New Year's Resolution log Cabin

Log cabin squares are easy and versatile but not always a popular choice for group projects. Because of the multiple seams and individual's variance of the quarter-inch seam allowance errors can compound so that the finished block is not always the same size.


let us hereby resolve to:

- 1. Be more accurate in our cutting and sewing.
- 2. Use our rotary cutter with a clearly marked ruler.
- 3. Use a 1/4" foot and guide the fabric neatly on the edge. Fabric should not show past the edge of the foot.

THE BLOCK:

- Use off WHITES and/or BEIGES on one side of the log cabin.
- · Choose various shades of REDS, BLUES, or GREENS for the opposite side of the log cabin.
- Start with a 2 1/2" YELLOW square for the center.
- Cut logs/strips 1 1/2" wide.
- Piece the logs in the clockwise direction following the diagram below.
- Press after each log has been added.
- Finished square should measure 8 1/2".

Make more than one square using chain piecing. You will be surprised how quick and easy it is!

- 2- white/beige
- 3 white/beige
- 4 color of your choice

COMING ATTRACTIONS

Santa Barbara City College Continuing Education Winter quarter classes start the week of January 6, and will run for 12 weeks. We are fortunate to have the following classes on the proposed schedule. The official schedules will be in the Santa Barbara News Press on Sunday, December 29.

Maggie Godwin:

CONTEMPORARY QUILTING - (Thursday night 7-10, Wake Center, Room ?)

Stripping for Quilters: With the use of three simple tools yards and yards of fabric can be quickly cut into strips. Many exciting quilt patterns start with simple strips. We will explore some of the basics such as nine-patch, as well as more intricate patterns such as Seminole piecing. Come and be prepared to play!

CONTEMPORARY QUILTING - (Tuesday night, 7-10, Wake Center, Room 2)

Bordering on Crazy: Is your quilt top finished after you've sewn the blocks together? Or is your only concern about borders "How wide shall I cut them?" An "okay" quilt top can become "super" with the addition of borders. Come and explore a variety of bordering options with us.

CONTEMPORARY QUILTING - (Two Saturdays, February 22, March 1, Wake Center, Room 2 SEMINOLE PIECING: It looks intricate with those very tiny pieces - but the techniques are appropriate for even the beginning quilter. We will explore the use of Seminole Piecing, while we learn the techniques to make dozens of designs. SUPPLY LISTS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED AT MANDATORY PREREGISTRATION.

Marti Frolli:

BEGINNING SAMPLER QUILT - Beginning Level (Tucsday mornings, 9-12, Room T-2; Wednesday mornings, 9-12, Room 2)

A course for those who have never quilted and for those who want to sharpen their basic skills. Learn the fundamentals of quiltmaking while constructing a small sampler quilt. Covers traditional and contemporary techniques of piecing, applique and quilting.

STRIPED SAMPLER QUILT - Intermediate Level (Thursday mornings, 9-12, Room T-2; Friday mornings, 9-12, Room 2.

Stitch together a collection of intricate patchwork blocks to produce a very attractive striped sampler quilt. You may enjoy experimenting with a border print or you may choose to omit the stripe challenge and focus on an exquisite floral print. You will learn to draft blocks in all the basic quilt categories, so that no block will be beyond your reach. Machine piecing, originality, accuracy, and contemporary techniques will be emphasized.

Melody Bollay:

FOLK ART APPLIQUE - (Tentatively Wednesdays 1-4. Room 2. Check official schedule to verify time and place). Make a folk art wall hanging or quilt by combining simple applique shapes. You can use patterns handed out in class or create your own unique design. Patterns will include designs appropriate for seashore, garden and animal quilts. This is a good project to use up some of your fabric scraps.

Norah McMeeking:

HERITAGE QUILTS - (Tuesday afternoons). Projects based on techniques learned in England.

DANISH HEART QUILT - January 16.
ENGLISH TEA COZY - January 29, morning.
PINCUSHIONS - January 29, afternoon.
APPLIQUE LANDSCAPE QUILT - February 5, evening and two days, February 13, February 20.
MAKE YOUR MARK ON FABRIC - March 19, morning.
FRIENDSHIP BASKETS - March 19, afternoon.
