Jean Ray Laury Imagery on Fabric

Jean is a freelance artist and writer from central California whose work has appeared in numerous publications and in one-woman and group shows at museums, galleries, and universities across the country. She is a long time quilter and author of a number of popular books. Jean's highly praised book, Imagery on Fabric, covers transfer of photographs or drawings onto cloth. In her lecture, she will discuss various printing methods on cloth to achieve unique designs including the "how-to's" of copy machines, computer printing and transfer, silk and other screening, and stenciling. Her slide show includes contemporary and traditional designs.

Ojai Ribbon Winners

Linda won 1st place, small contemporary for "Sail Away" and 2nd place small appliqué for "Medallion Magic." Lynn was awarded the judges prize for unique design for "Irrigation with Reclaimed Water," which also won 2nd, small contemporary. Norah was awarded a 1st place, small traditional with "Shaded Scrap Patch" and 2nd for medium traditional for "Prairie Schooler." Congratulations to all of you, keep up the great quilting.

1997 CGQ Membership DEADLINE



Teacher's Tips

Rotary Cutters

To prolong the life of your rotary blades, carefully take apart the pieces. Lay out the pieces in order as you disassemble the cutter. Clean the pieces with a drop of sewing machine oil. Flip the blade around and reassemble the cutter.

Remove burrs and nicks with a blade sharpener, available in quilting stores and mail order catalogs. The sharpeners will remove burrs and nicks, but will not make the blade "like new".

When the blade is too dull for cutting fabric. Mark it "Paper" and buy a new cutter for fabric. The "Paper" rotary cutter works great on paper, cardboard, mat board and wall paper!

Meet the Members

Here are the biographies of two more very talented and brave guild members.

DIANE EARDLEY

I began quilting nearly three years ago in a class taught by Marty Frolli. I knew that I was opening a door to a new era in my life.

I grew up in a small town in Northern California and received my undergraduate education and Ph.D. in Immunology at University of California, Berkeley. I met and married my dear husband of 28 years during my senior year of college. We moved to Santa Barbara 14 years ago where we are both professors at UCSB. Along the way, we had four children: Mike (21), Matt and Leah (17) and Benjamin (5).

I think of myself as a traditional quilter with contemporary leanings. I often use my computer to create or arrange quilt patterns. I use CorelDraw and a scanner to create and customize my designs. I love pieced geometric patterns, applique, and I truly love hand quilting. I am currently working on a fractal quilt. Fractals are computer generated images in which the pattern is infinitely repeating. In addition to traditional reverse applique, I am using the technique of channel applique which is similar to mola techniques.

I am also machine quilting a queen size mystery quilt which was sponsored by The Virtual Quilt, a computer quilter's newsletter. The quilt top won second place in an on-line contest which was sponsored by the newsletter.

My immediate goal in quilting is to design a series of quilts based on the five-fold symmetry of quasicrystals and Penrose tiles. These designs lend themselves not only to interesting geometric patterns but also a backgrounds for applique. Quilting is a way for me to explore my creativity and interact with a wonderful group of people.


Board Meeting



Spring Birdhouse

This month's block is for those of you who like piecing! We suggest a brown for the post and off-white for the background, a darker roof and a cheery color for the house. You will need a mirror image as well as a regular version of all the pieces but the post. When you're done, don't forget to give your birds a way into their new home! An appliqued door is always nice, but a dark 1" button would also work just fine. The finished block should measure 8 1/2 x 8 1/2, including the 1/4" seam allowances.
