Contemporary Variations On Traditional Design

Judy Mathieson, author and artist, has been making, or should we say "perfecting," Mariner's Compass quilts since 1980.

She became interested in quiltmaking in 1973 while completing a B.A. degree in home economics-textiles and clothing at Cal State University, Northridge. Her quilts have been selected for Quilt National juried shows in Athens, Ohio, in 1979, 1981 and 1987, and are shown on Quilt National's posters. Since she began teaching, Judy has presented lectures and workshops for guilds and conferences internationally and her work is frequently featured in Quilters Newsletter Magazine.

Judy has developed modern techniques to make the piecing the Mariner's Compass quilt pattern a perfectionist's dream. We welcome Judy to our guild again and are delighted to hear about her latest versions of Mariner's Compass.

If you are just this month auditioning fabrics with "Vibrations" you are well on your way.
- At each guild meeting, be a detective and snoop around, check out the handmade wearable art worn by our members. Be bold! Ask people about their garments. (Quilters don't bite.) CUTTING DIRECTIONS:

Background:

- A Two 1 1/2" x 8 1/2"
- B One 3 1/4" x 3 1/4" square cut diagonally twice
- C Two 1 7/8" x 1 7/8" square
- D One 1 7/8" x 1 7/8" square cut diagonally once
- F Six 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" squares (for connector triangles)

Tie Fabric (for each tie color)


- B One Template (Be sure straight grain of material is in direction of arrow)
- C One 1 7/8" x 1 7/8" square
- E One 2 1/2" x 5 1/2" rectangle


Quick connector triangles; sew two F (1 1/2" x 1 1/2") background squares to E (2 1/2" x 5 1/2" rectangle)





Just for you, Mom!

Wonder-Full Oatmeal Cookies

Cream together:

1 cup Crisco

1/4 cup peanut butter

1/2 cup white sugar

1/2 cup brown sugar

2 eggs

1 teaspoon vanilla

Add:

1/2 cup flour

1 teaspoon baking soda

1/2 teaspoon salt

2 cups rolled oats


1 to 2 cups chocolate chips

1 cup nuts (pecans or walnuts), chop, do not crush or they release too much oil.

1 cup shredded, flaked coconut (optional)

Mix up good. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased cookie sheet. Yes, that's "teaspoons," these are very filling cookies. 6-8 dozen

Bake 375 degrees for approx. 10 min. Call them done before the entire top of the cookie "dries" out and appears cooked, so they will stay moist.

Aunt Ima Sew-Happy's Advice for Quilters



Summer is a-coming soon. Do you have a couple of quilt tops, but no time to quilt them?

Take a tip from quilters of the 1920's & 30's. Make summer coverlets. Tops can be backed with fabric, using the simple technique of sewing a back (no batt) to the front and turning it insideout like a pillow case. You can lightly tie it, lightly quilt, baste or do nothing to turn your top into a serviceable, light weight coverlet for those hot summer nights. Quilt it later by simply removing the back and proceeding as you would any quilt project with batt and backing.



- Pressing in small areas is easier if you protect your finger with a leather thimble. You will be able to adjust seam allowances with one hand and press with the other without that barbecue feeling
- There really is a difference between pressing and ironing and each can affect the appearance of your finished work. To press, lift the iron and press it down on each area, without sliding across the fabric. Use this technique to prevent seams from becoming distorted. Nancy J. Martin
- Eleanor Burns sorts her scraps according to size and stacks them on the ironing board in layers of equal or similar sizes. She presses them in the stack, making it easier to cut patches from all the layers of fabric at once. Stack 2 right sides together repeatedly in the stack, pressing bonds them and they are Quiltmaking Tips & Techniques, ready to sew.

Cheap Tips and Tricks

- Find time to sew... keep a small box of precut and sorted patchwork pieces next to your machine. When the urge strikes to sew, your pieces are ready to go, without additional preparation. A few minutes here & there...a quilt top done in no time!
- Gift wrap a baby quilt for that special newborn in a square, flannel receiving blanket. It is easy to make one with a square of flannel, either single or double layer; serge the edges with woolly nylon thread. The latest trend in baby blankets is a double layer of cotton knit with binding.
- For a snugly baby blankets scaled to size, use few extra quilt blocks (approximate overall size 12" or 16"), flannel backing and satin blanket binding. It's a quick gift for a toddler. Batting is optional.
- Use architect's drafting tape to mark quilt lines instead of masking tape. It is less sticky.
- Place a piece of white paper or cloth behind your needle when threading it, it's easier to see the needle eye.
- Make a portable pressing pressing board. Ask for an empty cardboard fabric bolt at a fabric store. Pad the board with a piece of Pellon Fleece, cotton batting or an old cotton mattress pad, wrap in muslin or other fabric and tape or staple in place. Place at your elbow, next to your sewing machine and take it to workshops. It is light-weight and packs easily into a suitcase.
