or three 18" x 20" designs or drawings that they will transfer onto cloth and then paint. These drawings can be as simple as drawings from a coloring book because we will mainly be concentrating on how to apply the dyes. Students will leave with a painted piece that could be worked into a vest, quilt or pillow top.

### Supply List:

- 2 or 3 18" x 20" drawings or designs (there will also be drawings on hand to choose from)
- White synthetic round brushes used normally for acrylic or watercolor painting U.S. sizes 0, 2, 4, 8, 12 (I will have enough brushes available for sale for all the students who prefer to buy them directly from me. The brushes I sell are specific to the type of work I will be teaching).
- 4 large white plastic trash bags to put over and under your dyed pieces
- Sharpie black magic marker (fat one)
- Prismacolor pencils
- Scotch tape
- 6 plastic teaspoons
- Notebook and pencil for note taking
- 1 large Ziplock bag
- Extra sheets of drawing paper
- Rubber gloves (ex: kitchen rubber gloves)
- An empty film vial with top
- Paper towels

### The teacher will provide:

- White cotton cloth already dipped in soda ash
- Procion dyes and all other chemicals needed to dye paint
- Face masks
- Deep well palette



A lab fee of \$25.00 is required per student.

# Harvest of Colors 2004 Quilt Show

In hopes of explaining how our Harvest of Colors quilt show is put together, here is a brief timeline for your information. The show is a major fundraiser for the Guild and helps us to have such wonderful programs. All members are expected to contribute their help. If you are not going to be available the weekend of the show, there are jobs that need doing beforehand—particularly in September.

### Timeline:

June and July meetings. Photos will be taken at Guild of your quilt if you do not have one to submit with your entry.

August 2 All quilts finished with entries and photos sent to Kristin Otte.

August 12 Sign up at the Guild meeting to help on October 8, 9, and 10th (hanging and taking down the show, white gloving, ticket sales, opportunity quilt ticket sales, quilt collecting, etc. These jobs will be described more fully later.)

September Volunteers will be needed to distribute posters and literature locally.

September 9 Guild meeting and volunteer sign-ups

October Quilts for the show will be collected at the beginning of the month.


October 7 Judges will view entries to be judged.
October 8 Show will be hung followed by a dinner at Earl Warren.

October 9 and 10 Harvest of Colors Show

October 10 Take down the show; quilts claimed by their owners. Time for the quilts to be released will be posted later.

June is traditionally known for weddings. Keeping this in mind, we are commemorating this month with the wedding ring block.

Select your favorite small to medium scale floral fabric and a coordinating solid in pastel to medium shades of your favorite spring color.

# June Block of the Month Wedding Ring Block

Finished Block Size: 10" Unfinished Block Size: 10-1/2"

#### Fabric Selection:

- Background: White or white on white
- Small to medium scale floral print in pastel to medium colors
- Solid or fabric that reads solid in a color which compliments the floral

### Cutting:

From white fabric cut: four 2-1/2" squares and eight 3" squares.

From solid fabric cut: five 2-1/2" squares. From floral cut: eight 3" squares.

### Assembly:

This block requires sixteen half-square triangles which are made by using the 3" squares, one white and one floral, right sides together, line drawn from corner to corner and sewn ½" on either side of the drawn line and cut apart on the solid drawn line. Square the sixteen half-square triangle blocks to measure 2-1/2" square.

Please refer to the block diagram for the correct orientation of the half-square triangles.

- The first row of the block is assembled using two half-square triangles, one solid square and two half-square triangles.
- Row two is assembled using two halfsquare triangles, one white square and two half-square triangles.
- Row three is assembled using one solid square, one white square, one solid square one white square and one solid square.
- Row four is assembled using two half-square triangles, one white square, and two half-square triangles
- Row five is assembled using two-half square triangles, one solid square, and two half-square triangles.

Sew rows 1, 2, 3, 4, & 5 together to complete the block






