Hoffman Challenge Winner! Congratulations Linda Boynton de Sepulveda

You heard it here first... a scoop for our little newsletter and a huge honor for

Guild member Linda Boynton de Sepulveda! Linda was awarded First Place Appliqué in the 100th Anniversary Hoffman Challenge for her submission, "Spirit Guide Take me Home." Her quilt was selected from a "multitude of outstanding entries" and will become a centerpiece of the 20-piece traveling trunk show displayed nationally and internationally at various guilds, shows, museums and shops, and virtually on the Hoffman site throughout 2024. The entire winning



collection, including Linda's masterpiece, will be showcased in an exhibit at Road 2 CA. Now you have another reason to join our bus trip to Road on January 20 to view these in person!

Hoffman California Fabrics was founded in 1924 by Rube P. Hoffman. Today, the fourth generation of family members carries on the tradition of textile making. To celebrate their 100 year anniversary, Hoffman California created a special challenge requiring entrants to use a minimum of 5 out of 15 batik fabrics from the Challenge collection.

Congratulations, Linda! What a tremendous honor. We couldn't be prouder of you or happier for you. I hope Guild members can join us at Road2CA to support Linda and see this wonderful artwork.

January Speaker: Maria Rogers-Naito, "Quilts, Indigo Dying and Weaving In Japan"

Thursday, January 11, 7 pm, presentation via Zoom

Maria will be joining us all the way from Japan. Origi-

nally from England, she traveled around the world after graduating from college before settling in Japan, where she's lived for over 25 years. Maria has always loved textiles and collected pieces from various places during her travels.



Maria met her husband in the early 90s and began raising their family in Japan. During that time she went often to the Tokyo International Quilt Show, as well as to smaller shows. She loves to visit local flea markets, buying kimonos, yukatas and indigo fabric scraps.

Maria's presentation will provide a glimpse into everyday life in Japan, with wonderful close-up photos of amazing Japanese quilts from various Tokyo Quilt Shows. This year she was fortunate to participate in a weekend indigo dyeing and shibori workshop with a master in Mashiko. She will show photos of the workshop and describe her visits to various cotton and silk weavers, as well as to the indigo museum in Tokushima where she learned the lengthy process needed to grow, harvest and produce indigo.

Maria will highlight the history of how Japanese textile



art and culture developed over the last century and share the types of fabrics Japanese quilters often use. You will see these used in the Japanese quilts in detailed close up photos.

She will answer questions you may have if you are considering visiting this amazing country and the To-kyo International Quilt Festival.

Join us for our first meeting of the New Year and for a wonderful window into Japanese textiles!

Covid Crazy Quilt Project: A Heritage Quilt

Early in 2021, in the midst of the big scary Covid lockdown, I was presented with a request that came in via the Guild info account. Local Montecito resident Caro-

line Vassallo had decided that she'd like to have a quilt made from a set of 25 treasured crazy quilt blocks created over a period of years by her dear Grandmother Nellie. I visited her home (masked, of course) to see and photograph the layout of the blocks that Caroline and her husband had assembled on the bed in their guest bedroom. These photos helped guide the

construction of the quilt. Each block was unique, remarkably well preserved and uniform in size. It was heartwarming to hear her stories about the fabrics and of her helping her grandmother assemble the blocks when she was a child. I learned that they consisted of scraps from the clothing the family had worn during the first half of the 1900's.

The remaining block not used in the quilt was made into quilted postcards for Caroline to share and send to family members.

Here is the story of the quilt in Catherine's own words, printed on the label on the back of the finished quilt:

History of the "Pieces of Life" Quilt By Caroline Leland (Brigham) Vassallo

Nellie Denton Besore Sears (1875-1961) is the artist behind the quilt. She was English on her mother's side, French Huguenot on her father's —and was registered as a "Daughter of the American Revolution".

Nellie grew up across the street from the University of Illinois in Champagne-Urbana. She graduated from there in 1899 as a Phi Beta Kappa and a member of the Pi Phi Sorority. In 1899 she married Wm. Everett Sears and, in 1900, gave birth to Margaret Denton

Sears, her only child. In 1901 the couple was divorced and Nellie—as a divorced woman—had difficulty finding a job, but worked as a teacher, an artist, and a member of the women's rights movement.

After daughter Margaret also graduated from the U. of Illinois, receiving her certification as a landscape architect, Nellie followed Margaret to Pasadena, California and lived with her the rest of her life. During Nellie's years with Margaret they did a great amount of sewing on an old Singer machine, with Nellie keeping the remnants from many a dress, skirt, shirt, apron or tablecloth.

When Nellie died, there were 25 finished quilt pieces, all keepsakes and all composed of a great many smaller pieces. And so it is that these 25 larger pieces—now The Quilt kept by her granddaughter Caroline, are the pieces glowing forth in Caroline's "new" hanging quilt—a tribute to her 2nd mother, her beautiful Grandmother Nellie.

Block of the Month for January 2024 Road To A New Year

12" x 12" Block (12.5" x 12.5" unfinished)

This block has 3 colors: white, gold and something sparkly. I used blue with stars and gold dots.



Cutting

- Cut 4 blue squares 3 ¹/₂"
- Cut 8 white squares 3 ¹/₂"
- Cut 2 gold squares 3 ⁷/₈"
- Cut 2 white squares 3 ⁷/₈"

Assembly

- Make the half square triangles first. Put the white 3 ⁷/₈" and the gold 3 ⁷/₈" squares right sides together. Draw a diagonal line on the white side. Stitch ¹/₄" on each side of the diagonal line. Cut on the line.
- Sew the block together in rows.

Community Projects

The Community Projects Committee recently gave 212 placemats to Meals on Wheels, more than originally requested. They wanted some red, white and blue themed placemats for their veterans so Michelle made 12 placemats using fabric leftover from veteran quilts she had completed. We have approximately 2 dozen placemats stored in the locker as a start for Meals on Wheels' next request.

At the October meeting, 147 finished cradle kits were given to the Unity Shoppe representative. Beginning at the January 2024 Guild meeting, there will be cradle kits available for the asking, for our next donation to Unity Shoppe. Some kits will have just a mattress, pillow and batting, others will also include fabric.

The quilt locker is overflowing with donated fabric. We hope to get to it soon and organize the chaos. If you have a need for fabric, <u>email</u> one of us and we will try our best to set up a date and time to meet. Our email addresses can be found in the directory. We also have 30 - 40 kits ready for sewing, so please let us know if you're interested in picking these up!

We received a special request from hospice for veterans red, white, and blue quilts. The Guild is short of this kind of fabric, so if you have some and it is just sitting around unused, a donation would be greatly appreciated. Another recent request is for baby and crib quilts. The Committee will be looking to put together some baby fabric kits in the near future, but would really appreciate some of these in the meantime.
