"The New Esprit Collection"

This evening curator Julie will take us inside the Esprit Collection for an indepth look at this ever changing corporate treasure of more than 200 antique quilts. For many years exclusively "Amish," the Esprit collection is now expanding to include spectacular examples of applique and one-of-a-kind "folk art" quilts. The talk will include slides of the renowned Esprit building and installation photos of the quilts on permanent display.

Julie has collected and studied quilts for more than 25 years and is a lecturer, author and curator. She has held her post at Esprit since 1982 while being involved in major exhibitions such as "Heritage Quilts" for the Oregon Historical Society. She also works on quilt-related projects like the prizewinning film by Pat Ferrero, "Quilts in Women's Lives." Ms. Silber coproduced the film "Hearts and Hands" and co-authored the book of the same name. We are very pleased indeed to have this opportunity to meet such a noted expert on our rich heritage as women and quilters.

A Great Theme and Long Weekend for Our Show in 1995

"Quilts from Traditional to Outrageous" will be the subtitle and theme for "Natural Impressions 2" in 1995. This suggestion is from Ruth Walters, who put it anonymously in the box, but later owned up to authorship after the show committee chose it at the meeting held September 22.

It was announced that a preliminary agreement has been reached with the Museum League to divided any profit from the 1995 event with the Museum League receiving 40% of the proceeds. The Guild will keep the remaining 60%. This makes the event an official Museum function with all the privileges associated with that status.

A change of date has been arranged as the first weekend in May was not available. The new dates are May 26–29, Memorial Day Weekend, 1995. This will allow the exhibit to run one day longer, increasing our income from admissions. It was felt that the *I Modannari* street painting festival taking place at the Mission the same time will only increase our attendance. Effort was made to keep our event from conflicting with other guilds' shows.

It was agreed that every attempt will be made to have our members' quilts shown at the exhibit. <u>Judy Gorrindo</u> volunteered to work out the logistics for this.

We are seeking a chairman for the Vendors Committee to investigate the feasibility of having vendors of quilting supplies and/or related fibre crafts at the exhibit. This might be simply an advisory role, or an more involved one, depending on how many volunteers we get. Anyone interested should contact either Norah (962-8511) or Jan (962-3498).

COASTAL QUILTERS GUILD MEETING: October 13, 1993

President Barbara Maxwell called the general meeting to order at 7:35 p.m. in Samarkand. There were approximately 105 members present plus three guests. Barbara Davis thanked all those members who had brought refreshments.


Norah McMeeking introduced our speaker for the evening, Christen Brown, who spoke on "Embellished Surfaces." Various members of the Guild modeled Christen's garments, which were all heavily ornamented with stitchery, beadwork, and shisha mirrors. Christen explained that her work has been influenced by the artist, Erte, and the designer, Schapparelli. She also makes jewelry, dolls and masks, often to co-ordinate with her garments.

After a short break, we resumed with the business meeting. We need help working on our special S.B. Quilt. The next meeting for this project is Nov. 22, at Barbara Maxwell's home.

Lee Carlson handled the drawing for the five door prizes including a book of quilt postcards and a bag of potpourri.

Marty Frolli handled Block of the Month for Maggie Godwin, explaining the Candy Corn block due in November. Ingrid Bergere won the 15 Frog blocks.

Eight members shared their works at Show & Tell.







Curators of the 1993-94 Hoffman Challenge have selected the quilts (and dolls and garments) which will comprise the collections which will tour nationally for the next year. Three judges selected two collections of fifty quilts each, judging on the basis of artistic interpretation, workmanship, and fabric-color coordination. Quilts in collection "A" and collection "B" are divided equally to include a variety of designs and techniques with prize winning quilts included in each collection.

The letter sent to entrants states "Please realize that all entrants are winners by just completing the Challenge."


The Coastal Quilters Guild is represented in both Collections. "Let There Be Light" by Maggie Godwin will tour with Collection A, while Harriet Berk's "Space Adventure" was selected for Collection B. Harriet's quilt - a spaceship with pinwheels in blues and reds was viewed at Show and Tell in September. Maggie's quilt is a Lone Star in rainbow colors, with over 1,100 tiny diamonds.

Entrants were awarded Hoffman fabric and a cloisonne pin designed from the challenge fabric.

She and Joanne Hankey will discuss some possible schedule changes. Her estimate of costs was approved.

It was recommended that we enter next year's Baltimore Album Opportunity Quilt in as many quilt shows as possible.

Lynn Laughrin spoke on behalf of the HomeArts display at Earl Warren Showgrounds Fair. They would like to have more involvement from Guild members and would like suggestions. It was suggested that they change the way the quilts are hung; that perhaps someone from the Guild could be on the Fair board; and that perhaps quilters from other guilds could be used as judges.

Barbara Maxwell will host a Christmas part on December 15, to include all officers and chairs for both 1993 and 1994. It will be a pot-luck with people from '93 bringing the food for next year's people.


At our regular December meeting, we will hang our Baltimore Album quilt on the stage for the presentation of our quilts to Transition House. Norah is working on games and ideas for this party.

Our next In-house workshop is November 11, "Machine Applique and Machine Quilting", taught by Barbara Maxwell.


At our November meeting, we will start sign-ups for Ruth McDowell's design workshop, which will be in January.


BLOCK OF THE MONTH - NOVEMBER 1993 CHRISTMAS TREE

From various Christmas prints, cut one each piece L, M, N, O, and K.


From a white on white background (or white on beige, beige on white, or beige on beige) cut one each A, B, C, and D and one each of the following pieces reversed - A, B, C, and D. Cut two piece E's and one piece F.

Sew A and A-reversed to L, B and B-reversed to M, C and C-reversed to N, D and D-reversed to O, and an E to either side of K. Sew the six strips (including piece F described above) to form the block
