President's Message

What a wonderful turnout we had for our first Zoom Guild meeting on August 13. I'm so pleased that so many are courageous enough to try this new technology and socialize in the best way we can in the present situation. Of course, I greatly look forward to seeing everyone in person again, too. I have received positive feedback about the meeting, with the possible exception that it ran a



little long. It was about the length of our usual Guild meetings, but I think it's a little less comfortable to sit in front of a screen for that length of time. We will try to tighten up the timing for our September meeting - where we will have our speaker, Susan Else, join us virtually. I encourage anyone who has not joined us for Zoom meetings to make the effort. We have two volunteers, Bee Saunders and Sam McIlraith, who will happily help you work out the kinks.

To date, the mask project has completed over 5700 masks! Over the weekend, I organized and inventoried what is currently on hand. We only have about 200 adult masks, but have accumulated over 1000 children's masks. Many of these student masks will be going to St. Raphael's as soon as we get an accurate count from their administration. Others will be distributed to students as they are allowed to return to in-class instruction. The adult masks will be distributed where needed, based on requests, including ongoing needs of Unity Shoppe. We have a special project making holiday masks for the staff at Unity Shoppe. We recently delivered masks, as well as Community Quilts, to Domestic Violence Solutions. Watch for information about this event on Instagram and Facebook. The future of the mask project is uncertain, as the number of mask-makers has dwindled to only a handful. I appreciate all of the efforts that have been put into this important project and those who have given their time to make so many masks.

During our August Board meeting, we adopted a budget for the 2020/2021 fiscal year. There is obvious concern over our finances due to not being able to have our quilt show this year. We have been brainstorming some possible fundraising alternatives, such as an online quilt

auction. Nancy Butterfield has agreed to lead the effort, along with Pam Holst, but they would love to have a committee of members willing to figure this out. I hope we can count on some creative thinkers to join the effort and assist the Guild in moving through this difficult time.

A workshop via Zoom? What???

Extended Learning Sewing Class

Ranell Hansen will be teaching sewing and quilting by Zoom this fall through SBCC School of Extended Learning, known formerly as Adult Education.

Classes are free and will be held on Monday evenings and Wednesday afternoons. The classes are called Individualized Sewing, and will include demonstrations and personalized instruction. Topics to be covered include two quilt patterns, lessons in hand stitching and embroidery, clothing construction, and advice on whatever sewing problem comes your way.






Block of the Month for October 2020 Rolling Gears

12 x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" Unfinished)





This block is called Rolling Gears! So get those gears rolling and make this a bright block. Get three fabrics, one plain and two different print fabrics.



• Orange:

Cut 8 - 2 7/8" Squares Cut 4 - 2 1/2" Squares Cut 1 - 4 1/2" Squares

• Yellow:

Cut 8 - 2 7/8" Squares


• Green:

Cut 4 - 2 1/2" Squares Cut 4 - 2 1/2" x 4 1/2" Rectangles

Assembly

For best results, please use scant ¼" seams.

1. Make the Half-Square Triangles (HST): Put the yellow 2 7/8" squares with orange 2 7/8" squares right sides together. Draw a line from corner to corner on the wrong side of the yellow fabric. Sew 1/4" on each side of the line. Cut on the line and press to dark. This will give you 2 HST. You will get eight HSTs.










2. Following the diagram, sew four half square triangles together (Unit A).






3. Sew 2 1/2" orange and green squares together. Sew the rectangle to the side of these squares. Make 4 of these units (Unit B).



4. Lay out the blocks and rotate them to match the diagram. Sew three blocks together to make three rows then sew all rows together.
