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## **April Meeting: Bobbi Finley** Tile Quilt Revival Lecture and Trunk Show: Visualize the future as you connect with the past.

Bobbi's lecture includes a digital slide presentation to introduce the historic Tile Quilts that inspired our contemporary interpretations. Approximately 20 slides are shown. The slide presentation is followed by a trunk show of about 12 contemporary tile quilts. This is followed by another group of a dozen or so contemporary quilts which are also inspired by historic quilts, including quilts from the new book, Fresh Perspectives, Reinventing 18 Classic Quilts from the International Quilt Study Center & Museum.



### Workshop April 11: Making a Tile Quilt Block!

In the last 1/3 of the 19th century, there was a distinctive genre of appliqué quilts made with narrow lines of background fabric showing between the appliquéd pieces. Because the narrow lines of background fabric re-



semble "grout" and the appliquéd pieces "tiles", these quilts generally are called tile quilts.

In this workshop, participants will learn the technique of making a tile quilt block while exploring color, design and fabric choices. It's not just about needle-turn appliqué! The emphasis will be on how to get started making a tile guilt rather than how to appliqué, however instruction and review of basic needle-turn appliqué will be included.

The block preparation method taught is a simple, direct way of working from a line-drawing pattern. The method eliminates the usual hand-appliqué concerns of seam allowances, reversing images, and placement on the background. A choice of 15" pattern will be provided or participants can use a line drawing of their own making or choice.

Lots of individual guidance is provided with fabric and color choices, as needed.

Susan Else: Off the Wall: Quilting in Three Dimensions on Aug 14



In this lecture, Susan discusses the relationship of her work to the art-quilt movement and contemporary folk art, as well as to other three-dimensional textiles. She explores how sewn cloth differs from traditional sculptural materials such as clay and metal, and she describes her own metamorphosis from guilt-maker to sculptor. Although she never expected to become an artist herself, Susan grew up in a family of artists who shaped her personal vision. After "fooling around" with fabric and fiber for twenty years, she started making quilted sculpture in 1999. In addition to one-woman shows, she has participated in many travelling exhibitions, including Quilt National. Her work is in public and private collections throughout the U.S.

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## **California Sesquicentennial Quilt**

The project started in 1996 is nearing completion in 2014. Sixty-seven appliqué artists from throughout California completed vignettes highlighting the 58 counties. Six Coastal quilters are among the artists listed on the signage near the quilt in the California Museum in Sacramento. They include: Ellen Heck, Karin Cooper, Lena Scharfeld, Barbara Maxwell, Melody Bollay and myself, Pat Masterson.

One hundred and fifty expert quilters hand quilted on this historical textile before it was presented to the State of California in Coloma where gold was discovered in 1848. After the quilt traveled the state for two years during the Sesquicentennial celebration and was viewed by over four million people, it was placed in its permanent home in the California Museum at 1020 "O" Street in Sacramento.

For a number of years, it was displayed on a slant board during the school year where over 14,000 school children viewed it as part of the California history curriculum. In the past three years, the California Heritage Quilt Project (CHQP) Board funded a \$14,000 custom fabricated case that now allows the quilt to be displayed year round without fear of damage to the fibers.

The latest addition to the exhibit is a kiosk which allows an interactive experience and provides the visitor with information about specific areas the viewer selects; including the name and statement from the artist and significant historical facts relating to that area of the quilt. This 21st century addition also includes a section about the history of the quilt, names of quilters involved in the project, an educational fun game based on a timeline, and interesting facts about California history.

On May 18, the CHQP Board will celebrate the official completion of this historic project by hosting a quilt appraisal day at the museum and a short ceremony recognizing the effort and people involved. ## Library News: Who's Got Scraps?

We all do! With the price of fabric moving ever upward, few of us can afford to toss out project leftovers. But what to do with them all? Especially when so-called "scrap-buster" projects tend to be very small. These books can help!

Why make a scrap quilt? **Alex Anderson** offers seven great reasons: 1) You have the scraps! 2) You love the scrappy look, with lots of different fabrics. 3) Making a scrap quilt is an opportunity to play in your stash, and 4) evaluate your fabric collection. 5) A scrap holds the viewer's interest, inviting a closer look at all the fabrics. 6) A scrap quilt evolves as you make it, with design decisions remaining open and flexible. And finally, 7) "Making a scrap quilt will help you grow as a quiltmaker," says Alex in *Scrap Quilting with Alex Anderson*.

**Kim Brackett**, author of *Scrap-Basket Sensations: More Great Quilts* from 2 1/2" Strips, would add another reason: You can mix in a jellyroll or two with your scraps and stash strips. And **Bonnie Hunter**, in *String Fling: Scrappy, Happy and Loving It!*, loves the memories that come up as she uses fabric bits from past projects. All three authors mention that the "what was I thinking?" fabrics we are all hiding are prime for scrap quilting. "If it's still ugly, you just didn't cut it small enough!" advises Bonnie.

**Alex Anderson** focuses on seven traditionally scrappy designs including Bow Ties, Baskets, Stars, Flying Geese and Shoo Fly, offering strategies for fabric selection, block construction, settings, borders and quilting.

**Kim Brackett's** *Scrap-Basket Sensations* offers 18 patterns all made from strips that can be cut from yardage or scraps or pre-cut. All are super-simple-to-make yet surprisingly complex-looking.

String Fling, by **Bonnie Hunter**, features string piecing on foundations of phone book pages, which then form the backgrounds, the block-corner settings, the sashings and the borders of these 13 projects.

Give these books a whirl and see what happens with your scrap collection. As Bonnie says, "Once you go scrappy, you may never go back."

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## Block of the Month 2013-14: EVERYBODY IS A STAR

## May's Block: Spinning Star Redux

Last August, Block of the Month featured a spinning star block, which is very different than this month's; hence, redux, meaning "brought back." This time we chose a jewel tone solid paired with a matching floral print set off by a white background. The piecing is simple; the trick is in the arrangement. Enjoy!

### **Cutting Instructions**

PIECES		
White Background	» Cut 6 - 3 %" x 3 %" squares	
Jewel Tone Solid	» Cut 4 - 3 %" x 3 %" squares	
Floral Print	» Cut 6 - 3 %" x 3 %" squares	




On wrong side of lightest fabric, draw diagonal line with the marking tool of your choice. Sew a  $\frac{1}{4}$ " seam on each side of marked line; cut apart on marked line. Press open to make pieced squares.


### **Block Assembly**

Layout pieced-square units using Assembly Diagram as guide. Sew rows together to make block.
