Next Month's Program ...SEPTEMBER

Pat Scoville will present a lecture and workshop on rose appliquéed quilts for our program in September. A quilter since 1979, Pat has had her work published in *Quilter's Newsletter*, *Ladies Circle Patchwork Quilts*, newspapers, various calendars, invitational shows, juried shows and museum shows. She has lectured and taught workshops and is a regular instructor of quilting at the Quilt Emporium in Calabasas. Past president of the San Fernando Valley Quilt Association, Pat continues to be active in the quilt related events of Southern California.

Currently residing in Westlake Village, CA, Pat has lived in Kentucky where she was co-owner of the Kentucky Quilt Corner, where she also taught extensively.

The workshop will teach rose appliqués for both hand and machine sewing for intermediate & -- advanced students, beginners are welcome too.

Pieced Roses to Appliqué -A Complete Garden

Workshop presented by Pat Scoville

Thursday, September 15 9:00am - 3:30pm Goleta Community Center

Patterns & Instruction: You will receive patterns for pieced rosebuds, leaves, exhibition style roses, & fully opened blooms, all in various sizes. Pat's designs for realistic roses will be appliquéed onto a background.

Techniques: We will discuss choosing appropriate fabric combinations for realistic roses, techniques for piecing them, and working on personal designs for your own rose garden quilt. Intermediate to advanced level of pieced and appliqué work which can be done by hand or on the machine. Time will be spent on discussing design ideas and ways to use your roses.

Supply List:

- Bring basic sewing supplies.
- ☐ Assorted fabric scraps in whatever colors you wish to use for your roses (reds, pinks, peaches, yellows, whites, mauves, etc.) If you want to make, for example, yellow roses, bring several pieces of yellow in different values. "I like to use prints in my roses, especially prints that are not too "dotty" or definite. "Fabrics that have been dyed or painted work well too. It is not necessary to bring large pieces or lots of fabric to class -- a small assortment will do.
- ☐ Template plastic, ruler, pencils, marking pens or pencils, paper, fabric scissors.
- A few envelopes or sandwich bags to keep templates organized.
- Sewing machine, optional. Two people could share a machine. Hand piecing works fine for this workshop.
- ☐ Freezer paper, if you like this technique.
- Optional: something for the shared snack table.

Size recommendations: no smaller than 24" x 24 "and no larger than 54"x 54 "or the linear equivalent.



BERRERE Block of the Month BERRERE


Autumn Leaves

This block also known as Maple Leaf, Magnolia Leaf, Apple Leaf, and Tea Leaves.

12" pieced block with appliquéd stem (12-1/2" unfinished).



For the leaf, use various prints or solids in Fall colors. Choose different values in yellow, orange, red and brown. Try mixing the leaf colors within the same block. For the background, use muslin, white on muslin print, or pale beige print or solid.



B

Cutting

From leaf fabrics cut:

4 A triangles. Use template or cut one 7" square and cut diagonally in both directions.

3 C squares. Use template or cut three 4-1/2" squares. 1 bias strip 1-1/8" wide x 7". Fold in thirds. Applique stem to background square C before piecing.

From background fabric cut:

4 B triangles. Use template or cut two 4-7/8" squares and cut diagonally once. 2 C squares. Use template or cut two 4-1/2" squares.

Ima Sew-Happy's Advice to Quilters

Dear Aunt Ima,

I'm into notions, now! Notion's catalogs are intriguing, but I wonder which sewing notions are the most valuable quilters. What are your favorites?


Nuts about Notions on Nogal

Dear Nuts,

Here are my favorites ...

- Number one all time quilter's helper: the 1/4 inch quilting foot or Little Foot. Hands down, it contributes the most to quality seams!
- What did I do before getting my new thread cutting nips spring loaded, they require only a closing motion and are comfortable to use. Seam ripper, of course, with a fine point. Cut through the seam in a few places on one side of the fabric. It is easy to remove the entire thread from the reverse side. Scissors with small hook on one side of the blade help lift fine threads for clipping.
- Large size rotary cutter and a 24" or larger cutting mat will make life a lot more productive for today's quilter (the new LARGE size rotary cutter gets good reviews). My favorite rulers are the 6"x12" ruler and the triangle and the 24" ruler with lip by Olfa, but there are many others which are helpful.
- Open-toe embroidery foot and adjustable zipper foot (available in generic brands) when you need to see exactly where you are sewing, to follow a line with precision or machine quilt.
- Walking foot attachment -- wonderful for machine quilting straight lines and general sewing on fabric sandwiches that might slip!
- Marking fine lines -- yellow Berol colored pencil...shows up well on dark and light fabrics. It sharpens to a fine point. Silver quilter's pencil.
- Red, see-through plastic or cellophane to determine the light/medium/dark contrasts for a group of fabrics.
- Thin-sided and strong 6" or 8" inch embroidery hoops for machine embroidery (with a metal screw or strong clip). Don't bother in invest in something weak.
- Rubber finger tips from a office supply store.

- Tear-away or dissolve-away backing for machine embroidery are excellent products. Inexpensive alternatives are thin tissue paper sheets that food handlers use to wrap or pick up food from local restaurant supply stores.
- Comfortable thimbles Custom made thimbles, if you can find an artisan who does lost-wax casting.
- Quilt-tak and safety pin covers.
- Straw needles -- hand sewing needles. They are long and have a very small eye. Curved needles for basting. Use a Jean's needle for heavy fabrics and for some machine embellishment threads. Double needles and a "magic needle" which has 2 eyes, one above the other. Metafil needle and the three new Schmetz machine needles: embroidery, quilting & Microtex. Try topstitching needles too.
- Thread cutter/pin holder with magnet that attaches either to a non-electronic sewing machine.
- Thread lubricant Place a drop or two of the product on a piece of absorbent string or ribbon thread and "floss" the sewing machine thread hooks.
- Skinny Pins by IBC are very thin and have a sharp point, available locally. With or without glass bead.
- Spring sewing machine needle for machine embroidery and quilting.
- Ordinary hand soap slivers for marking lines on fabric. Washes out!



Some More Quality Control Tips for Quilters

- Make a pin cushion with fine steel wool to keep your pins sharp.
- Press appliqué from the back side on a padded ironing board or towel.
- Quilting stitches made on the bias (cross-grain) of fabric will look better than those on the grain. On-the-grain stitches fall into and blend with the threads of the fabric.


