Ouilt to Raise Funds for the Alzheimer's Association

The Longest Day is a sunrise-to-sunset fundraiser for the Alzheimer's Association, both to raise funds for care, support and research carried on by the association and to show those with the disease and those caring for them that they are not alone. For those with Alzheimer's, every day is the longest day.

The event will take place on June 21, the longest day of the year. Teams are encouraged to engage in an activity from sunrise to sunset. Team Quilters Forever will be quilting all day at Roxanne's, A Wish and a Dream in Carpinteria. We will start at a local coffee shop for coffee and treats, then gather at Roxanne's for a day of creating guilts for people with Alzheimer's, making blocks for an opportunity quilt to raise funds for the Alzheimer's Association, or just working on your own project (or all three). You may sign up for a two-hour shift or you can stay all day. Local merchants will provide food and drinks.

The event will be in full swing at Roxanne's from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., ending with a closing ceremony at the Linden Avenue beach at 8:00 p.m. Registration for the event is \$35, payable to the Alzheimer's Association. From the President's Desk

This month we elect a new board, and it is a good time to look at our purpose for existing as a quilt guild. Our bylaws state:

"The purpose of this guild shall be educational and charitable. The specific purpose is to exchange ideas about quilting, learn new techniques and improve quilting skills. It is also our aim to inform the community about the history and preservation of quilts."

These stated goals translate directly into the monthly activities of the guild.

At meetings we have educational opportunities for members in the form of a lecture and show and tell. There is also an opportunity for members to take a workshop at fees substantially lower than these same speakers charge at commercial venues (\$40/day versus \$75-\$130/day at a quilt show).

Our annual challenge provides an opportunity for members to make a small quilt that meets certain conditions and have it displayed during a meeting. Community Quilts organizes donated fabric and inspires members to make and donate hundreds of quilts for selected charities throughout the year.

At our biannual quilt show we display our work from the previous two years and provide education about quilting traditions and techniques to the public. Organizing these activities and many more not mentioned here requires a small amount of time from many of our members. We welcome people with energy and new ideas to join us on the board and as committee members. We want you!

Check Out Our Library!

Were you intrigued by last month's program to think of painting on a quilt? We have a whole boxful of books about fabric dyeing and painting, which you will find on the table each month, separate from our general quilting books. None of our books describe Annette Kennedy's method, but you will find an abundance of possibilities in their pages.

The Painted Quilt, by Linda and Laura Kemshall, and Fabric Painting, by Cindy Walter, each have their unique emphasis as they cover the basics of using fabric paint on quilts. Mickey Lawler's Skydyes focuses on color-washing fabrics with paint; Elin Noble's Dyes and Paints covers fabric paints but gives greater attention to fabric dyes, while Judy Anne Walter's Creating Color is a recipe book for dyeing fabrics. Exploring Textile Arts: the ULTIMATE guide to manipulating, coloring, and embellishing fabrics is precisely that, with instruction on photo transfer, stamping, screen printing and embossing, plus felting, weaving, pleating, texturizing, cutwork, lace making, appliqué and beading. (Whew!) And there are even more! Come check out our library!

2013 Challenge: Judging a Book by Its Cover

The 2013 Challenge is just around the corner on June 13. **Quilt entries will need to be turned in at the May 9th guild meeting**, which means that by the time you are reading this, your quilt should be nearing completion. The entry form is available on our website at www.coastalquilters.org. Please refer to previous newsletters for challenge quilt guidelines.

The quilt, application form and photocopy of the book cover will need to be submitted prior to or at the guild meeting on May 9. If you need to make special arrangements to deliver your quilt, please contact us (contact numbers on entry form.)

We will be asking our voters to look at the quilts and judge them according to the following criteria. Prizes will be awarded in each of the these categories:

- Overall Favorite Your personal favorite
- Best Overall Interpretation of Challenge Theme

 based on the color and design of the quilt and in comparison to the inspiration book (and not necessarily a replica of the cover)
- Best Interpretation Based on Graphics – based on the graphics shown on the inspiration book
- Best Interpretation Based on Color – based on the colors shown on the inspiration book
- Best Use of Challenge Fabric
- · Most Humorous

We will explain these categories more at the June meeting, but please contact us if you have any questions. We hope you are all ready for a great Challenge show!

Also, please make a note that the June guild meeting will begin promptly at 6:30 p.m. with a parade of the Challenge quilts. They will then be hung for further viewing and voting at the break.

Block of the Month for June ROLLING NINE PATCH

We're rolling down to the last block for the 2012-2013 year. Let's all create some interesting "rolling stone" blocks for a great send-off!

FABRIC		CUTTING	
	Light fabric	Cut 13 – 21/8" squares Cut 4 – 31/4" squares	
	Print Fabric	Cut $4 - 2\frac{7}{8}$ squares Cut $4 - 3\frac{1}{4}$ squares	

ASSEMBLY:

To make the half square triangle units, mark the diagonal with a mechanical pencil on the wrong side of the lighter fabric. Place two squares right sides together and pin or glue in place. Sew a scant ¼" on either side of the line. Cut on the line.

Press towards the darker triangle. Trim off the "ears."







Resulting Units:






Arrange the half-square triangle units with the plain squares to make the block above. Sew the units together by rows, pressing the seams in one direction. Alternate rows should be pressed in the opposite direction. The completed block will be $12\frac{1}{2}$ ". (Finished size 12")
