February 14 Guild Meeting


Program features wearable artist: Cathie Hoover

Just in time for our first guild challenge of a wearable art garment. Cathie Hoover is our guest lecturer and workshop instructor in February. Her inspirational lecture, "Accept the Challenge!" recounts her experiences when she accepted her personal challenges to grow and succeed with difficult tasks. Pieces which she has produced will be shown and discussed. Her workshop is titled 90's Patchwork Jacket.

Cathie's interest in creative sewing led her to pursue a college degree in Home Economics from Chico State College in 1971. She followed a career in dietetics after an internship at Highland General Hospital, Oakland. Cathie retired from this pursuit in 1977 to become a full-time homemaker while simultaneously beginning her long career with creative sewing.

Sweet Things was the name of her business and she produced baby items featuring machine applique. After relocating to the Central Valley, Cathie began to take classes from some of the Bay Area's finest teachers and teaching at local quilt shops. Cathie feels that it is her job as a teacher to encourage students to create unique pieces, whether they be quilts or garments. She has been extremely successful in inspiring students to create their own designs and color choices.

Cathie has been an instructor at many Northern California quilt guilds, at the American Quilters Society show in Paducah and at Empty Spools Conference at Asilomar. For the last five years she has organized and judged the



in-house wearable art contest at the Asilomar conference.

Her quilts and garments have won many prizes in the last several years. Due to the unusual qualities of the garments she makes, Cathie was asked to create pieces for the Fairfield Processing Corp. Fashion Show in 1993-94 and again in 1994-95. She was elected to the position of board member for NCQC in 1993.

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Coming in March ...

Lecture: Quilt Kits in Perspective

Anne Copeland will present a guest lecture and workshop in March. The invitation for her to visit is in response to a membership survey last Spring when it became clear that many of our members desire opportunities to learn more about the history of quilting. We were fortunate to have Anne give a couple of presentations at the Natural Impressions II show last May.

On March 13th, Anne will present a program on the History of Quilt Kits, a subject that she and her business associate, Beverly Dunivent, have done extensive research. It is a fascinating topic.

Participants will learn

- Dating antique fabrics and patterns
- How to take care of quilts; restoration tips....when to restore the worn parts of an antique textile or quilt and when not to restore;
- Advice on designs that are indicative of different periods;
- Identify old motifs and designs in new fabrics
- Create your own "antique" pallet of colors & patterns --- use new fabrics from your own stash for an "antique" look;
- Handouts ... and much, much more!

The Workshop is FREE to guild members, but there is a limit of 30 people. Sign up now.

Anne Copeland is an appraiser of quilted and other textiles, certified by the American Quilter's Society. Author of numerous articles on quilt history and quilt-related topics, she co-authored with Beverly Dunivent, a full-length research article which was published in the Journal of the American Quilt Study Group, *Uncoverings* 1994. Anne and Beverly have written a book, currently under review by publishers, titled *Quilted by Numbers: Kit Quilts in Perspective*.


A member of the American Quilter's Society Anne Copeland serves as a field editor for the AQS. She is the current Vice President of the Professional Association of Appraisers of Quilted Textiles. In her busy professional career she finds time to participate in the National Quilting Association, American Quilt Study Group, California Heritage Oral History Project and the Quilt Restoration Society. Guild membership includes the South Bay Quilt Guild, Prime Time Quilters and Garment Wizards (a wearable art garment group), and she is associate member of the Orange County Quilt Guild.

Anne performs quilt appraisals of antique, contemporary and art quilts, wearable art and other textile items. She gives lectures at major quilt shows and local guilds throughout the United States.

Anne was recently involved as a co-curator of an Antique Quilt Show held in conjunction with the National Quilting Association major quilt show in Riverside, CA.

We are indeed fortunate to have this opportunity to have Anne Copeland "educate" our membership on quilt history and preservation.



KITE EATING TREE

10" Finished (with seams 10 1/2")

MATERIALS:

Background - Cream, white on muslin, beige, ecru

Tree - Any green

Tree trunk - Brown

Kite - Any bright fun fabric


CUTTING DIRECTIONS


- A Background /Green Strips for half square triangles 2 7/8" x 21" (14 triangle pairs)
- B Background Corner square 2 1/2" x 2 1/2" (cut 2)
- C (Green); D (Background); and E (Brown) Use template being sure STRAIGHT GRAIN OF MATERIAL IS IN DIRECTION OF ARROW.

Kite - Add seam allowance to template before appliquéing to tree.

Layered-strip method for half-square triangle units:

- 1. Cut strips from background and green fabrics 2 7/8" wide by approximately 21" long.
- 2. Layer two strips (one from each fabric) RIGHT sides together, keeping the long edges even.
- 3. Cut the layered strips into 2 7/8" squares
- 4. Cut each layered pair of squares diagonally, from point to point, cutting into triangles.





Challenge Update: (or It's OK if you forgot already because here's a reminder)

The Rules: Due in October, use black and white Debra Lunn "Vibrations" fabric in some amount that is visible on outside of garment, and give it a musical title.

February hints: Sign up for the February workshop (NOW!)


Use the heart TMM* rubberstamp block and make several mini-blocks for a jacket border or pocket.





AUNT IMA SEW-HAPPY'S

ADVICE FOR QUILTERS

Dear Aunt Ima,

I double dare you to find one more method to mark quilting lines that I haven't already tried!

Tracing appliqué and quilt lines

- Saral paper can be used to mark dark fabrics with a fine chalk lines, finer than a lines you get from chalk pencils. Saral paper comes in a roll and can be used over & over again, if not abused. One side of the paper is coated with a chalk-like substance and the other side is plain. (Test to be sure you have the correct side facing your fabric). Draw your design on the plain side of the paper. Chalk side goes against the dark fabric, you pin or tape it in place as you would any tracing paper and trace your design with a pen (a piece of fine sandpaper under your fabric will keep it in place as you trace.) Presto, the design is transferred to the fabric in a fine chalk line that will not rub off easily. Remove paper and you are ready to cut out your appliqué pieces. This paper could also be used for marking quilt lines. When you are ready to clean up, just rub a piece of cellophane tape over the markings. It also washes out, but lasts longer during the rough treatment of the quilting process. Saral paper is available at art supply stores, tole painting stores, and some sewing catalogs.
- If you are worried that any colored mark will stain your fabric, try one of the "creasing markers" used by tailors to mark wool, they have long been used in the orient to mark embroidery designs on silk. The tool does not leave a residue, rather, a slightly shiny mark is made on the fabric and readily washes out.

Finding designs inspiration.....

Flip through magazines such as professional photography magazines. Squint at the pictures to blur images. The "basic design" will seem to pop out when released from its fine details. Another method is to turn the magazine upside down. You will be surprised at the design simplicity revealed. **Colored Papers.....** Multi-colored sets of origami papers may be used to paste-up trial quilt blocks. These papers come in metallics, unusual colors and designs.

Solving Wavy-Edge problems

Measure the top and measure the bottom of your wall hanging. Add the two together and divide by 2. Use that measurement to cut border strips for top and bottom and "ease" both sides to fit. This way you have the same size at each end. Do the same for the sides.

CHEAP TIPS and TRICKS

To control your spools of basting or quilting thread, place the eraser end of a pencil into the spool hole. Put the now top-heavy pencil into a cup or heavy glass so that it sticks out of the top and rolls freely as you wind off the thread. You won't have to look for that pesky spool as it can't roll away from you again!

- Organize a Quilt-In for fellow quilt lovers... a weekend retreat and quilt, quilt, quilt.

Your Local Community

- Hang a quilt show and offer quilting demonstrations for the public in a museum, library, bank, shopping mall, quilt shop.
- Plan a quilt party of school children, residents at a rest home, or your own quilt group.
- Make or deliver donation quilts to local charities.
- Focus on the media submit a feature article for newspapers and magazines: arrange special recognition for a local quilter; sponsor a quilting program on television.
