March Speaker: Rose Parr "Sew Smart: The Ergonomics of Healthy Quilting"

Whether you are sewing on a domestic or a longarm machine, quilting can be a real pain in the neck! Rose Parr has been sewing for over 40 years, quilting for more than 30 years, and a Personal Trainer since 1995. In addition, she holds certifications in Ergonomics, Nutrition, Arthritis, and Old Adult Training. Healthy quilting includes the ergonomics of sewing, pressing, cutting, free motion quilting and longarm quilting; stretches designed for "quilters neck",



sore shoulders, lower backache, carpal tunnel syndrome prevention, the importance of drinking water, moving our bodies, and other tips so we can sew smart to sew long!

Program Director: Arranges for program speakers and workshops for the future year. *Incumbent:* Susan Bullington Katz Third term allowed by Board vote. Incumbent running.

Treasurer (Officer): Maintain and report on financial records of the Guild. Incumbent: Marcia Greiten Third term allowed by Board vote. *Incumbent* running.

Workshop Coordinator: Coordinates all organizational aspects of Guild Workshops, including sign ups, fee collection, set up and take down, facility arrangements. *Incumbent:* Diana Hamilton, on ballot to run for a second year.

Public Relations Coordinator: Publicizes Guild events and activities to the media and general public. *Incumbent:* Nancy Butterfield, on ballot to run for a second year.

Challenge Quilt "The Great 2021 Scavenger Hunt"

Hopefully by now you know what's going on with the Guild Challenge for this year. Perhaps you've already finished, or at least started getting ideas and designs together. I know I'll be making one, but haven't got very far at all in my creative thinking. Fortunately we still have several months to pull it all together!

As a reminder, the requirement is to include a minimum of FIVE (but hopefully a lot more!) of the items on the list below. And to clarify, the items must be visible on the front - no hiding them on the back please!

The twenty-one scavenger items are:

- button
- flower
- star
- kev
- eye
- feather
- bow
- vehicle
- light
- basket
- person

- tree
- bee
- flavor
- iewel
- money

- time
- a word
- bat
- wrench
- flag

The scavenger items may be: a traditional quilt block, part of the fabric design, a collage, applique, a quilted motif, or an embellishment. They may be tiny or huge. You can be as literal (or not) as you like... Some words (deliberately) have multiple meanings. BE CREATIVE!

Every member is encouraged to make one entry (with a maximum perimeter of 120"), and we want them to be debut quilts only. We will need photos and entry forms by the May meeting. Viewing and voting will be via the Guild website, and the reveal and results will be at the June meeting.

Axxess Books



In Memoriam: Carol Barringer

During the last few months, we have had four long-time Guild members pass away, Nancy King, Carol Barringer, Dee Johnson and Harriet Berk, and the Guild's condolences have been sent to the fami-

lies. An article about Nancy King was in our December Newsletter. In this issue we are going to tell a bit more about Carol Barringer. Future issues will have articles about Dee and Harriet.

Carol E. Barringer, longtime resident of Santa Barbara and Goleta, and formerly of New

Hampshire, passed away on January 8, 2021, due to complications of long-standing health issues. She was 71 years old. Carol was a veteran of the US Marine Corps; a respected writer and researcher on the effects of severe childhood abuse; and a survivor who led with her immense strength, as well as her easy laugh and quick sense of humor. Carol was also an accomplished quilter and doll maker.

She had many roles during decades of membership in the Guild, going back as far as the late 1990's when she was head of the Community Quilts Committee, something she was always involved with during most of her tenure with the Guild; she also helped with organizing quilt shows and running the library.

Starting in 2015-2016, Carol initiated and co-led the first 3 years of our Veterans Quilt Project, in which our members make patriotically-themed quilts, which are presented to local veterans in hospice in special ceremonies arranged in collaboration with the Visiting Nurses Association (VNA) and area veterans. Fittingly, on January 7, 2021 Guild member Rochelle Schneider presented Carol with a beautiful Marine Corps themed quilt during her VNA pinning ceremony at Serenity House. The particular quilt given to Carol was donated by Linda Boynton de Sepulveda, who took over the Veterans Quilt Project from Carol. Per Rochelle, Carol was quite touched that her quilt came from Linda.

One story we received from Michelle Garbarino: "A couple of years ago I went to Carol's apartment to deliver some containers full of fabric that had been donated to the Guild ... when I entered the apartment I was awed by what looked like a fabric store with a work room ... and not much room to walk around ... I said "well, one thing you can't do is invite people over for dinner" and we both laughed ... I had to leave the donated containers out by her front door until later ... when she could somehow make room for them inside ..."

Carol requested that all of her quilting supplies and material be donated to the Guild. Our Community Projects Committee has taken possession of these items and is in the process of sorting through everything. A sale of Carol's donations will be held in the next few months with the proceeds benefiting the Guild.



Block of the Month for April 2021

Rain Dance

12 x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" Unfinished)





Let's hope that this block will bring some rain so we will have some flowers in May. Pick 3 colors and white.

•White:

Cut 4 - 3 1/2" Squares Cut 4 - 3 7/8" Squares

Cutting

Cut 2 Green - 3 7/8" Squares Cut 4 Blue - 3 7/8" Squares Cut 2 Orange - 3 7/8" Squares


• 3 colors:




For best results, please use scant ¼" seams.

1. You are going to make 12 half square triangles (HST). To make them, take 1 green with white, 1 orange with white, 2 blue with white, 1 blue with orange, 1 blue with green and follow the instructions below.

To make 2 HST, use two 3 7/8" squares, right sides together. Draw a diagonal line across the lighter color and sew a scant 1/4" on each side of the line. Cut on the line and press to the dark color.



2. Sew this in rows following the picture.



3. Mail it to me by April 5.
