Pat Scoville has created patterns and techniques for rose appliqués in all the colors of her beloved rose garden.

Her workshop, to be held on Thursday, September 15 at the Goleta Community Center, will feature many roses in various stages of maturity. Pat will also show us techniques and discuss how to make realistic appliqués. (See August Newsletter for workshop supply list.)

Since 1979 Pat has lectured and taught workshops. She is a regular instructor of quilting at the Quilt Emporium in Calabasas. Many of her quilts have been published in *Quilter's Newsletter*, Ladies Circle Patchwork Quilts, newspapers, various calendars, invitational shows, juried shows, and museum shows. Past president of the San Fernando Valley Quilt Association, Pat continues to be active in many quilt related events in Southern California.

October Workshops Essentials of Color

Supply List

We will not be sewing, so NO sewing machines, irons or sewing supplies are needed.

For either class, please bring:

- Color Wheel (from any paint or art supply store)
- Scissors paper & cloth
- Glue Stick (absolutely essential)
- Snack to share
- Consider bringing a sack lunch you might need to shop during the break!

We will have lots of handouts, consider bringing a binder and hole punch.

•• Bring at least one "less than successful project" a project that didn't turn out as well as you had hoped. We will use these for class discussion - don't worry, we won't point fingers and laugh! (Wait until you see what I bring!)

The easiest thing would be to cut 3" or FABRIC: larger squares of every fabric you own! BUT, if that sounds like too much trouble, bring as many 3" squares as you can bear to cut. This experience will be most successful if you bring fabrics with a large variety of COLORS (i.e., red, yellow, etc.); VALUES (from light to very dark) and INTENSITY (from clear through greyed colors). Bring more fabric than you think you will need - if you don't use it you can trade with a neighbor.



Color and Cloth, The Quiltmaker's Ultimate Workbook., by Mary Coyne Penders, The Quilt Digest Press, San Francisco, 1989. (Bring this book, if you have it.)

In addition to the Supply List bring to:

- A piece of fabric you really LOVE preferably a multicolored print.
- Something RED absolutely, positively clear, clean RED! This can be anything from fabric to nail polish to your little sportscar (if you can get it in the room!)
- Something that is a REALLY UGLY COLOR mustard? puce? drab green? We want to see UGLY!
- Something that is your favorite color.

In addition to the Supply List bring to: Part Two - October 20

• Fabric: You will need all the fabric described above, but a variety of visual texture will also be important. It is essential to have a diversity of prints.



Quilt News From Around the World

Smithsonian Museum Quilt Update

The quilt collection of the National Museum of American History began in the 1890's when John Brenton Copp of Connecticut donated three 18th and 19th century quilts to the Smithsonian. Since then the Museum has actively collected more than 300 quilts and coverlets from the 18th through the 20th centuries.

Some exciting news has developed for the Smithsonian's National Museum of American History. In an effort to provide sources of income for the Museum, following the halt of overseas production of quilt replicas based on antique quilts in the collection, the American Quilt Defense Fund has successfully negotiated with the Museum for some alternative fund sources. This group of five women from Knoxville, Tennessee: Linda Claussen, Rebecca Harris, Eva Earle Kent, Jean Lester and Merikay Waldvogel was instrumental in bringing the recent controversy to a close with its "Memorandum of Understanding".

The group has agreed to work jointly with the Museum of American History on several projects to promote the quilt collection. The AQDF has launched a campaign to underwrite the cost of a permanent quilt display case, estimated to be \$25,000. All money donated to the fund will be applied directly to the quilt display case. Installation will be made on the 3rd floor of the Museum by December 1994.

RJR Fabrics is among the first of several agreements with American-based commercial enterprises contracted by the museum. The company will create a line of reproduction fabrics based on a quilt by Mary Betsy Totten (circa 1830). Rising Sun is an 8-pointed star design in shades of plum, wine red, tawny orange, yellow and blue. Reproduction cotton cloth will be woven and printed in the United States and the museum will be consulted on precise colors. A series of books related to the Smithsonian collection will be printed by That Patchwork Place. Spartex has produced pre-printed, white-on-white tops (similar to, but not exact replicas) of quilts in the museum collection

The first promotional project for the Museum will be a symposium on March 18, 1995 titled, "What's American About American Quilts?" The symposium will be part of Women's History Month. A major exhibit of American quilts, is planned for 1997 and will include 60 quilts from the early nineteenth century to the present.

Visions '94

Visions '94 held at Balboa Park, San Diego, featured many quilts made of custom dyed and embellished fabrics. Selections by juror John Flynn included some iconographic theme quilts with symbols of modern and classic Madonnas.

The show gave a wide latitude of expression to nontraditional techniques such as frayed fabric edges, bonded appliqué, painted & stenciled fabrics, puff paint, gold leaf, burned cloth, trinkets sewn on the surface, hanging threads and many textural materials, i.e. theater scrim, wire, leather and velvet. A great number of the quilts were devoid of batting, quilting stitches and I don't recall seeing any mitered corners. A close inspection of borders and edges revealed that many pieces appeared to be "turned" tops -- independent of their backing. Only a few quilts had artistic backs and these would have benefited as free-hanging displays. The overall effect of the show was of brilliant, saturated color. Vibrant red, orange, lime green and yellow were in abundance... colors that draw attention and brightly declare themselves under artificial light.

Overall the standard of craftsmanship was high. At times it seemed like a show of frameless paintings. It was clear to me that there is a wide range of artistic expression in the field of quilting today and a great deal can be learned from attending all kinds of quilt shows. Hurrah, for the American Quilt! It is possible for our heritage to hold on to classic traditions and evolve. I am excited to think about the possibilities for quilts in the year 2000 AD and beyond. What will we see then that will remind us of traditional quilting and Visions '94? Visions comments by Lynn Laughrin...The opinions expressed are my own and should not be inferred to represent CQ guild as a whole.

TEA CUPS

6" appliqué block (6-1/2" unfinished)

For the tea cup use any color in prints, stripes, checks, or florals.

For the background use a good quality unbleached muslin or a white on muslin print.
















Trace the cup and saucer (separately) onto freezer paper. Cut out freezer paper design, cutting on drawn line. Iron freezer paper, waxy side down, to wrong side of fabric. Cut out fabric, allowing a 1/4" seam allowance from the freezer paper. Baste seam allowances under. Cut a bias strip of fabric 3/4" wide x 3" for the handle. Fold strip in thirds. Place background square over design and lightly trace placement. Appliqué handle first, followed by the cup and then the saucer.





5. Wool or crazy guilts with silk.

Quilt Care

Storing

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- 1. Never keep your quilts where you would not want to live no hot attics or moist basements.
- 2. Never store a quilt in a plastic bag. Use a pillow case.
- 3. Fold the quilt with acid free tissue paper or roll on a tube between a sheet and store.
- 4. After airing several times a year, refold quilt on different lines to prevent creases and fiber breaks.

Cleaning

- 1. Before cleaning a quilt, repair all holes, rips, frays and tears. Stabilize fabric by covering with a new patch. Do not remove the worn piece. Some brown spots may be caused by cellular changes in the fabric and might not be removable.
- 2. Airing will remove a musty odor. This can be done either with an electric fan inside or hanging on a clothes line outside, wrong side up. Airing may also be done in the clothes dryer, if you have one that has a no-heat setting and delicate cycle if the quilt is generally in good condition to begin with.
- 3. Quilts may also be vacuumed to remove surface dust and dirt. Use a soft brush with a light touch.
- 4. Generally, cotton and linen quilts may be wet-cleaned. Before washing, test for color fastness. Fill the bathtub with warm water and add ORVUS, a natural detergent or IVORY soap. Soak the quilt, agitating gently with you hands. Remove dirty water and squeeze excess water from quilt. Rinse several times. Remove the quilt from the tub, place in a sheet and squeeze out the excess water. Place on a flat, covered shady surface to dry. The older the quilt, the greater the risk to the fabric.
- Small, modern-day quilts, such as baby quilts may be washed, gentle cycle with mild soap in the washing machine. They may be put in the dryer on delicate cycle.

Gentleness is the key!

5. Wool or crazy quilts with silk, brocade and velvet can be dry cleaned. There is no guarantee that the cleaning will not damage the quilt. The process might deposit harmful chemicals within the quilt.

Keep Templates From Slipping Clear fingernail polish sprinkled with a little fine salt or fine sand. (Keep in mind that fingernail polish remover dissolves plastic).

Coast Village Coffee Cake

Streusel

- 1 C firmly packed light brown sugar
- 3 Tbs. margarine, melted
- 1 C chopped walnuts or pecans
- 1 tsp. grated orange rind
- 1/4 cup flour
- 1 C chocolate chips

Cake

- 1/2 C margarine, softened
- 2 C flour
- 1/2 C granulated sugar
- 1 tsp. baking powder
- 3 large eggs
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. grated orange rind
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 2/3 C orange juice

Glaze

1/2 C confectioner's sugar

21/2 tsp. orange juice

Grease 9 or 10" tube pan. Prepare streusel. Prepare cake by creaming shortening & sugar, add eggs one at a time. Mix together dry ingredients & add to mixture alternately with orange juice & egg mixture, beginning & ending with flour. Spoon half the batter into prepared tube pan. Sprinkle with streusel. Top with remaining batter. Bake 30-35 min. Cool. Prepare glaze and drizzle on top of cooled cake. Yum!


