Rebecca Mealy passed out sign up sheets requesting volunteers to help with set-up, running, and clean-up of Goleta Valley Days slated for Oct. 20th. Those wishing to display a quilt must bring to the October meeting or give to Zetta Hanna after that date for hanging.

The November meeting will be Rosalind Perry and the Marie Webster quilts.

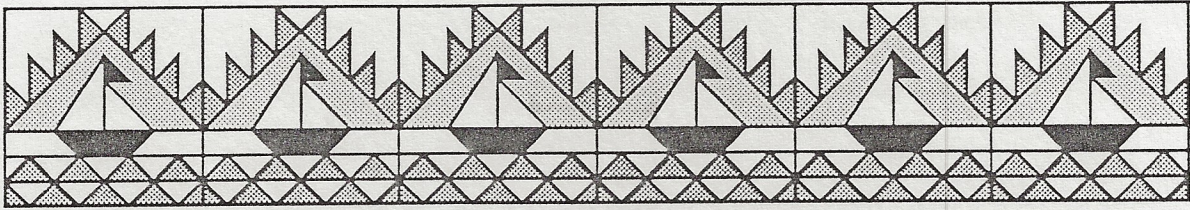
Carol Ludwig drew numbers for the door prize and the winners were:

1. OUR OPPORTUNITY QUILT, THIS YEAR RAISED ABOUT \$1000 WITH \$1. TICKETS. IT WAS FINISHED EARLY AND TAKEN TO JULY 4TH STOW HISTORIC HOUSE CELEBRATION AND BRINKERHOFF STREET CELEBRATION (A COLLECTION OF ANTIQUE HOUSES, WITH THEIR OWN QUILT DISPLAY) ON JULY 7TH. VARIOUS MEMBERS BORROWED THE QUILT, TOOK IT TO MEETINGS, TOOK IT TO WORK, ETC AND SOLD TICKETS. WE HAVE HAD 2 OPPORTUNITY QUILTS THE LAST SEVERAL YEARS. THIS YEAR WE DID SO WELL ON ONE, AND WE WANT MEMBERS TO WORK ON QUILTS FOR MINI QUILT AUCTION FOR MAY 1991, THAT WE ARE ONLY GOING TO DO ONE.
2. FEBRUARY 1990 MEETING WAS A SILENT AUCTION, MEMBERS BROUGHT UNWANTED SEWING ITEMS, SCRAPS, ANYTHING. WE PUT THEM OUT ON TABLES, WITH PAPERS ON THEM. PEOPLE WROTE THEIR BIDS AND NAMES ON THE PAPERS, AFTER A SPECIFICED AMOUNT OF TIME, AN END WAS CALLED AND PEOPLE PAID FOR THE ITEMS. WE RAISED ABOUT \$273, WITH 45 PRESENT. AT THE MEETING.
3. COFFEE CUP QUILT. ONE OF THE MEMBERS DECIDED TO EXPAND ON A POPULAR BLOCK-OF-THE-MONTH WE HAD. SHE ASKED PEOPLE TO DONATE COFFEE CUP BLOCKS. SHE PUT THEM TOGETHER INTO A WALL HANGING AND WE USED IT AS A DOOR PRIZE AT THE JUNE MEETING. IT WAS A MUCH WANTED ITEM, WE RAISED \$189 WITH \$1 TICKETS. THERE WERE 73 PEOPLE PRESENT.
4. CHRISTMAS ANGEL WALL HANGING. ANOTHER MEMBER DECIDED TO EXPAND ON AN ANGEL BLOCK WE HAD LAST YEAR AS BLOCK-OF-THE-MONTH. SHE BOUGHT BACKGROUND FABRIC AND PASSED OUT PATTERNS. PEOPLE PUT A LOT OF INDIVIDUAL DETAIL ON THEIR ANGELS. SHE WILL PUT THEM TOGETHER INTO 1 OR 2 WALLHANGINS TO BE USED AS DOOR PRIZE IN DEC. WE WILL SELL \$1. TICKETS NOV AND DEC.
5. THIS YEAR ONE OF OUR MEMBERS WITH A MACINTOSH COMPUTER, PRINTED UP 12 OF OUR BLOCKS-OF-THE-MONTH, AND PUT THEM INTO A BOOK. IT HAD A INTERESTING COVER, WE ZEROXED AND STAPLED AND SOLD TO \$3. MEMBERS AND \$4. NON-MEMBERS. WE SOLD THEM AT THE MEETINGS AND AT OTHER FUNCTIONS. WE RAISED ABOUT \$120. MOSTLY FROM MEMBERS. WE DIDN'T SELL MANY TO THE PUBLIC.
