Calling all Guild Art Quilters

In May, Ranell Hansen and I will be presenting our guilts as the Guild program for the month. We thought it would be wonderful if all of the art quilters in the quild could be recognized for their work by hanging a show of guild members' art quilts at that meeting. Cathe Hedrick will be giving you the details!

Lest you feel intimidated, we want you to know that everyone who submits a guilt will have at least one hung. If you submit more than one, decisions will be made relative to the amount of space available and continuity of the show. We will be asking an Art Quilter to "jury" the show.

I had the experience of having to select guilts for the display case at the Library prior to our last Guild Quilt Show. It really helped me to understand that not getting a quilt selected for a given event did not mean that it was a rejection of the guilt. I had been given a large number of quilts to pick from. I needed to make decisions based on how much room was available, color and composition of the works, and continuity. Otherwise the display would have been a hodge-podge. It really helped me to understand why some of the guilts I have submitted for exhibitions have been rejected. Remember not take it personally. I believe this is important to know.

So please join us for a fun night in celebration of the Art Quilt and of the talents of all of you art quilters out there!

Increase Efficiency and Save Money (and maybe a life, too!)

Every guilt maker knows that keeping your sewing machine in good running order prolongs its life and keeps YOU happy as it hums steadily along, making beautiful creations from fabric and thread. But there's another appliance that's a real work horse, too -- one we don't generally give much thought to: Your clothes dryer.

Everyone knows that you should clean out the lint filter on your clothes dryer regularly to keep the air flowing evenly... but did you ever wonder WHY this is so important? It helps to have a basic understanding of how a dryer actually works.

In a standard dryer, a fan pulls air into the dryer and sends it flowing over a heating source. The heated air is drawn into the tumbling drum where the wet clothes are held. The heat, air flow, and tumbling motion all contribute to evaporating the moisture held in the fabric into the heated air. The warm air and the moisture it holds passes through the filter, which traps the lint and other particles, before expelling the warm, moist air outdoors. This process repeats until enough moisture is removed from the fabric to be considered sufficiently "dry".

If you neglect to clean the lint filter between dryings, moist air cannot be vented from the dryer as easily. The result is that your dryer works less efficiently, making it necessary to run the dryer LONGER to dry a load of clothes, which means HIGHER costs in your electric or gas charges and a SHORTER life span for your dryer. It could even overheat and cause a fire!

WARNING: Just removing the lint is not enough! Using dryer sheets to soften your clothes and fabrics causes a waxy build-up of residue on the lint filter that clogs the fine mesh screen.

The best way to keep your dryer working for a very long time (and reduce your utility bill) is to take that filter out and wash it with hot soapy water and an old toothbrush, or other brush, at LEAST every six months. TRY THIS: Take your dryer filter out, take it to your sink and try running warm water through it... I'll bet it just trickles through, right? Or maybe even puddles? Now give your filter a thorough cleaning as recommended with hot soapy water, then rinse well. Now try running warm water through it again and I'll bet you can see a visible difference!

I tried this, and now my drying time is LESS THAN HALF what it was! How about that!?! You learn something new every day! I certainly didn't realize dryer sheets would do that, so I thought I'd share this important information with all of you!

From Darilyn's Desk

Dear Guild Members,

Due to the dedication and hard work of all of our volunteers, our guild has enjoyed a banner year. We have given hundreds of quilts to those in need locally, welcomed many new members, donated thousands of dollars to community charities, been artistically inspired, and had a lot of FUN!

If you are not currently involved in a guild committee, I encourage you to check out the list of committees in the newsletter or the front of your directory. If you have questions about the duties, either contact the respective Chair or me. Besides being part of your membership responsibility, volunteering is guaranteed to give back much more than you put in!

A slate of prospective Board Officers and Committee Chairs will be distributed at the April meeting. This means I need for you to begin considering where your perfect fit is and let me know by the March meeting.

For those that are newer to the guild, here's how volunteering works. The ten board positions are elected by a member vote held at the May general meeting. Board terms are limited to two years. Only half of the board changes each year. Openings for 2010-2011 include:

- President (gets to wear crowns and go to the head of the refreshment line!)
- VP Programs (books future speakers and plans non-speaker programs)
- Speaker Liaison (hosts the speakers while they are in town)
- Parliamentarian (keeps the board on track; handles the voting)
- Corresponding Secretary (contacts media with meeting dates; mail)

Committee chairs have NO term limit. If you are happy doing your job, you are welcome to continue. Quilt Show News

Here we are at the beginning of 2010 – and that means that our Quilt Show is just around the corner. Preparations have been underway for several months and are going smoothly thanks to a wonderful group of competent women on the committee. We have been meeting on the 2nd Saturday of the month. Please contact me if you are interested in attending and need directions to our meeting place.

The Basics

The show will take place September 25th -26th at Earl Warren Showgrounds, with set-up and a dinner on the preceding Friday (24th). Admission will be \$10 for a weekend pass, or \$8 if purchased in advance. We are also working on ways in which members can "earn" a free ticket to the show (see our To-Do List below.) In addition to the various quilt categories, we will also be accepting submissions for wearables and possibly for home decorator items, such as placemats, table runners, bags, etc. We also are continuing our unique and successful boutique. Further, we will display Challenge Quilts from this year (pockets & postage stamps) and last year (travel posters). There should be a lot of variety and "Harvest of Colors" promises to be a great show.

Needs

Our committee still has a few important positions open. If you can help with any of the following, please contact me or any other Quilt Show committee member (look for the "Harvest of Colors" ribbons on our name badges.)

- **Hanging:** organize the physical hanging and display of quilts and coordinate volunteers
- Featured Artist Coordinator: act as the interface with our featured artist (Norah McMeeking) to help fulfill her requirements for set-up, volunteers, etc. at the show
- Home Dec Coordinator: receive and organize entry forms for this category and coordinate the display of items at the quilt show.

Public Relations

To really make our show a success, we need to get people to attend, which means spreading the word in any way we can. After all, if you throw a party and forget to send the invitations, it won't be much fun! We have bookmarks to distribute, and later in the year we will have a poster to hang around town. We will have a display at the Goleta library in September and will be making "car posters" for you to put in your car as you drive around the area. During the month of September, we would also like to "Blanket the Town with Quilts" – so if you know of any art galleries, store front businesses, or empty storefronts, etc. that might be likely places for a small display, please contact me.

To-Do List

As you know, our show is run by volunteers and your help is needed in lots of areas – even small things can be a big help. Please consider the following:

- Choose the quilt you are going to enter in the show. We would like to have everyone represented! If it's not finished – you've still got several months, but they will fly by, so make a plan to get it ready in time for the submission deadline.
- 2. Start making a list of people to invite to the show. We will have pre-sale tickets available in May or June. Set a goal to sell at least 5-10 tickets before the show. If we all do this, our show will be very successful. This is one way to earn a member ticket to the show.
- 3. Make something to sell in the boutique. If you don't wish to participate in this venture for your own benefit, consider making some items to directly benefit the guild. This is another way to earn a member ticket.
- 4. Start thinking about where you would like to volunteer for the show. There are plenty of jobs to go around, both before and during the show and you can earn your free admission.
- 5. Make a list of places we can display quilts in our "Blanket the Town with Quilts" campaign.

I hope you are getting excited about the show and I look forward to your participating in the coming months.





Block of the Month for March





SPRING BREEZES

Block of the Month - March 2010

Spring breezes are blowing in the ninth installment of our "Quilted Calendar" Block of the Month. Now don't blow this off just because it's all half-square triangles - if we haven't gotten them down by now, here's some serious practice. And with the new year comes a new incentive to make extras... an ArtBin Super Satchel for the winner every month thru the June! So bring one to Guild but don't forget to make a spare for your own Quilted Calendar it's a breeze!

FABRIC:



NEUTRAL -Cut eight 4" squares (A)



MEDIUM PINK/ROSE -Cut two 4" squares (C)

DARK GREEN -Cut two 4" squares (B) LIGHT YELLOW -Cut four 4" squares (D)

ASSEMBLY:

To help your half-square triangle ("HST") units breeze along, draw diagonal lines on the wrong side of all (A) squares.

Create four (A-B) HST units by placing both (B) squares right sides together with two (A) squares, stitch 1/4" from both sides of diagonal line. Cut apart on drawn line. Press to the lighter fabric. Trim to 3 1/2" square.

Repeat for the four (A-C) HST units using both (C) squares and two (A) squares.

Repeat for the eight (A-D) HST units using four (D) squares and remaining four (A) squares.

Layout your HST units as shown and complete your block. Block should measure 12 1/2" square.
