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Future Programs



August 13 Bobbi Porter "We All Have to Start Somewhere"

See the progression of my quilting journey, featuring both original and traditional quilts. You will also see quilt tops... I'm waiting for a quilt top show. I'm a scrap quilter, who just can't commit to using just a few fabrics.





Workshop August 14 "Modern Variation of Log Cabin"

Do you have scraps that you'd like to turn into

an original quilt using a traditional quilt pattern? This workshop is for you! Bobbi Porter will teach a way to do a modern variation of the traditional log cabin pattern. During the workshop, participants will design and sew a four-block quilt, each block being 12" in size. The class starts with drafting. Participants will have a number of options in laying out the traditional pattern, from varying the center size, the log width, and the number of logs. Each finished four-block quilt could be the base for a larger project if desired, but the object will be to finish the small quilt in an original way.



September 10 Nancy Rink "Quilts Inspired by History"


Nancy will share the history that inspired the quilts in the two books she has done in collaboration with her husband

Oliver Rink. Away From Home is the story of the Lowell, Mass factory girls who were the first US female work force from 1830-1850. The eight quilts from the book plus the Mill Girls block-of-themonth quilt Nancy designed will be part of the trunk show as well as the quilts and BOM from *El Camino Real: Quilts Inspired by Early History*.

September 11 Workshop Strip It Three Ways

This pattern includes directions for three different quilts - Prism, Rainbow Square, and Weave - that

can be made from one 2 1/2" strip roll. The fabrics shown are Marcus Ombre hand-dyes. You can also use your own fabrics. Batiks work well with this pattern, as will other blender type fabrics.

October 8

Cathy Miller - "The Singing Quilter" "Sing A Song of Quilting"

The lecture is a combination of songs, stories and trunk show. We have 5 CDs of songs about quilting and will present a selection of nine or ten of these, along with introductory stories, and a showing of some of Cathy's quilts between songs.

Workshop October 9 Mock Mola Applique Raw Edge Machine Reverse Applique

This class features Cathy's fast and easy technique for reverse appliqué. It is a great way to use "holy" fabric, that you can't bear to cut up, and wonderful for trying new design ideas. Students will learn this technique by working on a small individual project using two layers of fabric, plus batting and backing. With Cathy's help, each student will design their own piece. Machine quilting will attach all the layers together, then the top layer is cut to reveal the design. The pieces will be mostly completed at the end of the class.

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Sew for Veterans Workshop: A Resounding Success!

More than thirty Guild members and one guest cut, sewed, trimmed, designed, layered, quilted, chatted and laughed their way to a successful workshop on June 13th. The room literally hummed with the energy of people hard at work. At this writing, there are 19 quilts, complete with labels, ready for delivery, with more on the verge of completion.

Other barometers of success: our design team produced 21 kits, some of which were immediately snatched up by members perusing the kit offerings. And our stash was reduced from a 15" x 20" stuffed bin to a stack about 5" tall: all that fabric went into making quilts. Many of us enjoyed a free tri-tip lunch at the Goleta Valley Community Center, prepared by four local churches for Old Town Goleta.

All the quilts from this project go to Visiting Nurse and Hospice Care (VNHC) for veterans in their Hospice Care program. The quilts, when available, are given to veterans as part of the very moving ceremony called "a pinning." The veterans are thanked for their service and given a certificate of appreciation, a flag pin, and a rubber ducky dressed in the uniform of the veteran's branch of service. The rubber ducky provides a moment of laughter in the otherwise solemn ceremony, but tears flow when the red, white and blue quilt is unfurled across the veteran's bed or wheelchair.

And that's why we make these quilts: because in addition to the physical and emotional comfort the quilts provide, they are deeply meaningful to both veteran and family. VNHC, understandably excited about the Sew for Veterans project, sent a photographer to record the workshop's activities. These photos will soon be available on the Guild website.

We will deliver finished quilts to VNHC in mid-July, following a Parade of Quilts at the July Guild meeting. If you have a quilt nearing completion, please try to finish it in time for the meeting. Please also return any leftover materials and bring fabric donations to help rebuild our stash.

Thank you to everyone who participated, from donating fabric to making blocks and attending the workshop. A good time was had by all!

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"Thanks for the Memories!"

When I wrote an article that appeared in our May newsletter about the Desert Valley Quilters quilt show in Las Vegas that I attended in March this year ("Rainbows Over the Desert"), I purposefully left out a "side story" that also took place during that visit.

You may recall that I mentioned meeting up with an acquaintance from Santa Barbara that I had not seen since 1977-78. Her name is Georgi Shalhoob (formerly Georgi Georgi – both families are long-time Santa Barbarians). As you already know, I discovered Georgi is a fellow quilter, but what I omitted is that she also makes commissioned "memory quilts".

My husband collected many t-shirts of places he had been or was interested in, mostly notably his Naval service, Native American heritage and especially NAS-CAR racing. When he passed away in 2012, I just could not bring myself to give those shirts away, but I had no idea what I was going to do with all of them. So when I traveled to Las Vegas in March, I took them along with the intent of talking to Georgi about maybe assembling a memory quilt. I wasn't definitely sure that was what I wanted to do with them, as many of such quilts that I had seen did not really strike my fancy.

We went out to dinner at a Mexican restaurant, and over margaritas she showed me photos of some of the many memory quilts she had made over the past several years. One in particular stood out for me: It was made for a young girl who had been active in gymnastics, but then became injured and could no longer compete; Georgi made a quilt incorporating material from many of the girl's costumes and used sashing to let each "block" stand on its own. It was really quite striking, and after looking at her photos I made the decision to go ahead with Richard's memory quilt.

At the time, she was already commissioned to make several quilts for upcoming June graduations, but I was not in any rush, so she took on the project. We corresponded by text and verbally a few times; at one point she was stuck on sashing material, so I suggested maybe a denim-look fabric, as Richard generally wore blue jeans. The construction process was on.

I received a message that the quilt was finished and that she was making a quick trip over here to Santa Barbara

the weekend of June 6th, so she brought me the quilt on that date. There had been fifteen shirts with quite large graphic designs, and she used every one of them, setting them off with a blue chambray fabric. Now I just need to make a label for the quilt to include Georgi Shalhoob as the quilt maker and Lin Zhao as the long arm quilter. I couldn't be more pleased with my quilt! In fact, I've slept under the quilt every night since then!

If anyone is interested in having a very special quilt

made for you, please get in touch with me, and I will be happy to give you Georgi's contact information.



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August Block of the Month: What's Black and White and Red All Over?

A newspaper? A sunburned zebra? An embarrassed penguin? A Dalmatian that ate a lipstick? Well, yes--but no. It's the August Block of the Month!

This month's block must include black, white, and red fabrics, solids or patterns, but no other colors are allowed. Your block must be pieced, and it should finish at 12 ½" square. The complexity of the piecing is up to you: a four-patch is as good as a Carpenter's Wheel. Enter as many blocks as you wish, but please make each one different.
