

She will share with us some of the techniques she uses, as well as design motivation, fabric selection, and pattern choices. Her garments will be available for touching, trying on and demonstrate photographing. Noelle will machine and handsewn techniques, styles of embellishments (including fabric origami), easy fabric-design screening and stamping. To name a few of her honors and credits, Noelle has entered ten garments in the Marine Needlework and Ouilt Show in the past seven years. She won 4 blue ribbons, 2 second-place ribbons, 3 Best-of-Class, 4 Judge's awards and 3 Honorable Mentions!

September 11 Psst! Advance news about our program /workshop for September...

Nancy Johnson-Srebro, featured speaker, is author of the definitive book on Featherweight Singer sewing machines, a book on rotary cutting techniques, and several articles on miniature quilts. In fact, Nancy is an well-known expert on all these topics. She will present a lecture titled *One Hundred Plus Club* for all of you who love block patterns.

Anne Braddock is now taking sign-ups for the workshop which explores a nifty pattern, "Endless Circles." We will discover special techniques for rotary cutting with this pattern!

ALTERATION OF FABRIC

Hand's on ... Vat Dyeing, Tie Dyeing, Marbling, Stenciling and Stamping are the techniques you will be exploring to change the look of fabric.

Coastal Quilters Guild will provide dyes, paints and equipment.

You must bring:

Fabric



(write your name on it in permanent ink)

100% cotton (you may get mixed results on polyblends) suggested sizes 1/2 yard pieces and smaller Bleached muslin or unbleached muslin

Other fabrics from your fabric stash such as calicos, gingham, white on beige/white, or pieces of fabric that others gave to you because they knew you were a quilter.

- ☐ Plastic bag to carry wet fabric home.
- ☐ Recycle bin if you signed up to bring one or more.

Wear old clothes because you'll probably get some dye or paint on your clothes.

Strongly recommended to bring:


- ☐ Rubber gloves or equivalent (like plastic bags to wear as gloves.
- ☐ Small knife, to create your own stamps.
- ☐ Permanent ink pen, to write your name on fabric that you have cut into small pieces.
- ☐ Pen or pencil, paper for notes on what you did.

Neat stuff that you might want to bring:

Be imaginative! limit yourself to this list. Squirt bottles, small containers, yarn, rubber stamps, stencils, netting or tulle, buttons or coins, milk carton caps, old tooth brushes, natural sponges, stiff artist, brush, etc.

Community Quilts Update

Letter from Diane Eardley:

I am planning a Week Day Sewing Fest at my house, the third week of August. Tentative Date is August 21st, so mark your calendars.



Hi, from San Diego!

Before I left Santa Barbara on June 19th, I delivered 7 quilts and 3 doll quilts to Sarah House. Debby, the Director of Sarah House, is amazed at our generosity, "artistic abilities" and extremely appreciative of our donations. She said the quilts which are square (i.e., about 40" in length and width) are especially useful because they can be used to cover laps during hand-fed meals. Since the quilts are washable, they do not have to be saved for special occasions.

The lap quilts (roughly 40" x 55") are also being put to very good use, even in this warm weather, as one of the early events of HIV infection is to disrupt the sense of body temperature.

Debby told me there are three little girls currently living at Sarah House who are delighted to have the doll quilts; 20 month old twins and a three year old.

While on my way down to San Diego, I was able to stop at Crazy Ladies and Friends in Santa Monica to personally thank the new owner, Linda Sheard, for her generous donation of three bolts of fabric to our Community Project for Sarah House. Maggie Godwin brought back the bolts in early June, and they are at my house in Santa Barbara. I will be in San Diego until early August, but you can call me after August 3rd (28 963-8321) if you have a quilt to donate. If you need 4" squares (we still have many hundreds of them even though most of the 7 quilts which I delivered were made of these squares), backing, batting, and some other donated fabric. I will bring squares and lap quilt-size pieces of batting and backing to the August Guild meeting at Oak Park.

I will confirm the date at the August Guild meeting. I hope to make another delivery to Sarah House in early September.

Satellite Groups... everything you always wanted to know. but forgot to ask

so you want to get more out of your quilting time! How do I expand my knowledge of quilting and make new friends in the guild? As a CQ Guild member you might want to explore quilt history, techniques, share or swap, attend quilt shows, find places to shop and learn more about quilting and related sewing topics. (If not, skip to page 6)

In short, if you are already an avid quilter or a wana-be avid quilter and can't get enough quilting...you want more, More and even MORE, here's the answer you are seeking! First, determine your interests; second, sign-up for a satellite group with other members who also want MORE!

What's a satellite group? The equivalent of an old-fashioned home-town Quilt Bee that provides that extra, tasty morsel of quilt group experience you seek.

As Guild membership increases, it is difficult to provide enough space and an intimate environment for one-to-one sharing, an integral part of the old-fashioned Quilt Bee. Thus, satellite groups continually evolve to fill the gap. They are mini-groups that research special topics, share travel, explore new quilting techniques, sew and swap quilt blocks, make charity items or a guild opportunity quilt, etc. Each satellite group decides what the emphasis will be for their group. Some popular group formats are appliqué block construction, pieced blocks, clothing design, or they just meet regularly as friendship groups, gab, and Show & Tell about quilts in progress.

When? Satellite's usually meet once a month. Where? At member's houses, on a rotating basis. Willingness to be a hostess doesn't depend on owning a large house. The guild recommends no more than 12 people, as most homes would be hard-pressed to accommodate more. Do you live in a teeny-tiny studio apartment in a 10 floor walk-up? Alternate meeting sites are public library meeting rooms, business meeting rooms, church recreation rooms, etc. Each group determines what they need and members determine how to meet those needs.

If sharing is the group's format, the monthly designated hostess usually makes refreshments; visiting members usually provide blocks or some other form of hostess gift.

The Guild Board encourages members, especially new members, to start or join a satellite group that fits their needs. Much can be accomplished in a small group that cannot at a general guild meeting.

How do I become active? If an existing group has reached it's limit of members, an opening may not occur for quite some time. Those members did the foot work and started a group that pursues their interests. You too can be part of a group or start one on just the topic you want to explore!

... so, how do I start a satellite group?

Get 12 guild members (more or less is OK too), decide on a monthly meeting time (evening or daytime). At the first meeting you can set up a monthly hostess list and decide on the emphasis. If there will be no special topic — just decide where to meet/eat & show your latest quilt projects. Bring along new fabric for others to drool over, pictures from quilt shows you visited, share your latest quilt gadgets, etc.



Susan Cochran, Satellite Group Coordinator, keeps a list of people interested in joining new or existing groups. Susan will assist new groups with organization and existing groups can approach her when they need members.

The CQ Board is asking for active satellite group members to act as "Sisters" to help form new satellite groups. These "Sisters" will attend the first meeting of a new group and provide a "jump start" for new groups.

SEW FUN PINCUSHION

4" Finished (4 1/2" with seams)

MATERIALS:

Background - Beige, ecru, white on muslin

Pincushion - Red

Stem - Green

CUTTING DIRECTIONS:

Background fabric:

A - One 1 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangle

B - Two 1" x 1 1/2" rectangle

C - Two 1" x 3" rectangle

D - Six 1" x 1" squares

Red fabric:

E - Two 2" x 3" rectangles

Green fabric:

B - Two 1" x 1 1/2" rectangle

D - Two 1" x 1" squares

Quick connector triangles:

Stem section:

Sew (two) D (1" x 1") squares background fabric to B (1" x 1 1/2") green





Pincushion section:

Sew (two) D (1" x 1") squares background fabric and (One) D (1" x 1") square green to E (2" x 3") red. Repeat reversing placement of green and background fabrics.









SEW FUN THIMBLE

4" Finished (4 1/2" with seams)

MATERIALS:

Background: Beige, ecru, white on muslin

Thimble: Gray

Thimble band: Bright fun fabric

CUTTING DIRECTION:

Background Fabric:

A - One 1 1/2" x 4 1/2" rectangle

.B - Two 1 1/2" x 3" rectangle

C - Six 1" x 1" squares

Grav Fabric:

D - One 2 1/2" x 2 1/2" square

F - One 1" x 3 1/2" rectangle

Bright Fun Fabric:

E - One 1" x 2 1/2" rectangle

Quick connector triangles:

Sew (two) C (1" x 1") squares background fabric to D (2 1/2" x 2 1/2") gray thimble fabric





Sew (two C (1" x 1") squares background fabric to F (1" x 3 1/2") gray thimble fabric.





SEW FUN SCISSORS

8" Finished (8 1/2" with seams)


For August Block of the Month make either a pieced pincushion, thimble or an appliquéd pair of scissors.

MATERIALS:

CUTTING DIRECTIONS: Cut a 10 1/2" square

Background: Beige, ecru, white on muslin

Scissors: Gray, black, gold



Ouilts need TLC

Reprinted letter from Anne Copeland, published in the Southern California Council of Quilt Guilds Newsletter, Summer 1996.

In late July 1995, Beverly Dunivent, Julia Zgliniec and Diane Ferguson, AQS certified quilt appraisers, were asked to appraise the quilt collection for the Bowers Museum in Santa Ana. This project was funded by a grant from the Orange County Quilt Guild.

I think it is important for quilt guilds everywhere to realize that museums today (including local historical societies) are having a very difficult time surviving, let alone properly caring for their quilt collections. There is neither the trained personnel available to properly care for the textiles, or even if there is, frequently the museums do not have the money to have the quilts and other textiles professionally cleaned and cared for.

As was the case with the Santa Ana (and we have the Museum's permission to discuss this), the quilts are not properly stored and they are suffering very badly. We are giving this one example, but most museums fall into the same difficulties.

Sometimes the museums are using acid-free paper to store the quilts and they are sometimes wrapped in plastic. The acid-free characteristic of paper is not permanent - it is a coating that requires the paper be replaced annually. Acid-free boxes need to be replaced every several years. This becomes an expensive proposition for museums. There are, however, alternatives. We are going to be contacting museums and historical societies in California and evaluating the conditions of the quilts, to the degree possible. As we know the organizations, we would like to enlist the guilds to help the museums by the following activities:

 Help provide funding to get the quilts professionally evaluated, cleaned and professionally restored, if necessary.

Help make muslin storage bags to house the quilts safely.

Provide afficient and for glean white cotton sheeting to

 Provide sufficient and/or clean white cotton sheeting to cover quilts before they are rolled and put into bags.

 Provide sufficient batting (poly batting is OK) on which to roll each quilt before it is put into a bag.

 Provide volunteers to assist the appraisers with evaluating and documenting the quilts properly.

• Of all the activities we as quilters involved with quilt guilds do, the preservation of quilts represents our heritage and is utmost importance. Without our help, these quilts will not make it through the next 10 years. If guilds are interested in helping, contact Anne Copeland, 1942 Mt. Shasta Dr. San Pedro, CA 90732.

Sewing is Sew Soothing The America Home Sewing & Craft Association recently commissioned a study that revealed the stress-relieving benefits of sewing. Women who sewed, experienced as well as novices, showed a significant drop in both heart rate and blood pressure - two key factors in the measurement of stress. Activities used in the comparison were playing a card game, painting at an easel, reading a newspaper, playing a video game, sewing a simple project.

Summertime Cucumber-Yogurt Salad

2 cucumbers
5 radishes
1/2 cup plain yogurt
1 1/2 tsp. honey
1/2 tsp. lemon juice
