Shelley Swanland April 9 "Cathedral Windows and So Much More"

Shelley will present a collection of approximately forty quilts from the last eight years.

Quilts from the books, "Machine Stitched Cathedral Windows" and "Machine Stitched Cathedral



Stars" are included as well as quilts from articles, the Simply Quilts appearance and the patterns. It also includes current works, personal stories and anecdotes from experiences in the world of quilt designing.

Workshop: April 10 Cathedral Window Sampler

Learn to make a Cathedral Window quilt completely by machine using three-dimensional piecing. First learn the basic elements, squares,

triangles, an X block and an O block. Then put it all together in the Cathedral Window section. Quilting will be thoroughly explained. Kits will be available for purchase (optional). Pattern required - \$5 for workshop participants.

Rami Kim May 14 "Folded Fabric Elegance"

This lecture focuses on Rami's book "Folded Fabric Elegance" about 3-dimensional textures. She brings most of



the samples in the book and shares stories behind the creating process and publishing. You can see the real things to examine quintessence of quilts, wearables, bags and home-decor items as pillows & table runners.

Workshop: May 15 The 5th Dimension

Go beyond traditional 3-D. In this technique workshop you will learn five of the exotic and unusual methods that are the trademark of Rami's award winning work including hexagon and biscuit chopkey, mirror-imaged continuously folded prairie points, harlequin tucks, North American hand smocking and lined prairie points. This workshop could be the answer to those who wish to know about adding 3-dimensional textures and a lot more extra touches to art-to-wear and quilts. www.ramikim.com

Thanks Is So Much More Than Just a Word

When Deanna first came to work with us, I had no idea how much my life would change over the next few years. We sat about six feet from each other and inevitably we talked; over time she became one of my closest and dearest friends. We talked about all sorts of things – no issue was taboo – and found that we were able to tell each other anything and the other would listen, even things that no one else ever wanted to talk about

When my husband's health became quite severe (they shared many of the same health issues and doctors), Richard would say, "If Deanna can do it, well I guess I can, too." They would share tips about things that helped them and information they learned that might help the other, and news from doctor's visits and hospital tests was equally shared. She and I laughed about a lot of things, also shed some tears, and when Richard passed away, she was there offering me encouragement, making my workdays bearable.

Just about a year ago, Deanna decided it was finely time to retire, that even part-time work was just taking too much out of her. We stayed in touch, talking by phone, a lunch or dinner here and there, and even though her spirit was still strong, I watched as my friend slowly faded. We had dinner in December, and as usual she made a private comment to me about something. I thought about it a lot over the next couple of weeks and realized that I had been holding on to some angry feelings that I didn't even realize were there... and I was able to finally let them go, relieving me of a burden I didn't even know I was carrying. Thank you for that, my friend.

By New Year's, word came that Deanna was in the hospital I.C.U. at Cottage and only her close family were permitted to see her during her week's hospitalization. Her prognosis was not encouraging this time, so I was overjoyed to hear my friend's voice when she called me at work after she was able to return home. I told her that there were so many people thinking about her, and I think I embarrassed her when I told her that she had no idea how much she meant to so many people.

At our January Guild meeting, Arlene Stepputat from Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care of Santa Barbara spoke about their programs and services, and described how our donated quilts fit within their mission to serve those in our community who need special assistance. Her words touched me personally, as my husband was very briefly at Serenity House before he passed. I was able to speak with her that evening and told her about my friend, Deanna, who was then being helped by their in-home care services. I asked if perhaps one of our donated quilts could be given to my friend, who by then was confined to a wheel chair and the weather had become so cold lately.

Deanna called me at home the evening of January 20th to tell me that she had been given one of the quilts, and to thank me – and all of you, too – for the lovely gift. She said "It's so beautiful!" I could tell from her voice that she was growing tired and that talking was a strain, so I talked for a bit about our guild and what we do, told her to enjoy the quilt, to stay warm and consider it our "hug" to her.

On Friday, January 23rd we received word that Deanna had passed away that morning.

So on behalf of my very dear friend, Deanna – and myself – thank you for that wonderful gift to her, and the gift to me of one last chance to say good-bye. I am so grateful to have had her in my life.

I often take my husband's dog for a walk at lunch time, especially enjoy the sunny days. We invariably encounter a single Monarch butterfly on those walks, flittering around us before finally fluttering away. When we see one, I always say "Hi, Richard! I'm thinking of you today." A few days after receiving word about Deanna, we were walking on another bright, warm sunny day and encountered two Monarchs, flittering and circling each other about six inches apart, their bright wings glowing in the sun. That day I said hello to both of them....

I don't know who wrote this verse, but I'd like to share it with you:

"A butterfty lights beside us like a sunbeam,
And for a brief moment its glory
And beauty belong to our world.
But then it flies again,
And though we wish it could have stayed...
We feel lucky to have seen it."

Advice from a 1949 Singer Sewing Manual



Advice from a Singer Sewing Manual from 1949:

Prepare yourself mentally for sewing. Think about what you are going to do. . . never approach sewing with a sigh or lackadaisically. Good results are difficult when indifference predominates. Never try to sew with a sink full of dirty dishes or

beds unmade. When there are urgent housekeeping chores, do these first so your mind is free to enjoy your sewing. . .When you sew, make yourself as attractive as possible. Put on a clean dress. Keep a little bag full of French chalk near your sewing machine to dust your fingers at intervals. Have your hair in order, powder and lipstick put on . . .[If] you are constantly fearful that a visitor will drop in or your husband will come home and you will not look neatly put together, you will not enjoy your sewing as you should. .

BEE'S HIVE

April 2015 | Block of the Month Coastal Quilters Guild

Bee Saunders designed this block that reminds us of a bee hive. The winner of this set of blocks earns the title Queen Bee.

FABRICS

Background: Kona white background - provided at March meeting

Foreground: Prints or solids in **hot pink, orange,** and **lime green**. Use <u>three different</u> fabrics in the block.



White fabric:

Cut 2 strips 1-1/2" x 9-1/2"

Cut 2 strips 1-1/2" x 7-1/2"

Cut 2 strips 1-1/2" x 4-1/2"

Cut 2 strips 1-1/2" x 2-1/2"


Pink, Orange, and Lime fabrics (in any order):

- **A** 2-1/2" x 2-1/2" square
- **B** 2" x 7-1/2" logs (2) 2" x 4-1/2" logs (2)
- **C** 2"x 12-1/2" logs (2) 2"x 9-1/2" logs (2)

CONSTRUCTION

Use 1/4" seam allowances.

- 1. Use log cabin construction method to build the block from the center out.
- 2. Trim the block to $12-1/2'' \times 12-1/2''$, being sure the square is centered at the 6-1/4'' mark (\mathbf{x}).
