## February Speaker: Janis Rivera

Janis Rivera is one of the few certified teachers for Laura Heine's collage-style of quilt design and construction. Her lecture, "Collage Quilting Without Falling to Pieces" will focus on this collage style. (Much of this collage-style of quilting can be seen online at Laura's website, www.fiberworks-heine.com). Janis will also feature her own collage quilts, as well as quilts made using Laura's patterns, which can also be seen online.


## February Workshop: "Teeny Tiny Under the Sea"



Have you wanted to try your hand at collage quilting? Or do you want to expand your knowledge and skills at collage quilting? This workshop is for you. Although Laura Heine's original patterns for these under-the-sea creatures are large, the patterns for this class are down-sized to be worked on in a workshop setting. Patterns for the quilts are required for the workshop. Patterns for the mermaid, sea turtle, and octopus are all included in one pattern, which costs \$20 (\$25 retail, minus 20\% for CQG members). In addition, kits may be purchased (the kits are optional - you can also choose to bring your own materials to the workshop). Kits for the mermaid and octopus are $\$ 28$ each ( $\$ 35$ retail, minus $20 \%$ for CQG members); kits for the sea turtle are $\$ 24$ (\$30 retail, minus 20\% for CQG members). Kits include all fabric needed for the top, plus Pattern Ease. Quilt kits will be available for purchase at the workshop or the night of the lecture, but if you want one and haven't contacted workshop coordinator Margaret Dear already, email her to reserve one for you.

## March Speaker: Pam Hadfield

Pam Hadfield will be giving us a trunk show of her work at our meeting on March 12. Pam's trunk show will include a variety of quilts that are pieced, appliqued, and wool appliqued, as well as a collection of challenges and seasonal quilts. Her current interests also include pictorial quilts.

## March Workshop: "Whimsy Dresdens"

Although the Dresden Plate pattern is a traditional piecing pattern, Pam will show us whimsical Dresdens. Every Whimsy
 Wedge will be different because of the fabrics chosen by the maker. These wedges can be turned into a pillow, table runner or quilt-sized quilt. A pattern and set of rulers is required; the pattern is $\$ 3$, and the bundle of rulers is $\$ 24$. Individual rulers are $\$ 14$ each.

## President's Message



Based on feedback from members, it seems that our January program and workshop were an overwhelming success. I guess it does make a difference when we bring in more renowned speakers. I know that I am personally inspired by Edyta's presentation and class. In fact, I'm planning to work on more of those house blocks today, just as soon as I finish this message. I went into the workshop planning only to do the small sample.

I want to apologize for causing any alarm with my message in last month's newsletter regarding our financial status. We are NOT in any danger. It is not unusual for us to have to dip into our savings in the fiscal years in which there is no quilt show, but l'm not comfortable draining our reserves too low. In our research, we have discovered some errors in billing that have been corrected and have looked at ways to cut future expenditures. During the 2019-2020 fiscal year, we may have been a little heavy on "big speaker" programs (which I know we all enjoy). Our programs between now and June are already established, but we will be cutting back on somewhat on the more expensive programs and getting creative with offering more affordable programs during some of the months (as we already do.)

It is also very important that we sell tickets for our Opportunity Quilt, as, next to our dues, that is our main source of income for this year. Your Board also discussed bringing back the fabric/notions auction that we did with great success several years ago. This would not be until 2021, most likely, and we would need a group of people willing to organize the effort.

One other decision made by your Board is regarding the workshop fee. As reported in December, we raised the price by $\$ 5$. However, after researching the past and upcoming workshop fees, we realize that was not quite enough. It is our unanimous feeling that the workshop fees paid by the attendees should cover the cost of the room rental, the teacher's class fee and lunch. After doing the calculations, we decided that the workshop fee needs to be raised to $\$ 50$ beginning in March to cover these costs. (Note that anyone already registered for the March workshop will be grandfathered at $\$ 45$.) The non-member fee will be raised to $\$ 10$ more than the member fee, so will therefore be set at $\$ 60$; previously it was only $\$ 5$ more. These fees are also well in line with what other similar guilds charge for their workshops. It is worth mentioning that 2011 was the last time that our workshop fees were raised.

During the next fiscal year, which begins July 1, 2020, we will have our biggest fundraiser, our Quilt Show. It will be critical that we sell as many tickets as possible. Start telling your friends and relatives and be ready to help us promote the event, as well as signing up to volunteer in any way you can. As a past Quilt Show Chairperson, I can tell you that word of mouth is really the best advertisement and,

## Challenge: The 3 T's

"You'll never be bored when you try something new" Dr. Seuss.


Why a rectangle? From the book Visual Finesse - Proportion and Scale: The Golden Mean is believed to be the most pleasing dimension for art. It is based on the ratio of 8 to13. (6"x 10", 12"x 20", 18"x 30", 20" x 32", etc.) . Try Googling "golden mean!" The rectangle provides beautifully balanced dimensions and good directional movement. Ladies, more than likely this subtle dimensional change will enhance your design better than a square.
Rules: Technique New-to-You (in construction or embellishment), plus Two Types of Embellishment. Rectangle shape not to exceed 120" perimeter. Quilt of 3 layers made only by participant. 4 " hanging sleeve sewn to top back of entry. New technique "sample" not mandatory, those submitted will be displayed. Challenge Entry Forms will be available to download and print from the Guild website and printed copies will be available at February's meeting.

## Rosie Lee Tompkins: A Retrospective

Quoting from the BAMPFA website:
"The Berkeley Art Museum and Pacific Film Archive (BAMPFA)
 announced in October, 2019 its acquisition of nearly 3,000 works by African American quilt makers, including more than 500 pieces by the acclaimed artist Rosie Lee Tompkins, from the late Oakland collector Eli Leon.

The Eli Leon Collection, believed to be the largest of its kind, comprises quilts as well as assemblage and embroidery by more than 400 black artists. Leon, who collected the works for decades and died in 2018, willed the collection to BAMPFA in what the museum called one of the largest bequests of African American art ever donated to a United States museum.

The collections forms the basis of a major retrospective opening Feb. 19, 2020 of some 80 quilts by Tompkins, an internationally renowned Richmond artist championed by Leon, including previously unseen pieces. Outgoing BAMPFA director Lawrence Rinder, who's co-curating the ret-
 rospective with Elaine
Yau, previously worked with Leon to show Tompkins' work in 1997.

In 2022, BAMPFA will also mount an exhibition showcasing the broader collection, which includes pieces by some 400 artists such as Arbie Williams, Lawrence Brackens, Gladys Henry, Sherry Byrd and Angie Tobias".

## Block of the Month for March 2020 Irish Wedding Ring

## $12 \times 12^{\prime \prime}$ Block (12.5" x 12.5" Unfinished)



March can be chilly but we can all warm up to a tribute to St. Paddy's Day! Choose a couple of cheerful bright green solids or prints and stitch up a ring.
~Stripes not recommended, but if you do, careful placement might be required~

## Cutting

- White solid or white on white print:

Cut 2-2" x 20" Strips
Cut 2-2" $\times 6$ 1/2" Strips
Cut 2-2" $\times 3$ 1/2" Strips
Cut 4-41/4" Squares

- Deeper Green solid or print:

Cut 1-2" $\times 20^{\prime \prime}$ Strip
Cut 1-2" $\times 4^{\prime \prime}$ Strip
Cut 2-4 1/4" Squares

## - Bright Green solid or print:

Cut 1-2" x 20" Strip
Cut 1-2" $\times 4^{\prime \prime}$ Strip

## Assembly <br> Use $1 / 4$ " seam allowances.

1. Draw a line from corner to corner on the two White $41 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ squares. This is the cutting line. Draw a line $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ from the cutting line on both sides of the cutting line. These are the sewing lines. Pin Deeper Green 4 1/4" square on White 4 $1 / 4$ " square right sides together. Stitch on the sewing lines. Trim units to $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ square.
2. Sew the $2^{\prime \prime} \times 20^{\prime \prime}$ strip of white to the $2^{\prime \prime} \times 20^{\prime \prime}$ strip of Bright Green. Press seam to the green. Cut into ten $2^{\prime \prime}$ units. Sew units together to make four small 4-patch units measuring $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ square.
3. Sew the White $2^{\prime \prime} \times 20^{\prime \prime}$ strip to the Deeper Green $2^{\prime \prime} \times 20^{\prime \prime}$ strip. Press seam to the green. Cut into ten $2^{\prime \prime} \times 2^{\prime \prime}$ units.
4. Sew the Bright Green $2^{\prime \prime} \times 4^{\prime \prime}$ strip of to the Deeper Green $2 " \times 4$ " strip Press seam to the green. Cut into two 2" units. Sew units together as shown to make one 4-patch unit measuring 3 1/2" square.
5. Sew the White $2^{\prime \prime} \times 31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strip to the sides of the 4 -patch unit in (4.). Press seam to the green.
6. Sew the White $2^{\prime \prime} \times 61 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ strip to the sides of the unit in (5.) Press seam to the green.
7. Arrange units to make the block as shown. Sew units together in rows 1, 2 and 3 . Then sew the finished rows together. Block should measure $121 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ square.
