November Program: David Owen Hastings "Quilt Labels To Love"

November 10 Guild Meeting, 7 pm, Live Oak Church, Goleta, In-person & via Zoom

"A simple and beautiful quilt label is like a signature on a piece of art."

David has been knitting and sewing since he was a child and believes that these skills can be both an artistic expression and also good for the soul. All quilters will surely agree. He is a fabric designer and since 2005 his independent graphic design business has been focused on helping non-profit organizations with branding, websites and printing. David will tell us how he



combines computer-printed custom labels with a woven logo label to give them a professional finish and to record important details.



David will walk us through the steps to create these labels and will share alternate labeling methods that draw from his graphic design background. He is enthusiastic in the belief that quilts are a wonderful art form, and that your work

should be signed with details included for posterity.

It may not feel natural, or even sane. There is so much personal growth in pushing boundaries and trying something new. And I don't think it matters where we are on our journey in sewing, quilting, or life as a whole, there's always more we can attempt, try, reach or strive for... Sometimes it doesn't work and we realize it's not something to repeat, but maybe, just maybe it'll be amazing and so rewarding!

November 12, 9 am to 3 pm, via Zoom

This is a technique class and an introduction to Robin's innovative strip-piecing method of making what is usually a complex paper pieced block. You will learn different techniques for finishing the centers of your compass block and for making all 16 sizes of Robin's compass blocks. She will share tons of tips for her revolutionary new strip-piecing method! Students will receive a supply list prior to class with a small bit of homework, as well as a short pre-class video to cover the basics of her method so that we all start class on the same page.

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Block of the Month for December 2022 Sparkling Holiday Star

12" x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" unfinished)



Cutting

Cut:

- One 6 1/2" x 6 1/2" square of sparkling gold or silver on white print;
- Four 3 1/2" x 3 1/2" squares of night sky blue;
- Four 3 7/8" x 3 7/8" squares of night blue sky;
- Four 3 7/8" x 3 7/8" squares of white fabric.

Assembly

- Place the 3 7/8" white squares on top of same size night blue fabric, right sides together. Draw a
 diagonal line and stitch 1/4" on either side of the line. Cut along diagonal line to get eight half square
 triangles.
- Sew the half square triangles together to make two points of the stars.
- Sew one set of points to the sparkling square, then sew another pair on the opposite side of the sparkling square.
- Sew each 3 1/2" night blue square to each end of the third and fourth pair of star points. Attach the two resulting rows to opposite sides of the row with the sparkling center square.
