Thanks to your generosity some people will have happier holidays. We delivered to Unity Shoppe 185 cradle bedding sets, 38 quilts of various sizes and 42 holiday stockings. Sixty holiday stockings have been delivered to Hillside House. Since June we have delivered 40 quilts and 40 placemats to Hospice and Visiting Nurses.

Our current project is wheelchair-sized quilts for Hillside House, a permanent residence for people with physical disabilities. Approximately 59 people currently live there: 27 female residents and 29 male residents.

Due to the Dessert Extravaganza and Boutique at the December meeting and the resulting limited space we will have a very small number of kits available but will accept completed items. JANUARY

Tammie Bowser: *Easy and Amazing Quilted Photography*

Tammie Bowser has been sewing all her life. She got a degree from Fashion Institute of Design and Merchandising (FIDM) in 1985 and spent the next 18 years in the fashion industry in Los Angeles. After the birth of her baby, she searched for a business that would enable her to stay home. Quilted photography was born. Tammie has developed software that will take your photo, change it into a pattern using a variety of geometric shapes and provide coloration for each shape. She will share how to follow her pattern and make beautiful quilts. Tammie's lecture is funny, entertaining, informative and inspiring. She will share some of her latest quilts and explain the evolution of quilted photography from the beginning until now. www.quiltedphoto.com

January 11 Workshop: *Pixels Are Magic*

In this workshop students will learn to make an amazingly complicated looking quilt in just a few hours. Be sure to sign up for this workshop in advance because Tammie will make a pattern from your photograph before class and have it ready for you. Tammie will also have pre-sorted fabric available for purchase.

FEBRUARY

Terry Waldron: *The Art of Doing it All*

Terry started quilting in 1993, when she took a workshop from Blanche Young. She got so excited about quilting that she went home and finished her first quilt, queen sized, of course, in one week while teaching high school English full time. She really does know how to do it all. Terry has published a number of books, exhibited her quilts in several national shows and appeared on Alex Anderson's Simply Quilts TV program. Terry will present a trunk show of her work from beginning to present and you leave inspired to take chances and express your own ideas in your quilts, whether traditional or not. www.terrywaldron.com

February 15 Workshop: *Scraffito*

Remember how much fun it was as a kid to get a pack of crayons, scribble all over the page, then color over everything with black crayon then scratch the black off with a pin to reveal beautiful designs? This quilt is based on that art form. It is an easy, fun and highly successful way to create a beautiful and unique art quilt. Even if you are not interested in art quilts, taking classes expands your skills, provides new experiences in fabric and gives you an appreciation for the media. Besides, it is a lot of fun.

MARCH

Robin Gallagher: *KISS: Keep it Sew Simple*

Beautiful quilts don't have to be difficult. Robin takes you on a journey showing you how quilting can be simple and fun. Sometimes what you see as a quilt block is a trick of the eye and is actually assembled in a very different way. Do you like quilts set on point but find it difficult to sew all those long diagonal strips together? Are set-in triangles a challenge? I will show you how I Keep it Sew Simple. March 15 Workshop: *Lety's Bag*

Lety's Bag is a great tote bag/purse that can be made to look different by using different fabrics. Ribbon Play: A Tutorial

When you saw those beautiful ribbons that were awarded to the winners of the Harvest of Colors Quilt Show, did you wonder who made them? How were they made? Well, so did I! Carol Hart graciously agreed to create a tutorial so that others may know how it is done. The tutorial is available for download on the guild website, www.coastalquilters.com. Look for the link to the tutorial on the Gallery page.

But I digress. As the story goes, Carol was the Coordinator of Judging for the 2010 show. At one of the first meetings Marilyn Martin brought in three sample custom ribbons made by guild member Joann Conklin. Joann had been to a quilt show somewhere and seen this style awarded, liked the look and had a pattern explaining how to make the rosette. In addition to being a quilter, Joann is also an excellent seamstress, so she offered to make the ribbons for the 2010 show. After the number of categories was decided, Carol didn't feel right asking Joann to make more than 30 ribbons, so she reverse engineered one and made perhaps a third of them that year.

Carol wasn't the Judging Coordinator for this year's show but gave some assistance to Diane Eardley and worked as a helper on Judging Day. Joann was not able to put in the time to work on ribbons this year so Carol agreed to make them and enlisted some assistance from Gone to Pieces, one of her satellite groups. When asked to show us how the ribbons are made, Carol developed an extensive illustrated tutorial showing every aspect of making the ribbons. She also said, "It would be fun if the tutorial enabled other members to carry on the tradition as it is quite a commitment for just a few individuals to tackle."

It's two years off, but maybe a few more members will enjoy making these and will volunteer when the time comes.

Nedra's quilts were her artistic expression of love for her family and her community. She was a member of the guild for many years, made community quilts, Christmas stockings and placemats and enjoyed our picnics, silent auctions and other events. Though she participated in the challenge and the quilt show, she was too retiring to participate in show and tell. We missed seeing some beautiful quilts, and now we miss the quiltmaker as wells.

2013 Challenge: Judging a Book by Its Cover

The 2013 Challenge event has been scheduled for June 2013. As stated above, the Challenge theme is: Judging a Book By Its Cover. If you are like me, you need plenty of time to percolate an idea, so this announcement is coming to you seven months in advance!

Here are some of the important criteria:

- Quilt design must be **inspired by the cover of a book** (quilt books excluded) but not be an exact replica of the book. You could be inspired by the color, graphics, title or anything else you find on the cover. We hope to NOT have 50 quilts in "shades of grey."
- The quilt **must be 3 layers and quilted** by hand or machine.
- The quilt must **include a "recognizable amount" of the selected fabric** (see photo), which features a navy blue background with colorful book spines forming circular designs. The exact amount of fabric that must be used will be determined and announced later.
- The qualifying fabric must be used in the body of the quilt – using as the binding or backing do not count as meeting the fabric challenge.
- Fat quarters of the fabric will be available for sale at the guild meetings for \$2. If you need to have the fabric mailed to you, please add \$1 and send your request to me at 980 Via Regina, SB, CA 93111.
- You will need to **submit a full-size (book size), color copy or photo of the book cover** that inspires your quilt, to be displayed alongside your quilt on the night of the Challenge.
- **The quilt size cannot exceed 120" perimeter** (for example, 30" x 30" or 20" x 40"). It cannot be smaller than 36" perimeter (9" x 9" or 8" x 10"). For those who haven't studied geometry in a while, perimeter is the entire measurement of the outside edge of the quilt – all sides.
- The quilt, application form and photocopy of book will need to be **submitted prior to the guild meeting on or before June 13, 2013**. The exact date and location of drop-off will be announced at a later time.



Stay tuned for more updates as some of these rules may be clarified and modified as we determine the *need*. For now head to the bookstore or library and start getting inspired!

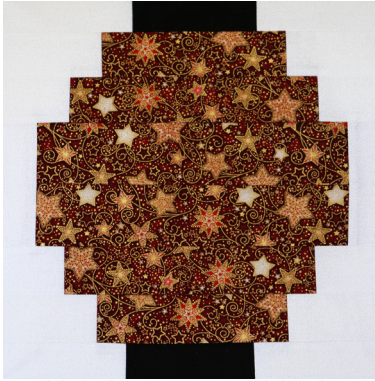

Block of the Month for January

CHINESE LANTERN BLOCK

The Chinese lantern is the first-ever portable lighting. It is the unique traditional folk craftwork of China. Besides being an illumination tool, the lantern also became a source of artistic expression. Fine materials and design would go into crafting lanterns. Calligraphic characters, historical figures, deities and landscapes would adorn their lanterns. At times, artistic contests would be held to crown the best lantern craftsmen. Though electricity has replaced the lantern, lantern festivals bring back the beauty of this illumination tool. Now with this little bit of history, let's begin to make a fantastic Chinese lantern.



FABRIC

 White fabric

 Oriental fabric

 Black

CUTTING

- Cut 6 – 1½" x 4½" – White
- Cut 4 – 2" x 3½" – White
- Cut 4 – 2" x 2½" – White
- Cut 2 – 1½" x 4½" – White
- Cut 2 – 2" x 6½" – Oriental
- Cut 2 – 2" x 8½" – Oriental
- Cut 2 – 2½" x 10½" – Oriental
- Cut 2 – 1½" x 4½" – Black

ASSEMBLY:

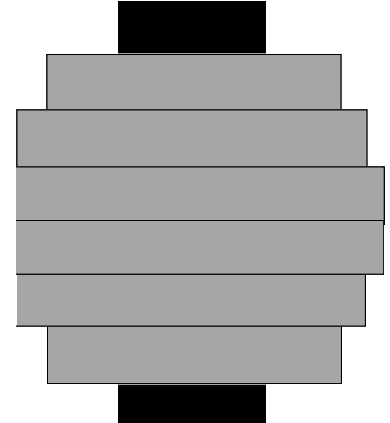
Sew a white 1½" x 4½" to a black 1½" x 4½" to a white 1½" x 4½", making a 1½" x 12½" strip. Make 2 of these. This'll be the top and bottom of the lantern.

Sew a white 2" x 3½" to an oriental 2" x 6½" to a white 2" x 3½", making a 2" x 12½" strip. Make 2 of these.

Sew a white 2" x 2½" to an oriental 2" x 8½" to a white 2" x 2½", making a 2" x 12½" strip. Make 2 of these.

Sew the 2 oriental rectangles 2½" x 10½" together on the long sides, making a 4½" x 10½" strip. Sew a white 1½" x 4½" at each end of the oriental 4½" x 10½" strip.

Sew the 8 strips together as shown. 12" block.
