Gradation Dye Recipe for Cotton Fabrics

Dyeing Cotton Fabric

These instructions will be for gradation dyeing of 6 fat quarters of fabric in 6 steps, using Procion MX Fiber Reactive dyes. Along with the fabric, you will need:

- * rubber gloves
- * 6 1 gallon plastic buckets *see note
- * 2 1 cup measures
- * measuring spoons
- * 6 disposable paper or plastic cups
- * 1 teaspoon Procion MX Fiber Reactive dye in the color you choose (you

can use 2 tsp. dye for deeper colors)

- * 1 1/2 cups non-iodized table salt
- * Synthrapol (this is a special detergent to scour the fabric)
- * Soda Ash, or sodium carbonate (don't use regular washing soda, as it

may contain bleach)

* Note: you can also use quart mayo jars, large plastic cups, etc. If you use smaller containers such as cups and jars, rather than buckets, your fabric will be very mottled.

Your containers used for and you should NOT ever use them for food preparation. Keep a set just for your dyeing. Plastic drop cloth, or use old newspapers to protect your counter and floor in the area you are working.

Step 1

If you haven't already, cut your fabric into 6 fat quarters. Wash in very hot water with 1/2 tsp. Synthrapol and 1/2 tsp. soda ash. Rinse thoroughly. Do NOT use fabric softener. Keep wet while preparing your dye containers.

Step 2

To each of your 6 dye containers, add 1/4 cup table salt. Depending on what size container you are using, add room temperature water. For quart jars, use 2 cups water per jar. For 1 gallon buckets, use 1/2 gallon room temperature water per bucket. Stir well to dissolve the salt.

Step 3

Make your dye concentrate: Put on your dust mask and rubber gloves. Dye powder is very fine particulates, and will fly all over the room, so if possible, do this part outside the house! Have your 1 cup measure ready, about half full of water, open the dye container and measure out 1 teaspoon of the dye powder, place in your cup. Put the top back on the dye container. Stir the dye/ water mixture until dissolved. I like to use a plastic 1 cup container that has a snap on lid. This allows me to shake the water/dye until it dissolves, without worrying that it will slosh out. When you are sure that the dye is dissolved, add more room temperature water until you have 1 cup liquid total.

Ready to Dye

Step 1 Measure dye into dye buckets:

..1. Pour 1/2 cup of the dye liquid into the first container, mix well.

- 2. Refill dye concentrate with room temperature water until you again have
 - 1 cup liquid.
- 3. Pour 1/2 cup of the dilute dye concentrate into the second container,

mix well.

- 4. Refill dye concentrate with room temperature water until you again have
 - 1 cup liquid.
- 5. Pour 1/2 cup of the dilute dye concentrate into the third container

mix well.

- 6. Refill dye concentrate with room temperature water until you again have
 - 1 cup liquid.
- 7. Pour 1/2 cup of the dilute dye concentrate into the fourth container,

mix well.

- 8. Refill dye concentrate with room temperature water until you again have
 - 1 cup liquid.
- 9. Pour 1/2 cup of the dilute dye concentrate into the fifth container,

mix well.

- 10. Refill dye concentrate with room temperature water until you again have
 - 1 cup liquid.
- 11. Pour 1/2 cup of the dilute dye concentrate into the sixth container.

mix well.

12. Discard the remaining 1/2 cup of dilute dye concentrate.

Step 2

Add one washed and wet fat quarter of fabric to each dye container, stair well. The more you stir, the more even the color.

Step 3

Fix dye onto fabric: Mix 1/4 cup soda ash in 1-1/2 cups warm water. While still wearing your rubber gloves, pour 1/4 cup of the soda ash liquid into each dye container, and give it a good stir. If you want your dyed fabric to be very evenly colored, remove the fabric and squeeze out the dye before you add the soda ash liquid, stir the new mixture very well, then add the fabric back to the bucket. If you want your fabric blotchy, then you can leave it in the bucket when you add the soda ash liquid. Continue down the line of containers, adding 1/4 cup soda ash/water mix to each. Continue to stir each container every 5 minutes for 60 minutes total, if you wish very evenly dyed fabric; stirring less often for blotchy fabric. Over time, you will be able to determine what you prefer.

Step 4

After 60 minutes, the dyeing is finished! Remove the fabric from the containers, and pour the liquid down the drain. Rinse fabric thoroughly in a sink full of room temperature water, changing the water 3-4 times. Then wash the fabric in hot water, using 1/2 tsp. Synthrapol. This takes off the last bit of unattached dye. Rinse well, and dry immediately.

CHALLENGE INFO

It's the FINAL COUNTDOWN to finish your fashion piece for the OCTOBER challenge meeting. Remember that you just need to use the "Vibrations" fabric in <u>some</u> amount on the outside of the garment and give your piece a musical title. There will be six prize categories and the announcement of the winners will be made at the November meeting. Awards will go to:

1. Best match to musical title

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- 2. Most touchy-feely (embellished or surface texturing)
- 3. Most humorous, outrageous, or unconventional.
- 4. Largest amount of challenge fabric used creatively.
- 5. My favorite all around piece (aka: Wish I had made this garment)
- 6. Most elegant or sophisticated

For participants of the challenge, please note the following instructions for the OCTOBER meeting:

- 1. Fill out the form enclosed in newsletter and bring to October meeting.
- 2. Arrive EARLY with your completed form in order to register and receive orientation instructions.
- 3. Bring challenge garment hidden. Wear most of your accessories and matching complimentary garments to the meeting to minimize preparation time required at the meeting. A changing room will be available.
- 4. If you cannot model you own garment, please find your own substitute.
- 5. All participants will sit in the reserved seating section to insure seeing the fashion show AND facilitate the group showing at the end. PLUS the additional bonus of viewing 'up close and personal' the garments sitting around you.






QUICK CONNECTOR TRIANGLES are formed by simply sewing squares to other squares and triangles.





- 3. Sew (one) 1 1/2" x 1 1/2" square black to 2" x 7 1/4" rectangle of white. Unit 3.
- 4. Sew (one) 1 1/4" x 1 1/4" square black to 2 3/4" x 1 1/4" rectangle white. Unit 4.
- 5. Sew Black B piece to White A piece. then sew one 1 1/4" x 1 1/4" square black to A/B unit. Unit 5.

Step 2. Sew 1 1/4" x 5" rectangle black to Unit 4.


Step 3. Sew Unit 3 to Unit just completed in Step 4.









ASSEMBLING BATTRUM the BAT:


- Step 1. Sew one black and one white A triangle pieces together to make 3 Unit A.
- Step 2. Sew One Unit A to 1 1/4" x 1 5/8" black rectangle then to 1 1/4" x 1 5/8" white.
- Step 3. Sew 1 1/4" x 1 5/8" black to 1 1/4" x 1 5/8" white, then 2" x 2 3/4" black. Sew to unit completed in Step 2.
 - Step 4. Sew 2" x 3 7/8" rectangle black to unit completed in Step 3.
 - Step 5. Sew 1 1/4" x 1 5/8" white to Unit A, then to 1 5/8" x 2 3/4" white. Sew to unit completed in Step 4. Sew 4 1/4" x 2 3/4" black, to unit.
 - Step 6. Sew 1 1/4" x 2 3/4" white to Unit A then to 1 1/4"x 3 7/8" white. Sew to unit completed in Step 5
 - Step 7. Sew Unit 1 from Quick Connector Triangles to 2 3/4" x 2" white. Sew to unit completed in Step 6.

Step 8. Sew Unit 2 from Quick Connector Triangles to 2" x 5" white. Sew to Unit completed
