- Week 5 March 27-31: Honor and thank those related to you by blood or law that give you the freedom to be all you can be as a quilter parents (lawed and inlawed), husband, kids, cat, dog. After all, they're the ones who move piles of fabric to find a place to sit down, sit and step on pins and needles, try to remember that all borders are not international and that all greens are not equal, and so many other things that proves that they tolerate all this stuff because they love us.

Lecture: "Looking for the Glow aka Color Theory

Made Easy."

Most recently Sharla conducted a computer workshop for quilter at the Esprit Amish Quilt Exhibit at Laguna Beach. An accomplished machine embroidery instructor and fearless colorist, Sharla has exhibited her work at several shows and is on the cutting edge of what's happening in quilting today.

Workshop: Color Illusions

Do you feel you already understand the basics of color theory and want to push further into unraveling the mysteries of color? Then this is the workshop for you. Advanced colorists and beginners alike will benefit from the exploration of the theories of Joseph Albers. Whey red looks red against one color and orange against another. Why one value will appear light in one composition and dark or muddy in another. How a single fabric appears radically different depending upon the second fabric you choose. Come away from the day with a greater appreciation of why color is not color until it interacts with another color.

Workshop fee is \$25 and a \$5 material fee. A complete supply list will be provided, but a sample of what you will bring includes a wide range of fabrics — light, medium and dark chosen from warm palette and one cool color.



The Entries Are In—Lots of Them

The entries are in and by the time you read this the jury will have made its decision. We are fortunate to have obtained the services of Libby Lehman and Judy Mathieson to choose the quilts for the exhibit. It was no easy task. Ruth Walters reports that the entries were "fabulous!" Are we in for a treat or what?

Entries totalled 248 quilts from 31 states! Though most of the quilts were from California, New York, and Colorado in that order, quilters from as far north as Alaska sent in slides too. From east to west we spanned the distance from Connecticut to Hawaii, and responses came from as far south as Georgia and Texas. We even received a few entries from Canada!

We received more than *twice* as many entries as we did in 1991. We can only hope that attendance figures will be likewise!

A Show About Town

While we are selling ads, we will be asking local businesses if they would like to display a quilt the week before the exhibit. We already know a few places which would like quilts. If you are willing to loan one or two of your quilts for this "in town" quilt show, please leave your name on the clipboard at the back of the room. 



Why Should Quilts Be Appraised?

Beverly Dunivent, a quilt appraiser certified by the American Quilter's Society, will be making her services available during our Natural Impressions II show in May. She advises that each year quilts ranging in value from several hundred to thousands of dollars are stolen, lost, or destroyed by some form of disaster. Quilts that took many hours of work and represent a family's history are irreplaceable. If a quilt is not documented or insured, no compensation is due from insurance to its owner. She suggests having your precious quilts appraised for documentation. The charge for a written appraisal for insurance and documentation purposes is \$25.00 and \$10.00 for a verbal appraisal.



Historic Exchange. Quilter's News Service-Washington DC-March 18. To honor National Women's History Month, and Quilt Day, President Clinton and Speaker Newt Gingrich today exchanged treasured heirloom quilts. The ceremony took place on the steps of the Capitol building, with many lawmakers in attendance. Both quilts had reportedly been in each leader's family for several generations, though probably not made by a direct relative in either case. "I don't know who made this quilt, but I pass it to you to honor the hardworking, persevering, beautiful women who did make it," said the President. "And I give you mine in the spirit of those women who worked together in friendship and cooperation to accomplish this work of extraordinary beauty."

The two men met today to show publicly their intention to work in cooperation and harmony. "We have a lot of differences, but through communication, hard work, and cooperation, together we can reach a concensus and go forward," explained Speaker Gingrich. "There is a great example of community in these quilts," continued the President, "we will choose to focus on areas in which we agree, to concentrate on ways in which we do work well together, and keep the goal in mind — a healthy, functioning government, and a productive, prospering country."

The gift from President Clinton was a scrap quilt, using many mis-matched fabrics in a great variety of colors. The pattern of interlocking circles is know as Wedding Ring, was probably made around 1915, and "definitely in Arkansas," said the President. The craftspersonship of each quilt is reportedly excellent, the materials used were of the best quality, and the hand stitching finely detailed. The Speaker's gift was a bright, bold design known as Log Cabin, done in only two colors — red and white. "I remember sleeping under this quilt when I was a little boy; I dreamed under this quilt," he said. After receiving quilt, the President pledged to have it's history researched, to have it dated and appraised.



Dress, apron, hat - use solid color for hat & dress or hat & apron. Use coordinating print for other piece. Hand should be white. Use your imagination for hat trim and pantaloons.

Applique - Trace pieces onto freezer paper and press templates to wrong side of fabric. Cut out fabric pieces allowing a 1/4" seam allowance. Baste under seam allowances. Find center of background and of Sue. Applique feet, add pantaloons, dress, apron, hat (with omamentation attached), then hand & arm.

In order to make sure that the finished Sunbonnet Sue is facing left on background material, pay close attention to reversal of templates.
