January 12 General Meeting - Ruth McDowell Presents "Progressions & Diversions: My Development as a Quiltmaker"

Ruth McDowell of Winchester, MA, will present an overview of her work via slide show from her earliest traditional quilts to her current art quilt projects. Ruth has been making quilts since 1972 and exhibiting her art quilts nationally and internationally since 1981. She is an experienced teacher and lecturer for guilds and symposia worldwide and author of Pattern on Pattern, Quilt Press

Digest, 1991. With more than 250 quilts to her credit, her work demonstrates a serious and sustained development as an artist of unique abilities. Earlier today, Ruth conducted a workshop for our guild, focusing on designing from nature. We are delighted to have Ruth McDowell here for both the workshop and lecture.

Guild General Meeting Highlights December 8, 1993

December 's general Meeting was attended by approx. 110 members and 3 guests, including former member Ellie Wright. Out-going President Barbara Maxwell announced that the Guild was mentioned twice on KEYT-TV that day for its gift of quilts to Transition House.

Claire Hemke, Community Projects, introduced Jill Cordover, Ph.D. Executive Director of Transition House. The Guild presented her with 40 large quilts, 8 baby quilts and 6 clutch balls for the facility. Jill thanked us warmly for the quilts and spoke about the efforts of Transition house to help people in need.

Barbara reminisced about the past 2 years of her presidency, and thanked each member of the Board for their support. She presented thank you gifts to her officers and in return was presented with a quilt pieced from autographed blocks made by members.

The presidency was then passed to Judy Gorrindo, 1994 Guild President.

Norah McMeeking thanked all who helped her with programs in the past year and presented a gift to Suzy Carter, who has arranged meeting room setup and clean-up for each meeting in 1993. Santa arrived! He had seen the TV program and stopped by to thank the guild for Transition House Quilts. He left a bag of candy and wished all a Merry Christmas.

Norah introduced 2 mixer games: guessing the quilt block pinned to one's back and the sharing of 2 fat-quarters of fabric with other members. During the break several members paid their 1994 dues, visited, and sampled delicious goodies at the dessert table.

The 1994 Opportunity Quilt was presented by Zetta Hanna, a member of the Guild's First Appliqué Group.

Block of the Month awards were given to members completing 12 or more blocks during 1993. Thirteen members qualified for the drawing. 292 blocks had been made in 1993! Winners were Janet Berlin, Faradeh Maho, and Nancy Hori who received gift certificates from Betty's Fabrics. The Door Prize Drawing was conducted by Lee Carlson for a decorated tee shirt donated especially for the party. Colby Kline was the winner. A Sing-Along "The Twelve Blocks of Christmas" was conducted by Kathy Doughty. Nine members contributed to Show and Tell, including Barbara Maxwell who made a toy elephant using a pattern from Yoop Smits who visited us in from The Netherlands.

December brought in 43 Christmas Tree blocks which were divided into 3 sets and won by Marjorie Hall, Nancy Hori, and Jana Julian. Marty Frolli, the '94 Block of the Month Chairwoman demonstrated the January Block "Grandmother's Choice".



1994 PROGRAMS....SPEAKERS RUN THE GAMMET

1994 will be a year filled with interest for guild members. We will have classes for fans of hand appliqué, those who only sew with a machine, and everyone in between. We will work on paper and on cloth. We have traditional masters and avant guard artists who share the common trait of being great speakers and teachers. Two teachers who specialize in nature quilts will visit us, beginning with Ruth McDowell in January. Ruth's quilts are classical pieced landscapes and floral designs with a twist. Her stunning works are in the mainstream of both quilting and fine art. Ruth is an effective and coherent teacher, very sensitive to her students.

MARCH: Still rooted in natural themes, but with a change of focus, our March speaker will be author Jeanna Kimball from Salt Lake City. Jeanna's specialty is traditional hand appliqué, especially green and red quilts. Jeanna's talk and class will inspire us with the myriad possibilities of appliqué and sharpen our skills so our Santa Barbara Quilt will win another ribbon for us!

APRIL: In April we'll fly off the edge of the world with Ellen Oppenheimer, whose quilts are totally modern, colorful, and exquisitely made. Her specialty is machine in-laying which makes very complicated piecing possible.

MAY: The nature quilts of Erika Carter, who will visit in May, are more abstract and more geometrical. They present another interpretation of the pieced landscape. Many of Erika's quilts have been published in recent magazines and her work regularly appears in the Quilt National Show. She has just begun to teach and we are among the first groups to have engaged this rising star of the quilt world as a teacher.

JUNE: Judy Dales, who visits in June from New Jersey, finds both natural and abstract designs that intrigue her. A very versatile quilter, only her fine sense of color gives away her quilts. She is an organized and effective teacher whose work ranges from traditional to contemporary.

SEPTEMBER: Then back to the garden in September with southern California's Pat Scoville and her beautiful pieced rose quilts. The only thing missing here is the beautiful fragrance. Pat mixes traditional and contemporary techniques to bring realism to the bloom.

REVIEW OF COLOR THEORY

Attend Maggie Godwin's "Color in Quilts" classes Part I and II for a comprehensive study of color theory as it applies to fabrics.

HUE is the name of a color.

The primary colors are Red, Yellow and Blue.

All other colors are made from these colors.

VALUE is the degree of light or darknesses of the color. Dark values are created by adding black pigments and they are called <u>shades</u>. Light colors or <u>tints</u>, are created by adding white.


INTENSITY is the purity or saturation of a color.

Adding grey reduces the intensity of a color, therefore, we call it a tone. Warm colors on the right side of the color wheel appear to advance when used in a scheme, whereas, the appearance of recession or depth can be achieved by using cool colors on the left side of the color wheel.

Monochromatic means one color. A blue color scheme, for example, could include many shades and tints of that color.

Complimentary colors are found on opposite sides of the color wheel, such as red & green, blue & orange, purple & yellow.

Analogous colors are next to each other on the color wheel, such as blue, blue-purple & purple.



Marbleized Mint Bark 1/3 Cup Semisweet mint-flavored chocolate pieces or semisweet chocolate pieces 1 lb. vanilla-flavored candy coating, cut up 3/4 cup finely crushed candy cane or finely crushed striped round peppermint candies ·Line a baking sheet with foil; set aside. In a small saucepan heat chocolate pieces over low heat, stirring constantly, till melted and smooth. Remove from heat. In a 2-quart saucepan heat the candy coating over low heat, stirring constantly, till melted and smooth. Remove pan from heat. Stir in crushed candies. Pour the melted coating mixture onto the prepared baking sheet. Spread coating mixture to about 3/8- inch thickness; drizzle with the melted chocolate. Gently zigzag a narrow metal spatula through the chocolate and peppermint layers to create a swirled or marbled effect. ·Let candy stand several hours or till firm. (or, chill about 30 minutes or till firm. Use foil to lift firm candy from the baking sheet; carefully break candy into pieces. Store, tightly covered, for up to 2 weeks . Makes about 1 1/4 pounds.

Sleepless on Salsipuedes

Dear Sleepless:

Try tiny sequin pins or one of the lightweight fusible bonding fabrics like wonder-under. I heard of a new method: lay a piece of fusible thread just under the edge and secure with heated iron. This should hold the appliqué piece in place while you stitch around the edges. It avoids the typical stiffness in the center. You might even try stuffing your appliqué from the backside, trapunto-like. But don't use this for the Block-of -the-Month; it's more of the traditional variety.


Cherries

Did George Washington really cut down the cherry tree?

Fabric: For the cherries use various prints or solids from deep to bright reds. You may also add in a blushing peach. For the leaves and stems use prints or solids in medium to dark greens. For the background think about all the white marble and stone in Washington, D.C. and use a marbled print or something similar from white to pale gray.

Background: The block when finished is 14" (14-1/2" with seam allowances). To allow the winner of the blocks a little wiggle room, cut the background 16" square. The winner can then trim all the blocks to size. Trace appliqué placement lightly on background fabric.

Appliqué: You can make perfect cherry circles! Cut a circle template from cardboard 1" in diameter. Trace template on wrong side of cherry fabric. Cut fabric cherry out leaving a small turn under allowance. Place cardboard template on wrong side of fabric cherry. Take small stitches all around edge of fabric in the turn under allowance. Pull thread taut and knot. Press. Use this same method to make perfect leaves. Appliqué leaves first, then appliqué stems over leaves. For stems, cut two bias strips 1" wide x 5-1/2" long. Cross the two stems at the center of block.


