"... Many of the guilds in Southern CA conduct quilt shows...usually showcase the quilts of their own guild. The purpose of Crossroads was to showcase the best of all Southern CA quilters in one venue. Road to California has agreed to underwrite all the costs of the show and we have also agreed to return 35% of the gross gate receipts to SCCQG. These monies are distributed to the guilds whose members helped produce the show. I feel that there is a precedence for this relationship since the major quilt shows in this country are produced by private concerns and

from column 1......involve quilt guilds. Paducah, managed by AQS, and Houston Quilt Festival, managed by AIQF are examples. In addition to underwriting the costs of the show, I have secured a substantial amount of prize money from sponsors that has been given to the quilters. It has not been our intent to delete any of the current shows sponsored by guilds. It is our hope to use a new facility in 1998 and to expand entries for Crossroads to include all of California".... ### **News From Great Britain**





8" Finished (8 1/2" with seams)

#### MATERIALS:

Background: White, white on white Star: Red and Blue (flag colors)

## **CUTTING DIRECTIONS:**

Trace complete pattern pieces being sure to add 1/4" seam allowance to all pieces

#### ASSEMBLING DIRECTIONS:

Step 1 - Attach A to B then to C (Unit 1)

Step 2 - Attach D to E then to F (Unit 2)

Step 3 - Attach G to H (Unit 3)


Step 4 - Attach X to Y then to Z

Matching marks. (Unit 4)

Step 5 - Attach Unit 2 to Unit 4

Step 6 - Attach Unit 3 to unit from Step 5

Step 7 - Attach Unit 1 to unit from Step 6



## **Funny Pages**

Smithson Museum of Pan-American History Textile & Quilt Division 7000 Anthology Way Washboard, DC 97645

#### Dear Madam:

Thank you for your latest submission to the Museum, labeled "245-Q5, layer seven, next to the clothesline post. Antique appliqué quilt."

We have carefully examined this specimen with electron microscopes and regret to inform you that we disagree with your theory that it represents "conclusive proof of textile skills of Early Women in Santa Barbara County over two million years ago." Rather, it appears that what you have found is a quilted nappy. Further examination with chemical analysis indicates the specimen is of the Pamper brand, circa 1961.

It is evident that you have given a great deal of thought to the analysis of this specimen, and you may be quite certain that those of us who are familiar with your prior work in the field were loathe to come to contradiction with you findings. - The material is molded, quilted and plasticized.

- 3. It is with feelings tinged with melancholy that we must deny your request to have the specimen carbon dated. 2 egg yolks


3-4 beef, chicken, or vegetable bouillon cubes dissolved in 1 1/4 cups boiling

## Ima Sew-Happy's Aunt Advice for Quilters

Finding Inspiration

An inspiring local place to get quilt block and quilting design inspirations is the beautiful Santa Barbara Spanish-style, Courthouse. You will be intrigued with the wonderful imported ceramic tiles on floors and walls, around drinking fountains and doorways. You may also find inspiration for color schemes and motifs in the painted geometric designs on walls and ceilings. This kind of old-world craftsmanship surely would not be possible at the cost of present day construction. Take the docent tour and be inspired as a quilter! Also take special note of the tile star pattern at the bottom of the first floor stairwell and iron grillwork gates and window panels. We are fortunate to have this jewel in our town.

Just your cup of tea might be a coat, jacket, lounging outfit, costume for next Halloween for yourself or another person. If you prefer to make something small, how about a hat and purse to match or quilters bag and jacket set. Attaching beads can be difficult if you don't have the right size needle. The local bead shops have very fine needles in stock as well as silk thread. Some beads and jewels can be attached with special fabric glue. Check at the local craft shops for the right type of glue that will hold up when laundered or dry cleaned.

#### A Quilter's Friend

A dog is a constant companion Who hangs around whatever you do. If you think something is of interest, A good dog wants to know too. So quilters' dogs check out the fabrics, Make sure scraps don't go to waste, Proof all the quilts for comfort and generally test for taste. One can quilt without a canine companion, But once the Labit is there It's a lonely business without one --But you would have quilts with no hair! Thanks to Jacquie Scuitto, AOL

#### Pieced Blocks

There are several methods of assembly pieced blocks. One is called English style. A paper pattern is cut out, the fabric wrapped around it, pressed and then whipstitched to another piece formed the same way. The last step is to remove the paper backing. Used mostly during the 19th century, you can find tops with the paper inserts still intact, check for a date on the paper if they used newsprint. It is an excellent way to accurately piece. The foundation method, or pressed piecing, was popular in the last quarter of the 19th century, particularly to make Log Cabins, crazy quilts and string quilts. Assembling pieced blocks by seaming them together with a running stitch is called the American method. Today quiltmakers add a 1/4 inch seam allowance, but there is evidence that some quiltmakers in the past used only 3/16 inch seam allowance. quoted from Quilts, guide to affordable 19th& 20th Centry quilts, Greenbacker & Barach


