The April meeting and workshop will feature Karen Boutte, a fabulous quilt and wearable arts designer. Her Guild presentation is "African American Quilts and Quilters," and her workshop is an "Easy Art Jacket." The basic design is taken from her book, *Delightful Diva Designs: Wonderful Whimsical Wearables*. Check out her website at www.karenboutte.com and you will see some of her beautiful work!

Karen had been involved in needle arts for over 25 years, but began studying quilt his-

tory and construction techniques for garments in 1989. In 1997, she began teaching wearable art and quilting. Her company, *Delightful Diva Designs*, is a family affair—her husband is CEO (that stands for Carry Everything Out), and her son Lawrence handles all her printing needs, while her daughter-in-law Amber, an accountant, does the book-keeping, and her younger son Kendall is her webmaster. JUNE 2008 CHALLENGE—THE FOUR SEASONS

1. Use the phrase “The Four Seasons” as your inspiration and take off from there.
2. Your creation must be a quilt: two layers of cloth enclosing a third layer, held together by a stitched design. Embellish it any way you like.
3. You must include at least three different colors in your piece, using multiple lights and darks so that there will be at least seven variations of those colors in the final project. If you want to add more colors, that’s fine.
4. Your quilt may be as small as you wish. It should not exceed 72 inches along any one side, and its total outside measurement must be 144 inches or less. The finished piece may be any shape.
5. Submit only one entry per person or group.
6. Label your quilt. Include your name, the name of the quilt (if you give it one), and perhaps something about your inspiration and/or the techniques you used.
7. Attach a four-inch hanging sleeve.

Remember, this year the Challenge is in **June**.

This One’s For You!

The Harvest of Colors quilt show, Oct 4 & 5, is a member showcase – which means that only members of the Coastal Quilters Guild are eligible to hang quilts. Think your quilt isn’t good enough to hang in public? Think again! This is your opportunity to be part of one big beautiful “show and tell”. Members of all levels are encouraged to participate. We have room to hang over 175 quilts. Don’t have a quilt to submit yet? How about that cute one that you gave to your niece? Borrow it back! Or, how about finishing one of those multiplying UFO’s (un-finished objects) you started last year. Or, there’s still time to start from scratch. **The deadline for paperwork submission is August 1st.** The top must be completed by this time so that the picture you attach will be accurate for colors, and the finished size is measurable. If needed, you will have 4-5 weeks more to finish the quilt before it is collected in mid-September. Submission forms and instructions will be available starting with the May general meeting.

My Great Quilting Adventures

I thought some of you would enjoy a report on my adventures post-book-publication in the heady world of the “professional” quilt teacher. I certainly have managed to get myself into hot water a few times and some quite unpredictable things have happened to me since I took to the road. This is just between us, not for the Internet!

Despite my hints, my DH neglected to buy me a “navigator” for my car, having great confidence in my ability to find my way around the back woods. So far I’ve only had to tackle one dirt road in the dark and the bolts on the engine (1996 Volvo, 188,000 miles and counting) only rattle once in awhile. I do wish Thomas’ made LARGE PRINT map books. I’ve learned that no matter how you pack a trunk, there is NO WAY to avoid having something important on the bottom. Also, you can get nasty cuts from boxes! Bungee cords bite. And gearshifts do not like the medium size McDonald’s Diet Pepsi dumped on them. Cell phones don’t like it much either (which can be a problem if you don’t have a “navigator.”)

But I’ve met some really interesting people! Some have relatives living with them who make me wish for a lock on my door. I’ve slept under the gaze of mountains of plush bunnies, a poster of Kurt Cobain, several deer heads, and seventeen generations of family portraits. I’ve been told guilty secrets, medical ordeals, marital details, birthing sagas of grandchildren! There’s something about passing briefly through a person’s life that makes them confide things their best friend doesn’t know!

And you know how speaker contracts always politely ask if ‘you have any dietary requirements’. “None” I always said. Ho, ho. It never occurred to me that the guild didn’t check on the other end—the hostess end. If you know me at all, you know I like to eat and once I stayed in a home with no caffeine, no alcohol, no wheat, no dairy products, no red meat and no sugar! I have now started to state on that part of the contract “I’m a meat-eating vegetable lover with a sweet tooth who’s been known to drink a glass of wine!” Translation: “Please put me with a bad girl!” (This year I’m asking for a flask for Christmas.)

I’ve taught in great classrooms too. There was one in a huge church in Pennsylvania where all the plugs were along the perimeter of this cafeteria size room. Each student sat at her own round table at the edge of the room and I roller-skated back and forth between them (I WISH I’d brought skates!) One time I stood in the doorway between two rooms jammed so full of people nobody could move and taught both sides at once (I hope!). One place was so cramped that two students nearly came to blows over mixed up supplies!

That reminds me of the time I was getting really negative vibes from two women in a 2-day class. I kept stopping at their table to see what was the trouble—thinking they really hated me. Next day, one of them had a dental appointment and her friend

confided—“Thank goodness! She was driving me crazy. I wanted to kill her yesterday!” Moral: Don’t take it personally.

Really, the workshop students are nice. They often give me presents! Here’s a list: jar of homemade jam, bottle of BBQ sauce, second hand quilting mystery paperback, key leash (after I lost my car keys twice in one morning!), felted pin cushion, frozen pheasant, a whole apple pie! The latter was from a woman who’d called me early one morning to ask a question about the supply list for an upcoming class. It was 9 o’clock—in Michigan!

I’ve narrowly avoided disaster several times. Twice the cord that connects the projector to the computer was left at the previous venue (Thank God for Radio Shack!) when others helped me pack. And I hate it when people unplug, turn off and otherwise tamper with my gawd-awfully expensive electrical stuff! At one guild my table of “merchandise” ran out before I could get back there from the podium, so the helpers “helpfully” sold the supplies I’d kept sealed in a box for the class in the next town! (Had to get up at show and tell and ask for some back. Then mailed to individuals after returning home, turning a \$6 per packet profit into fifty cents!) I confess I overdid it once. Two lectures, five classes, 750 miles in six days—ALMOST showed up on Tuesday for a Monday class! (Thought it was awfully nice being able to have a nice cookout before I hit the road. Too bad!)

Once there was a similar mix-up on the part of guild. The program chair asked me just to do a trunk show. With a 6-hour drive to the guild, I declined, unless they added a class. Never did. The week before the meeting, I got a “we’re looking forward to your visit” email from the program person. “Huh?” I said. She swore blind she had a signed contract though I had no records at all. Luckily, I wasn’t busy, so I made plans for the long trip. The day before I was to leave, I got a phone call. “I’m so embarrassed! It’s someone else’s contract. For another month! Everyone’s expecting you. Will you PLEASE come?” I wouldn’t want to face MY guild with a screw-up like that, so I went. Good karma right? My car broke down on the way home. I spent ALL (and then some) the speaker’s fee at a Volvo dealer in Ontario. But I met some cute salesmen! Nearly bought a new car (“Hi, Dear. What color car should I buy?”)

I hate the airplane hassle. I don’t like to check my quilts. I don’t like to take three planes. I don’t like to have to think, “What do I absolutely have to have” if all my bags get lost? Is it sharp?” I’m adding a line to the contract that says “must arrive/depart during non-vampire hours.” I hate checks that bounce. I hate going to the bank, in fact. I don’t like the mountain of boxes in the guest/storage room. I’m tired of buying fabric for samples. Not!

Actually, it’s been a true adventure, one I wouldn’t trade. Not yet, anyway!

SPRING 2008 Quilting Classes

Beginning Quiltmaking

A course for those who have never quilted and those who want to sharpen their basic skills. Learn the fundamentals of quiltmaking while constructing a small sampler quilt. Covers traditional and contemporary techniques of piecing, appliqué and quilting.

This quarter's blocks will have an emphasis on hand appliqué.

Bring a basic sewing kit to the first class.

Introduction to Machine Quilting

Quilting, whether by hand or machine, is the array of decorative stitches that secures the layers of the quilt top, batting and backing. Machine quilting allows the quilter to complete a project in a much shorter time than hand quilting. Basic straight stitching and free motion quilting will be emphasized. Sewing machine required, including walking foot and darning foot.

Recommended prerequisite: At least one quarter of Beginning Quiltmaking or the equivalent.

May Block of the Month: May Basket

This BOM pattern is a member favorite, most recently appearing in 2005. The description is from that year's BOM chair, Mary Ann Huggins.

When I was a child, we celebrated the first of May by making paper baskets and filling them with flowers. We hung the baskets on our neighbor's door, rang the doorbell, and ran for cover. I'm not sure when this delightful celebration became extinct, but I thought we might celebrate the day once again by making a basket block and filling it with our favorite floral fabric.

Finished Block Size: 10"

Unfinished Block Size: 10-1/2"

Fabric Selection:

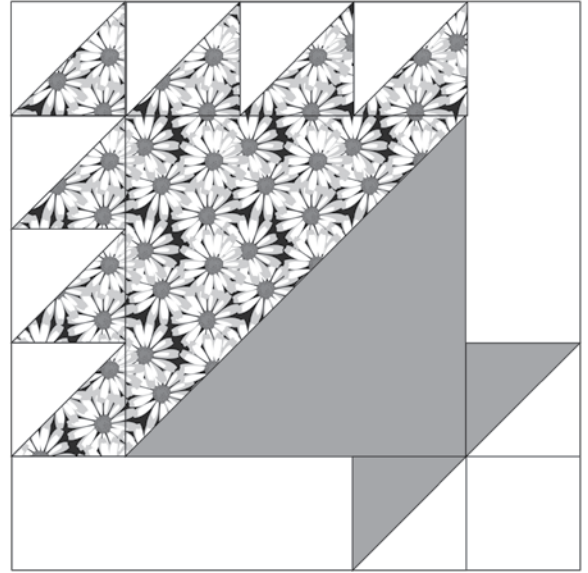
- *Background:* White or white-on-white
- *Basket:* Any solid color you prefer
- Fill your basket with your favorite floral

Cutting:

- *From white cut:* four 3" squares; two 2-1/2"x6 1/2" rectangles; and one 4-3/4" square which you will cut corner-to-corner to make two triangles.
- *From solid cut:* one 6-3/4" square and one 2-3/4" square; cut each square corner-to-corner into two triangles
- *From floral cut:* one 6-3/4" square which you will cut corner-to-corner to make two triangles, and four 3" squares

Assembly:

This block requires seven 2-1/2" half-square triangles each made from one 3" white background square and one 3" floral square. Put the 3" squares, right sides together. Line drawn from corner to corner, and sew



1/4" on either side of the line. Cut apart on the solid drawn line. Trim half-square triangles to measure 2-1/2" square.

Note the direction of triangles when sewing three half-square triangles together to make a unit and four half-square triangles together to make another unit. Sew the *three half-square triangle* unit to the left edge of the large floral triangle. Sew the *four half-square triangle* unit to the top of the large floral triangle. Sew the large solid triangle (basket) to the lower edge of the floral unit. Prepare side units by sewing a small solid triangle to the end of each of the white rectangles (note the direction of the triangles). Sew a rectangle unit to each side of the block. To finish the block sew on the remaining 4-3/4" white triangle to make the lower right corner of the block.
