There is no charge for this sew day, but we will need to set up tables and chairs ourselves.

AQS Grand Rapids, Michigan

As a relatively new quilter on the cusp of the pandemic, I've only managed to attend three quilt shows: Road2CA in 2020, our Harvest of Colors in 2022, and now AQS in Grand Rapids, MI in September.

There was a great deal of "hype" surrounding AQS, although the website showed it to be a smaller show than Road and much to my surprise, fewer overall quilts than our own show and mostly traditional ones (I'm in the midwest after all...) As always, I was impressed with the artistry on display, particularly the exhibit of antique quilts which were in remarkably good condition. The fabric patterns were very similar to many one could find in current quilt shops. The fabric colors, designs, and even the cotton weave really have stood the test of time!

Upon entering the showroom floor, there was a map for entrants to indicate where their guild was located. I placed mine in the Santa Barbara/Goleta area next to another lone dot. It turns out, Lynn Manchester was also at the show!

The convention was very well attended and while I was a bit disappointed (I have two outstanding shows by comparison - who knew) some of the major manufacturers were present and I was able to get a few great tidbits of information.

Another surprise for me was that a central theme throughout the vendor area was "See you at Road." They were really talking it up...it also gave me an opportunity to mention our Harvest of Colors in October 2024 in beautiful Santa Barbara...and folks were listening!

I really did appreciate the fact that this was a bus trip a steal at \$130, including attendance fee and a small dinner snack - with the luxury of not having to worry about traffic or construction, and being picked up and dropped off after a long day at the convention for the 2hour trip. Most of us had about an hour drive to the bus location, but believe it or not, there was a waitlist for the full bus of 66 and the average price of gas here is about 3.50/ gallon. Just saying.....

Quilting Tips, Tools and Hacks #3

Do you have a love-hate relationship with "stitch and flip" corner triangles? In the traditional method, you draw a line corner to corner on a small square, line it up with a larger square or rectangle and stitch on the line.

Sometimes I get it right on and sometimes I'm off. Sometimes I sew just to the right of the line and I

have success. Sometimes I'm more mindful of the thread I'm using. A thinner thread will give you better results.



Well, I have discovered a tool that gives me perfect corner triangles

every time. It's Doug Leko's Mini Simple Folded Corners tool. (A larger one is available too.) Directions are included with the ruler. For this technique, one "pre-cuts" the square and "over-cuts" the triangle. Yay for wiggle room! Sew triangle to the square, press to the triangle, trim to the perfect piece! Love this tool!

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Announcing Guild Challenge 2024! "Memorable Meals"

What was your most memorable meal or food experi-

Challenge quilts must be submitted by our meeting in May 2024. Entries

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Block of the Month for November 2023 Autumn Leaf

12" x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" unfinished)



Cutting

- This block has two colors: an autumn leaf color and white.
- Autumn leaf color: cut two 5" squares; one 6 ¹/₂" x 1" rectangle; one 4 ¹/₂" square and one 4 ¹/₂" x 8 ¹/₂" rectangle.
- White: cut three 5" squares and one 4 ¹/₂" square.

Assembly

- Make four half square triangles with the autumn and white fabrics as follows: put a white and an autumn 5" square right sides together. Draw a diagonal line across the white fabric and sew a scant 1/4" on each side of the line. Cut on the line. Press to the autumn side. Repeat with second set of white/autumn 5" squares.
- To make the stem, cut one white 5" square diagonally and sew these triangles to each side of the 6 ¹/₂" rectangle of autumn. Trim to 4 ¹/₂".
- Sew this in three rows.
